New York City: Bright Lights & Bright Eyes

Over all Oregon was beautiful, the hotel was top notch, and the convention was a once-in-a-lifetime experience. - **Canned Food Drive-** The CNYLC is currently participating in a canned food drive to benefit Help in Crisis of Tahlequah.
- **Coat Drive-** The CNYLC is planning to start a coat drive this winter to benefit Help in Crisis.
- **Trail of Tears Awards for Excellence-** The CNYLC has been given the opportunity to help direct and coordinate the Trail of Tears Awards for Excellence for 2011-12 school year.
- **GSA Car Wash and Detail-** The CNYLC members would like start a fundraiser this spring or summer to wash and detail the GSA vehicles. A business plan is being developed.
- **Teen Pregnancy Resolution –** The CNYLC acknowledges that teen pregnancy is the leading issue facing many youth today. The members will be discussing, considering and potentially proposing a resolution related to this issue.

- **Mid-Year Unity-** Two delegates from the CNYLC are planning to attend Mid-Year Unity this February. The purpose of this conference is to plan the main Unity conference that is held during the summer.
- **Unity-** The CNYLC is planning on attending the Unity conference this summer, budget permitting.
