



Ambulatory Care Visits Month of January 2020-2024




<u>Dental Services</u> <u>Month of January 2021-2024</u>
















Third Party Revenues Combined: Year to Date







Part A: PUBLIC HEALTH LEADERSHIP

Public Health Performance Management - February 2024

Public Health Accreditation

The CNPH leadership team is preparing plans for the next 5-year cycle of accreditation. The initial steps involved conducting an internal self-assessment of our current health department capabilities. This type of self-assessment assists health departments in gaining a comprehensive understanding of their existing systems, operations, processes, and policies, enabling them to recognize strengths and areas for improvement. Public Health foundational capabilities encompass assessment and surveillance, community partnership development, equity, organizational competencies, policy development and support, accountability and performance management, emergency preparedness and response, and communications. These foundational capabilities collectively contribute to promoting community health and well-being. Future steps include developing workgroups and teams to address any gaps identified.

Performance Management

The Performance Management team is presently in the process of refining the performance management structure for 2024. These enhancements aim to establish a departmental structure that promotes ongoing quality improvement, cultivates collaborations, and reinforces tribal sovereignty through the Cherokee Nation's inherent public health authority for collective wellbeing.

Quality Improvement

The Quality Improvement (QI) team is presently engaged in revising internal policy management procedures. This involves streamlining internal processes, standardizing documentation, and investigating software and automation alternatives.

Workforce Development

The workforce development team is in the process of completing a new CNPH onboarding program tailored for departmental hires. This initiative entails furnishing each new CNPH staff member with a comprehensive handbook, customized welcome items, and a welcome message shared within our Teams workspace. The primary aim of this program is to ensure a favorable onboarding journey for new staff, foster a deeper grasp of the department's operations among employees, and harmonize departmental protocols with HR standards.

Public Health Nursing

The public health nursing team is presently offering support for community blood pressure screenings, naloxone education and training, as well as STI prevention education. Working Together Initiative

Phase 1: Cherokee Nation Public Health (CNPH) launched *Working Together*, an initiative to bring partners together across Cherokee Nation to better understand and address the multiple social, cultural, economic, and environmental conditions that influence Cherokee well-being. A Working Together Team was then formed to review engagement outcomes, and to work towards the following goals:

- o Create a shared vision for Cherokee Wellness
- o Create a wellness framework reflective of the social and cultural determinants of health.
- o Identify indicators to determine how wellness will be measured.

Phase 2 of the project which includes finalization of Cherokee Indicators of Wellness, expanded inclusion of staff from additional programs, and initial collaborative data collection and evaluation started in February. Additional leadership from Health Services, Career Services, Community Services, Indian Child Welfare, and Natural Resources have joined the team since the last report. Phase 2 work has been focused on continued development of the framework as well as individual department meetings to identify potential measurable indicators. We currently in the data collection and identification of measures process. Working Together team met on December 12, 2023 to discuss data collection for the first quarter of 2024.

Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) Tribal Advisory Committee (TAC)

TAC Chair Deputy Chief Warner and Authorized Representative Lisa Pivec continue work with CN Government Relations staff to provide input to CDC. The Winter TAC will be held in Atlanta, GA on February 21-22, 2024. Currently preparing for TAC presentations. Continue monthly calls with TAC.

Executive Director External Board Appointments

- O Cherokee Nation Public Health Executive Director was elected to the Board of Directors representing Tribal Public Health Departments. NACCHO is the only organization dedicated to serving every local health department in the nation. In July 2023, Ms. Pivec was elected to the Executive Board of the Board of Directors.
- Public Health Executive Director was appointed to the Public Health Accreditation Board of Directors starting July 2023 and will also serve on the PHAB accreditation committee of the BOD.
- o Public Health Executive Director serves as the Cherokee Nation representative to the Southern Plain Tribal Health Board as a board member.
- o Public Health Executive Director was appointed to the board for Tahlequah Trails.

Public Health Monitoring, Surveillance, & Evaluation

School Health Profiles

- This is a system of surveys assessing school health policies and practices in the reservation, which are conducted every two years (even years) among middle and high school principals and lead health education teachers.
- O Profiles monitor the status of school health education requirements and content, physical education and physical activity, practices related to bullying and sexual harassment, school health policies related to tobacco-use prevention and nutrition, school-based health services, family engagement, and community involvement, as well as school health coordination. The MSE team is currently in the process of preparing and planning for next year's assessments.

Youth Risk Behavior Surveillance (YRBS)

- O The YRBS is a survey that tracks behaviors that can lead to poor health in students grades 9 through 12. This is conducted every two years (odd years). The MSE team has completed the current process of conducting assessments for this year. The school response rate was 94% and the overall participation rate (school response rate and student response rate) was greater than 75%, exceeding the targeted participation rate. Results have been submitted to the CDC and should be available later this year. After surveying schools, they were provided with environment sensors (vape detectors), which have been distributed.
- Adverse Childhood Experiences and Protective Childhood Experiences (ACEs/PCEs)
- o Since the YRBS and Profiles surveys are consistent and have been sustained surveillance projects within MSE, we have incorporated ACEs/PCEs related questions into these surveillance systems. This is how we developed a sustainable way to collect ACEs/PCEs surveillance data.

Projects

Data Modernization

o The MSE team has built a data modernization work plan and is in the process of completing our objectives of enhancing public health data through the modernization of technology infrastructure; cultivating Cherokee Nation Public Health's capabilities to conduct analysis with technology and supporting the use of results to improve population health; and forging communication and collaboration with stakeholders to collect and share data that provide information on conditions of public health importance.

School Health

The MSE team has drafted assessment questionnaires for the PH School Health Program that measure Student Health and Health of the School Health Environments, to be administered at Cherokee Nation Sequoyah School (Grades 8th-12th), and Cherokee Nation Immersion School (Grades 3rd-7th). The focus areas are Physical Activity. Nutrition, and Tobacco use.

Opioids

- The Johns Hopkins injection drug use study entitled "Our Stories Matter" successfully completed data collection in Sequoyah County during the spring of 2023. The community response to the project staff's presence was overwhelmingly positive, with 600 surveys collected during the second phase of data collection alone.
- The MSE Epi is currently working on data analysis (quantitative and qualitative data analyses). The team continues to hold regular meetings with the project's Community Research Council (CRC) and work closely with the CN IRB to determine culturally appropriate interpretation and dissemination of the findings.

Women, Infants, & Children (WIC)

- O A MSE data specialist is working with the WIC Farmer's Market. 610 coupons were validated and prepared for payment. The specialist is also assisting in the validation of participants' eligibility based on program requirements. Additionally, The MSE team has built an initial WIC surveillance dashboard which is expected to be presented to the WIC team for feedback in September.
- o The MSE team is working with the new WIC CIAO program. We have finalized their evaluation of the work plan and have begun data cleaning and compiling from WIC systems.

Getting to Y

o A MSE epidemiologist works with students from four High Schools within the reservation who participated in the UP for Learning's Getting to 'Y' program (GTY) during the 2022-2023 school year. Getting to 'Y' is an opportunity for students to bring meaning to their own YRBS data.

o Through youth leadership, partnerships with adults, participatory action research, and peer and community engagement, participants not only experience personal growth and build their capacity for future civic engagement but also effect sustainable change in youth behavior, community, and school culture.

Inter-Tribal Collaborations

- O Commerce Department HOPE Program: A MSE data specialist is assisted in validating participants' eligibility based on program requirements.
- Human Services OneFire Program: A MSE epidemiologist and data specialist are working with OneFire in preparation for a data visualization and management system. The OneFire team is currently finalizing a Salesforce platform that once launched will be monitored and data managed by MSE.
- o Environmental Health Community Water Survey: A MSE epidemiologist is working with the Tribal Environmental Health Office to analyze and provide recommendations on the existing community water survey.
- Wastewater Surveillance Process As part of an ongoing collaboration for internal capacity the MSE team is working with Environmental Health to develop a conceptual process for wastewater surveillance activities and testing.
- o CNHS Infection Control Clinic Syphilis Surveillance Project: A MSE epidemiologist is looking at risk factors and trends among Tribal health facilities users and building a report with the support of the Infectious Control Clinic.
- Wastewater Surveillance Process As part of an ongoing collaboration for internal capacity the MSE team is working with Environmental Health to develop a conceptual process for wastewater surveillance activities and testing.
