Accomplishments:

Hoad Start

- 1) Enrollment continues to increase following the reopening of two Early Head Start classrooms (Tahlequah and Salina). One classroom met capacity immediately, while the other has three available spots.
- 2) Another AmeriCorps Tutor also joined the ECU team, totaling 15 AmeriCorps tutors to date throughout Nowata, Salina, Pryor, Jay, and Tahlequah classrooms. One tutor completed her obligation to AmeriCorps and is now a full-time employee of the ECU with a second selection pending a background check.
- 3) A Policy Council representative resigned to join the ECU team as a full-time employee. The opening has national Head Start preference for a parent with attending child in the program.
- 4) Quarterly public-school superintendents meeting on January 24 focused on a trimester data report on developmental gains and sites where the teachers needed to finalize their entries were identified. Following the meeting, all the public-school teacher partners have corrected and updated their reports.
- 5) Monthly Policy Council meeting on January 25 reviewed the enrollment criterion and enrollment status, a community elder was also attending.

- 1) The children are submitting their Valentines for Vets. Staff are delivering them to the Cherokee Nation Veteran's Center.
- 2) Quarterly Health Advisory Board meeting on February 8 to discuss the lead water testing and provide guidance on covid, flu, and RSV.
- 3) In-house CPR training is scheduled on February 12 in Salina and February 23 in Tahlequah. Participants limited to staff and parents.
- 4) The 24<sup>th</sup> annual GPS Institute for ECU managers and supervisors is scheduled March 26-28.
- 5) Head Start lead teachers meeting is February 15.
- 6) Fall recruitment has begun with a target of full enrollment on day one August 5.

January is a slow month as schools and organizations are returning after the holiday season. Six events were scheduled for the month and three of those were rescheduled due to weather concerns.

Members of the team assisted with the RTR riders as they began training, their responsibility was in transporting the team to various training areas. This began on January 7 and will continue on the weekends. By all accounts this looks like a strong group of riders for this year.

Members also assisted in the second annual STEM FEST at the Chota Center on January 25<sup>th</sup>. Member's responsibilities included parking lot assistance, set up and tear down of booths, assisting vendors in any way possible and answering questions from students and vendors when asked. Olivia Jorgensen was the Event Coordinator. The event was attended by 741 students in grades 7-12. Twenty-five vendors helped serve our youth.

# **Staff Leadership Training**

Staff leadership training continues with HR with the program from Giant.

### Joe Thornton Archery Range

Staff assisted Maryetta School and Sequoyah School during archery shoots. Dates had to be rescheduled because weather issues. Archery shoots were set up to provide schools with the opportunity to collect scores to be posted for state qualification. Sequoyah posted scores good enough to qualify for state competition and we wish them luck to make it to the national competition.

Staff assisted at Keys School for all age groups in their cultural outreach days and at STEM FEST 2024. The month finished out on January 30 with outreach days at Oklahoma Union Schools assisting with classes in their Family and Consumer Science program.

### **STEM Program**

STEM FEST 2024 took place on January 25 at the Chota Center with 370 7<sup>th</sup> and 8<sup>th</sup> graders attending the morning session and 341 High School students attending the afternoon session. 25 vendors attended, with the most popular being NASA, Army Corps of Engineers, Tulsa Air and Space Museum and Tahlequah Middle Robotics Team. Total of 711 students were in attendance along with 61 teachers and staff attending.



    - Students researched a Native American Creation story of their choice, as well as the tribe behind the story, and then showcased their findings through a Powerpoint and one-page analysis
    - Students will further their writing studies by beginning their autobiography.

  - o Science Fiction novel study: "Ender's Game" by Orson Scott Card
  - Introduced Anglo Saxon Literature and the Oral Tradition

# Fine Arts

- Highlights.
  - Mr. Brandon Bush provided a cultural demonstration about blowguns. Mr. Bush explained the historical significance of blowguns to Cherokee people. He also explained how blowguns are made and demonstrated the proper use of blowguns. At the conclusion of Mr. Bush's demonstration, Cherokee I and II students were allowed to use the blowguns.



# Cherokee I, Holmes

- Cherokee I class is designed to allow students to learn the language and use the language.
  Students are being exposed to a second language but are rapidly learning to speak Cherokee at a novice level.
- Lesson 1 Cherokee grammar
  - Cherokee I students learned to introduce themselves and how to greet other people speaking Cherokee
  - Cherokee I students speak/interact with classroom teacher, Mr. Holmes, speaking in context using Cherokee terminology
- Cherokee II, Holmes
  - Cherokee II class is designed to reacquaint students with Cherokee language and reuse the language. Students and teacher engage in dialogue on a daily basis speaking only Cherokee language.
  - Lesson 1 Cherokee grammar
    - Cherokee II students learned to reacquaint themselves with introduction and greeting terminology using Cherokee language
    - Lesson 1 also incorporates the verb Ge-ga (going); students used the different conjugated forms to identify self, others, and time
    - Cherokee II students speak/interact with classroom teacher, Mr. Holmes, speaking in context using Cherokee terminology for going, identifying self, and greetings
- Humanities, D. Smith
  - Covered the following objectives:
    - Neolithic Period
    - Natufians
    - Ancient Mesopotamia
    - Ancient Phoenicia
    - Selections from The Epic of Gilgamesh
    - Aegean Civilizations
- Art I, Harrington
  - Students are learning the Elements of Art beginning with Line then Space
- > Art II, Harrington
  - Students are working on art pieces for The Five Tribes Youth Art Competition
- Native American Arts and Crafts, Harrington

  - Next week students will learn the process of basket weaving. The red will be prepared using both commercial and traditional dyes.
  - Cherokee Nation Cultural Outreach staff taught the art classes to weave flat mats. The students had a great time learning and creating.

  - The Sequoyah Speech and Drama program hosted a qualifying OSSAA Speech Debate Drama Tournament January 26-27 at Sequoyah High School
  - o All 10 of Ms. Ray's Honors Competitive students won a spot at Regionals (March 16<sup>th</sup>)
  - o There were 250 entries, 12 schools, and 150 students competing
  - All classes Drama I, Drama II, and Honors Competitive class had a hand in getting ready for the tournament
  - Drama I Acting Class is working on Scene Work
  - $\circ\quad$  Drama II Theatre History is working on Greek and Roman Theatre

## Science

- Honors Anatomy/Physiology, Chair
  - Explored careers that require A/P knowledge, reviewed lab safety, learned basic anatomy terms and descriptions, reviewed the organ systems, diagrammed body segments and their organs
- Earth Science, Chair
  - Explored careers that require Earth Science knowledge, reviewed lab safety, learned to differentiate between independent and dependent variables of a controlled experiment
- Honors Botany, Chair
  - Explored careers that require Botany knowledge, reviewed lab safety, over-viewed botany terminology, beginning an in depth study of cell structure
- Indigenous STEM, Cochran
  - Students completed a review and selection of specific science standards to include in a STEM course
  - o Students learned how to use BardAI to locate information
  - Students started a Structures Challenge in which they are building models of Indigenous housing structures within specific constraints.

- Students are working on developing an understanding for how scientific investigations are conducted, and the basic functions of life

- Students are working on developing their observation and deductive reasoning skills through various activities in preparation to learn how to process crime scenes
- These pictures are from a microscope lab where students were analyzing "evidence" to figure out who "stole" their microscope quiz





- Honors Biology, Brant
  - Students were introduced to CER through two different hands-on activities and observed, inferred and predicted using National Geographic pictures
  - o Students worked with microscopes to view everyday items as well as living cultures
  - Students are beginning Ecology unit and complete basic research using AI.
- Honors Chemistry II, Brant
  - o Students completed acid and base unit and completed a titration lab
  - o Students applied chemistry knowledge to baking and are now working with quantum numbers

# Technology

- Web Design, Walker
  - o Students started out this semester using new Web Design material that was acquired
  - The new software, Brackets, is free to use to use and the students are loving it
  - Brackets is making it much easier to do coding because when students start a tag it will automatically put the ending tag on it if it has one
  - Students have started out learning the Basics of html coding then moved on to text elements, link and image elements, formatting elements, tables, and HTML5 elements
  - Students have built several webpages that are different from last semester because the material is more up-to-date than what was used in the past
- Desktop Publishing, Walker
  - Students have been learning how to create newsletters, coupons, calendars, flyers, and certificates
  - o Students have been incorporating WordArt, clipart, shapes, columns, textboxes, and drop caps
  - Note from Ms. Walker:
    - I assigned the students a Labor Day newsletter to build while I was gone to a technology conference. My student, Jaycee, did an excellent job on the assignment. Some of the students were stuck on how to design it, so I showed them Jaycee's as an example.

# **College Prep**

- Students have been busy this month with the New & Improved FAFSA
- College Prep had a Parent/Student FAFSA Night on January 11, 2024 for parents and students on filling out this application. The students have also been working on this application in class.
- Just read an article that the Education Department was late in updating some of its calculations for inflation so FAFSA will not be sending colleges the students FAFSA information until March. On the bright side it should increase the amount of money they will receive.
- Most of the students this semester have completed their college applications and have been working on essays for scholarship applications daily. Some of these scholarship applications are rigorous and some require around 100-250 word responses to as many as 10 questions.

# **College and Careers**

- The class consists of mainly freshmen, and they are having new experiences. They started with preparing a PowerPoint using one slide called, It Is All About Me, and then presented it to the class using the Smartboard. This helped break the ice and they are participating in class discussions more comfortably.
- The students have just completed a research project on their choice of three careers. They condensed their information to fit 8 ½" X 11" posters and placed them on a wall in the hallway to help educate the student body about these particular careers.
- The next project is choosing one of the three careers they are interested in and researching a location they think they want to live while working in this career. They will prepare a monthly budget from the area they want to settle. This includes buying or renting a place to live complete with mortgage or rental insurance, car payments and insurance, utilities, savings account etc. They will complete this project by presenting their research to the class.
