ONE FIRE Victim Services offers a variety of wrap around services including housing, legal, advocacy assistance, referrals to counseling services, and case management to individuals who are victims' domestic violence, sexual assault, dating violence, stalking, and harassment; victims of all crimes are eligible for advocacy assistance. The program does not discriminate and offers assistance to victims of any race or gender who qualify and resides within the tribe's 14 county reservation.

## **Programs with Court Interaction**

#### **OCAPS: Out-Of-District Court Advocacy and Permanency Services**

- Involved in child welfare cases in non-jurisdiction counties in Oklahoma and all 50 states.
- Most work is done telephonically or electronically.
- Emphasis on education about the Indian Child Welfare Act and ensuring States comply with it.

#### **SCAPS: State Court Advocacy and Permanency Services**

- Involved in child welfare cases inside the 14 counties of which all or part are within the jurisdiction of the Nation.
- Emphasis on education about the Indian Child Welfare Act and ensuring OKDHS compliance, and sometimes provide Tribal Foster Homes.
- Provides services to the families when OKDHS fails to do so or as an alternative to OK DHS services.

#### **TCAPS: Tribal Court Advocacy and Permanency Services**

- Involved in child welfare cases which are wholly under the jurisdiction of the Nation and OKDHS is not involved.
- These cases originate on Indian Country or are transferred in from State district courts. Hearings are held at our Tribal Court House. Tribal Foster Homes are fully utilized.


#### **GPA:** Guardianships and Private Adoptions

- Involved in civil adoption cases to include voluntary adoption, involuntary adoption and birth parent adoptions.
- Monitors Guardianships and Private Adoptions for compliance with the Indian Child Welfare Act and the best interests of children.
- Serves Cherokee children and their families in Tribal Courts and State Courts throughout the United States.

#### **CPS: Child Protective Services**

- Receives referrals involving allegations of maltreatment of Cherokee children.
- Investigates allegations of child maltreatment in Indian Country and co-investigates with DHS in some counties when Cherokee children are involved.



### In January

Indian Child Welfare workers went to court 718 times on behalf of Cherokee children and families. Indian Child Welfare staff worked on cases in 38 states.





## Eligibility Notices, Prevention, & Intervention

When a county or state's child welfare agency gets involved in the life of a family that they suspect to be Cherokee, they are required by the Indian Child Welfare Act (ICWA) to send notice to the tribe. The tribe must then reply to confirm or deny whether the children are members of (or eligible to become members of) the tribe.

Currently, with 4 case workers processing approximately 200-300 pieces of mail per month, response times may vary due to vacancies and depending on the amount of mail received. The tribe has a goal of responding between 45-60 days.

#### In January

Cherokee Nation received:

43 I notices involving 754 children from the State of Oklahoma.

689 notices involving 1,101 children from locations outside of Oklahoma.

1,120 notices involving 1,855 children in total.

The average response-to-notice time this month was 16 days.

Indian Child Welfare Family Protection Services Unit (FPS) assists families in need of hands-on training to correct the conditions that lead to children being removed from their home. These services often include completing a 28-week parenting program that discusses topics like discipline, nutrition, budgeting, and housekeeping. We primarily assist all our tribal CAPS cases but can assist in state cases when a request is made. This helps ensure that families have the tools they need to be reunited. We have also added the Triple P Parenting curriculum to our program.

#### In January

FPS served 29 children and 8 families.

### **Child Protective Services**

#### In January

Child Protective Services (CPS) received 687 referrals of child abuse/neglect.

687 referrals involved 186 children.

0 of the 687 were co-investigated by OKDHS and CPS.

312 of the 687 were investigated by CPS in Indian Country.

13 of the 687 referrals were from within reservation boundaries.


186 of the 687 referrals are those for which ICW is solely responsible.

## Types of Abuse/Neglect Reported




## Certification & Placement Services

(Foster & Adoptive Homes)

### Types of Certified Placement Resource Homes

- •Non-Relative Foster: Families who are willing to take in children they do not know on a temporary basis, but may last years. These families usually do not adopt children.
- •Relative Foster: Families who are related to the children and are fostering them. They do not take in children they are not related to.
- •Non-Relative Adoptive: Families who hope to adopt children when the children's parents' rights are terminated. These homes take placements of children who are legally free for adoption.
- Emergency: Homes that take placement on an emergency basis not to exceed 48 hours.
- Respite: Homes that take placement on a temporary basis, not to exceed 10 days.

#### **ADAIR COUNTY PROJECTS:**

- 1. Dahlonegah South Road (TCM Dist. 7) Bid was awarded to APAC-Central with a bid of \$7,450,450.00 and a project end date of March 31, 2024. Construction is 75% complete with, aggregate base and asphalt. Slopes and ditches have been seeded and mulched.
- 2. Lyon Switch (TCM Dist. 7) Estimated project cost is \$3,968,617. Right-of-Way staking is completed. Appraisal reports are being prepared. Individual landowner meetings will begin after appraisals are completed.
- 3. Malloy Hollow (TCM Dist. 7) Estimated project cost is \$9,484,172. Bridge plans (30%) received.
- 4. Sally Bull Hollow (TCM Dist 8) Estimated project cost is \$4,567,283. Right of Way plans have been received and are currently in review.

#### **CHEROKEE COUNTY PROJECTS:**

- 1. Mud Valley Road (TCM Dist. 1 & 3) Estimated project cost is over \$18,000,000. The Cherokee Nation was awarded the Nationally Significant Federal Lands Tribal Program (NSFLTP) Grant in the amount of \$12,932,457. Paragon Contractors, LLC. has been awarded this project for a construction cost of \$13,345,543.00. Construction started on May 3, 2023, with a construction end date of January 23, 2025. The contractor is working on subgrade, earth work, side drainpipes, subgrade, aggregate base, asphalt, sod and fence. Construction is 47% complete.
- 2. Coos Thompson Bridge (TCM Dist. 1) Estimated project cost is \$1,351,050. Right of Way review has been completed and returned to the engineer for revisions.
- 3. Transportation Material Testing Lab (TCM Dist. 3) Estimated construction cost is \$943,500. This project was awarded to Bronze Oak in the amount of \$943,500. This project will expand the lab, adding additional office space and testing facilities. Utilities have been relocated, the foundation has been poured, and framing has begun.
- 4. Lost City Loop Rehab (TCM Dist. 1) Estimated project cost is \$5,156,000. Utilities have been identified and 2,000' of waterline must be relocate. A CNURA with Cherokee RWD 11 has been received and is being processed.
- 5. Red Barn Road Rehab (TCM Dist. 1) Estimated project cost is \$3,976,723. Utilities have been identified and we are currently obtaining roadway crossing information to determine any possible conflicts.

#### DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION & INFRASTRUCTURE COMMITTEE REPORT

#### **DELAWARE COUNTY PROJECTS:**

- Kansas Roundabout (TCM Dist. 9) This is a cooperative project between ODOT, Delaware County and CNDOT. Cherokee Nation contribution is \$279,836.02 of TTP Safety Funds. The Oklahoma Department of Transportation continues to ask for an asphalt mix design that meets all specifications. H&G have failed to provide one so ODOT cannot proceed forward with removing and replacing the asphalt until that occurs.
- 2. Kansas Dry Creek (TCM Dist. 9) Estimated project cost is \$2,783,083. Right-of-Way acquisition meetings are being scheduled.



## Service Spotlight

This newsletter is intended to provide a spotlight on a service recently provided through the Cherokee Nation Engineering & Sanitation Facilities Construction program.

The Sycamore Tree Baptist Church is a Cherokee church located in the community of Dry Creek in Cherokee County. On January 10, just prior to an incoming winter storm with extreme cold temperatures the Office of Environmental Health & Engineering was contacted by Councilor Lisa Hall requesting our assistance with the well house for the church. The existing well house was dilapidated and held together with ratchet straps and covered with a tarp. Crews assessed the situation on January 11th and on January 12th, the day the storm hit, replaced the well house with a new insulated well house and a larger heater to keep the well from freezing.




