II. Program Highlights

a.) Motor Vehicle

- 1. Year to Date Motor Vehicle revenue for FY18 compared to FY17 as of July 31st 2018 & July 31st 2017, had an overall increase of 11.21%.
- 2. The month to month revenue comparison for July 2017 (FY17) compared to July 2018 (FY18) shows an increase of 20.02%.
- 3. The detail for all areas of revenue for motor vehicle is shown on the attached graphs.





II. Program Highlights

a. FY 2019-2023 Multi-Year Funding Agreement

Continue to work with the Office of Self Governance in DC to finalize the FY 2019-2023 Multi-Year Funding Agreement between the Cherokee Nation and the Department of Interior. Included in the Multi-Year Funding Agreement are Memorandums of Understanding with the Office of Special Trustee for the Beneficiary Processes Program (IIM) and Appraisal and Valuation Services Office for the Real Estate Appraisal Services Program.

b. Oklahoma City Area Self-Governance Coalition Meeting

The Self Governance Director attended the quarterly meeting of the Oklahoma City Area Self-Governance Coalition Meeting on August 24, 2018. Two topics of particular interest to were: (1) Proposed updates to the Sanitation Deficiency System (SDS) Guidance. Billy Hix our Oklahoma expert on this issue accompanied the SG Director to the meeting to give an update on the guidance and its impact on the Oklahoma Tribes. He is assisting the Oklahoma Coalition in the development of comments on the proposed guidance as well as developing comments specific to the Nation. The Guidance as currently drafted will impact funding to our SDS program. (2) Indian Health Care Improvement Fund (IHCIF) – These funds are allocated to the Tribes who have the greatest deficiencies/allocations and the lowest per capita IHS funding. The Self-Governance workgroup working on this issue discussed the formula and how the funding was distributed. The workgroup continues to work and will be reviewing the impact of the current formula decisions and consider additional/potential revisions to the formula.

c. Indian Health Care Improvement Fund (IHCIF)

This year there were only 40 sites across the Nation that received IHCIF funding. Out of the 40 tribes nationwide that received funding 13 were from Oklahoma. The Cherokee Nation was one of these Tribes and received \$10,937,792.

d. Staffing

As you know, the Office of Self Governance has been without staff support for some time. I am pleased to inform you that effective August 19, 2018 Ms. Eunice Ballou was named the new Self Governance Specialist. She will continue to help at the front desk in Administration until a selection is made for that position.


