



Real Estate Services

The Office of Real Estate Services is responsible for administering the laws, regulations, and policies affecting the protection and management of trust and restricted lands of individual Indian landowners and the land owned by the Cherokee Nation itself, located within the 14 county area of the Cherokee Nation. Real Estate Services operates under a Self-Governance Compact with the Secretary of the Interior.

II. Program Highlights:

- 1. <u>Purchases</u>. One purchase was made during the month of February to date of report. This 2.8 acres is located in Salina in Mayes County.
- 2. <u>Appraisals/Environmental/Categorical Exclusions</u>. One appraisal was requested; Two categorical exclusions were requested and completed.

- 3. <u>Quiet Title Notices</u>. Eight quiet title notices were received from the Solicitor's office, researched and returned.
- 4. <u>Leases.</u> One restricted hunting lease was submitted and pending; five were approved.
- 5. <u>Last Will & Testaments</u>. Four LW&Ts were prepared and endorsed; one required a district Court approval. Nine LW&T interviews were taken; eight drafts prepared to date.
- 6. Inventory/Heirships. Three inventory/heirships were requested and returned.
- 7. Administrative Law Judgments. Two ALJs were requested and returned.
- 8. Report for Distribution/IIM Set-ups. Seven RFDs were requested, researched and submitted to BIA.
- 9. <u>IIM Setups</u>. Seven new IIM accounts were set up during the month.
- 10. Rights of Entry. 12 rights of entry were requested and completed.
- 11. Rights of Way/Easements. Nine trust/restricted rights of way are pending.
- 12. <u>Service Line Agreements</u>. Four SLA were submitted; two are pending; four add'l SLAs were approved.
- 13. On-Site Inspections/Home visits. 20 on-site inspections were requested and completed.
- 14. <u>Trespass</u>. Two trespass issues are pending surveys.
- 15. Maps/platting. 14 requests for maps/platting assistance were received and completed.
- 16. Land status calls. Nine land status verification calls were completed during the month.
- 17. <u>Financial transactions</u>. During the month of February, \$47,430.22 was processed as lease payments and \$189,108.65 was processed through lockbox.
- 18. <u>District Court Probates.</u> All new probate applications are being researched in preparation for filing in District Court.
- 19. <u>Research</u>. Two staffers continue performing multi-county research.
- 20. <u>TAAMS</u>. Coordinating with EORO to get files encoded, additional staff being processed for TAAMS computer and accessibility. Currently, three staffers are performing final review and updates.
- 21. Stats. 73 client sign-ins; 64 phone inquiries; 76 obituaries were processed.

- 22. <u>Impact Aid</u>. Eight impact aide verifications were requested and completed.
- 23. <u>Day School update</u>. Ballou School (Mayes County), Mulberry Hollow (Adair County), Oak Hill School/Piney (Delaware County), Oaks Mission School/Rocky Ford (Cherokee County), and Redbird Smith (Sequoyah County). All five day school transfer requests have been sent to Central Office for processing. Central Office and Solicitor has requested site visits to determine building conditions on each tract. Site visits on each tract were performed concurrently by BIA/EORO Environmental, CN RES and CNEP. Proposed deeds are being reviewed by Solicitor.

Natural Resources Monthly Report for March 2024 Tribal Council

The Natural Resources Department falls under the supervision of the Secretary of Natural Resources. The department is comprised of the following departments: Wildlife Conservation, Land Management and Agriculture, Geographic Information Systems, Historic Preservation, Ethnobiology, Solid Waste Management, and Environmental Programs.

Reporting period is January 15, 2024 through February 15, 2024.

Wildlife Conservation

The Wildlife Conservation team has been busy with multiple projects including multiple improvements and everyday maintenance at the Sequoyah Hunting Preserve, assisting OSU with a Gray Fox population project, scheduling multiple outreach events such as RSU's conservation day and local kids fishing days. Spring turkey season is approaching quickly!

Other projects:

- Fielded calls from citizens regarding rules and regulations of hunting/fishing within CN reservation.
- Working with Salesforce to update harvest reporting system and controlled hunt application process.
- Research and planning on CN hunters education certification system.
- Preparing for phase 2 of controlled burn (1,200+ acres) at Sequoyah Hunting Preserve, working closely with CN fire program and THPO Office.
- Working with CN fire program to prioritize controlled burns on other tribally owned properties in order to improve habitat.
- Feral Swine removal from SHP, and trust properties in Adair County.
- Road/trail maintenance at SHP
- Establishing water service to Sequoyah Hunting Preserve in preparation for construction project.
- Preparing/scheduling fishing days with municipalities.
- Provided information for potential grant opportunities.

Land Management and Agriculture

The Dahlonegah crew have continued to work on fencing, cutting wood and brush hogging properties along with their maintenance of the equipment. Bull Hollow crew have been working on the additional fencing project, along with cutting wood and brush hogging properties. They are also still mowing other Cherokee Nation owned properties and feeding our buffalo. Tahlequah crew have been brush hogging properties, feeding cattle, and building fence.

- Open Dump Class for ITEC Tribes has been scheduled for March 6, 2024.
- Staff has completed a radon "rough-in" presentation for HACN new construction.
- Staff continues to perform Radon outreach at Tribal facilities.
- Staff is compiling a database of Cherokee Nation facilities and their dates of construction to help locate buildings built before 1978 for Lead-Based Paint database.
- Staff worked with GeoData Center to develop a map of solid waste dumps in the Reservation area.
- Staff has secured a date and location (NSU Tahlequah Event Center) for the Festival on April 12, 2024.
- Phase I class was held on February 15, 2024. There were 10 students from 8 ITEC Tribes and the Cherokee Nation in attendance.
- Staff continues to organize events for the Cherokee Nation Environmental Festival that will be held on April 12, 2024, at NSU Event Center.

Lead-Based Paint Certification Program:

- Staff placed RRP information for contactors at the HACN Procurement and Contracts Office
- Renewal applications were sent to all certified firms and individuals for the FY 2024 year.

CN Clean Air Program:

- Staff worked on revisions to the CNEP Quality Management Plan (QMP).
- Staff submitted requested revisions to the CNEP Air Sensor Studies Quality Assurance Project Plan (QAPP) to Region 6 on January 31.
- Staff performed the monthly audits of the mobile monitor on February 5; the mobile is currently located in downtown Ada, OK with the Chickasaw Nation.
- Staff attended the RTOC call on February 6.
- Staff is working on ozone analyzer maintenances prior to ozone season beginning on March 1.
- Staff submitted the requisition to order equipment (three Pollen Sense analyzers) for the Clean Air Inflation Reduction Act grant on February 8.
- Staff attended the EPA Data Certification webinar on February 15.
- Staff is reviewing the 3rd quarter air monitoring data in preparation for entry into the EPA Air Quality System (AQS).

CN Exchange Network Grant:

- Staff completed the Phase I Environmental Site Assessment for a Purchase for Cherokee Nation Real Estate Services for the Ball Property located in Salina, OK.
- Staff received a request for a Phase I Environmental Site Assessment for the Mullin Property. This is a purchase for Cherokee Nation located in Stilwell, Oklahoma. Staff has conducted the inspection and started working on maps and photo documentation.

Cherokee Nation Phase I ESA Work - Cherokee Nation Housing Authority

• Cherokee Nation Environmental Programs Staff has started working on the Wilson Rock Road Addition located in Muldrow, Oklahoma. A site reconnaissance has been conducted for the property.

Special Projects – Phase I ESA

• CNEP received a Phase I ESA request from Cherokee Nation Planning and Development for a 4.72-acre track associated with the Pryor CDC and Headstart project. Staff ordered EDR reports and has completed the site inspection in Pryor, OK. This project has been put on hold – waiting for some answers on whether an Environmental Review is required instead of a Phase I ESA Report.

Environmental Exchange Network Grant

• No activities were conducted for the ATTAINS Environmental Exchange Network Grant during this monthly time period.

Miscellaneous:

• Staff was contacted by EPA Region 6 Tulsa Staff to discuss a citizen complaint/oil spill located in Skiatook. The incident was investigated by EPA and did not present a concern. EPA would like to set up an in-person meeting to discuss oil spills and contact information for future spills and incidents.

- Staff reviewed the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission's (FERC) for the Pensacola Project's Environmental Assessment (EA) for the Coal Creek Wildlife Management Area. This project is located within the Cherokee Nation's Reservation located near Miami, Oklahoma.
- Staff participated in the EPA Region 6 Climate Training Webinar on January 29, 2024.

The Inter-Tribal Environmental Council

Inter-Tribal Environmental Council (ITEC) is a consortium of Native American tribes from Oklahoma, Louisiana, Texas, and New Mexico. *CNEP serves the consortia as the lead environmental agency*. In this capacity, CNEP provides technical assistance, data analysis, multi-media sampling, and training opportunities to the 44 member tribes. NOTE: *CN Programs* - are programs that serve the Cherokee Nation. *ITEC Programs* - are programs that serve both the Cherokee Nation and the other 45 ITEC tribes. U.S. EPA Region 6 consists of the following states – Oklahoma, New Mexico, Texas, Louisiana, and Arkansas.

These efforts are funded under the following programs:

ITEC Underground Storage Tanks Program (UST):

- Staff performed a UST training/inspection for Muscogee Nation on January 30.
- Staff performed a UST training/inspection for the Iowa Tribe on February 6.
- Staff performed a UST training/inspection for the Osage Nation on February 8.
- Staff produced two separate information packets about UST equipment testing and regulations to the Osage and Iowa tribes.
- Staff developed a step-by-step information packet for Donna Prentiss of the Apache Tribe to assist with the permanent closure of their UST system in Anadarko.

ITEC Brownfields:

- Staff prepared for the Phase I Environmental Site Assessment Training, creating a PowerPoint presentation. This training was held for Tribes on February 15th.
- Staff completed the Property Eligibility Determination (PED) forms for the Caddo Nation North Property and submitted it to EPA Brownfields Project Officer. The PEDs were approved and returned from EPA to begin Brownfields activities. Staff traveled to Caddo Nation and conducted field reconnaissance to inspect 3 Phase I Environmental Site Assessment Sites.
- Staff continued to work on the Concho School Buildings Phase I ESA Report for the Cheyenne-Arapaho Tribe.

ITEC SUPERFUND:

- Staff continued to work on the Beeline Recycling Preliminary Assessment Report. This site is located in Okmulgee, Oklahoma and is being written for Muscogee Nation. Staff is writing the Preliminary Assessment Report.
- Staff drove to Wetumka and Apache to investigate 2 former Superfund Projects. Staff will be writing to Reassessment Reports for EPA.
- Staff conducted site discovery in Hinton and El Reno.
