Budget Highlights

- December 2014 CNB consolidated net income of \$10.0 million was \$4.4 million above budget and \$4.2 million higher than prior year.
- CNE EBITDA of \$16.0 million was \$3.3 million above budget. Higher revenue of \$4.4 million drove the favorable variance and was driven by primarily gaming revenue at all properties with the exception of Sallisaw. Food and beverage at the Hard Rock and West Siloam Springs properties as well as retail revenue also contributed to the positive variance.
- Technology Portfolio EBITDA of \$1.2 million was \$569,000 above budget. December revenue was favorable to budget by \$2.6 million. The positive variances in both revenue and EBITDA at the Technology Portfolio are primarily due to the start of new contracts that were won in late FY14.
- CNI EBITDA was \$593,000 favorable to budget due to higher than anticipated profitability in the Manufacturing segment. Total
 revenue of \$3.4 million was \$445,000 above budget, which was the result of positive variances in the Manufacturing and Distribution
 segments.
- The CNB Parent Company EBITDA was \$315,000 unfavorable to budget, which was driven by higher employee costs related to higher medical benefit expense.
- Construction Services EBITDA of \$332,000 was favorable to budget as a result of higher revenue at CN3S. The positive variance
 was due to higher than anticipated activity from government related jobs in December.
- Combined, EBITDA at all other entities were \$125,000 above budget.

December YTD capital expenditures were \$25.3 million for all entities.

Operating Highlights

- CNE EBITDA of \$16.0 million in December was \$3.3 million favorable to budget.
- Total revenue of \$49.7 million was \$4.4 million above budget due primarily to higher than anticipated gaming activity across all
 properties with the exception of Sallisaw. Retail sales and food and beverage revenue at the West Siloam Springs and Hard Rock
 properties also contributed to the favorable variance.
- Total operating expense of \$33.7 million was \$1.2 million unfavorable to budget. The primary driver was higher costs of goods sold and gaming costs associated with higher revenue.
- Groundbreaking for the South Coffeyville casino took place on August 27th. The 17,000 square foot facility will offer 300 games. The target date to open the casino is February 16, 2015.
- CNB has agreed to lease property adjacent to the Hard Rock Casino to Woodmont Outlets, which plans to invest \$80 million into
 premium outlet shops to be called "Cherokee Outlets." The Outlets, along with a new Entertainment area, called "The District," is
 expected to be completed in 2016.
- CNB also announced plans for the Cherokee Springs Plaza, which will include retail, restaurants, auto sales lots, office space, convention space, two hotels, and a casino adjacent to the Cherokee Springs golf course in Tahlequah.
- Groundbreaking for the Roland property took place on April 29, 2014 for a new casino and hotel. The target date to open the casino is May 19, 2015, with the hotel scheduled to open later in the year.
- The Catoosa property has completed the renovation of the Cherokee hotel tower, which began on June 1st.
- The Creek casino in Tulsa is planning a \$335 million expansion including a 500 room hotel tower, new casino and restaurant, pool bar, theater and event center, with an expected completion date of 2016.

Operating Highlights

- EBITDA loss of \$654,000 was \$593,000 favorable to budget. The positive variance was primarily due to higher than anticipated profitability in the Manufacturing segment of \$421,000 associated with higher revenue and improved gross margins.
- CNI's revenue totaled \$3.4 million, which was \$445,000 above budget. This was driven by higher than budgeted revenue in the Manufacturing segment of \$284,000 due to Boeing and Bell and \$116,000 positive variance in the Distribution segment due to AT&T.
- Total operating expenses of \$4.1 million were \$148,000 lower than budget, primarily driven by lower employee costs due to several open positions and relocation of TRG employees.

Operating Highlights

- The IT Portfolio generated revenue of \$12.6 million compared to a budget of \$9.9 million.
- December EBITDA was \$1.2 million compared to a budgeted EBITDA of \$676,000. The positive variance to budget was the result of higher than expected sales-based contract wins late in FY14 and increased activity on higher profit margin contracts.
- CSG and CNT revenue of \$3.8 million was favorable to a budget by \$1.2 million and exceeded prior year by \$1.1 million. The positive budget variance was due to the start of the NOAA IT project.
- CNGS, CNTS, and CNMC revenue was \$8.3 million in December. Revenue was favorable to budget as well as prior year by \$1.3 million.
- Cherokee Nation Assurance (CNA) revenue of \$397,000 was favorable to budget by \$73,000. The favorable variance to budget was attributable to the start of new contracts won at the end of FY14.

Operating Highlights

- <u>CNSD</u> EBITDA of \$107,000 was \$58,000 favorable to budget. The favorable variance to budget was due to increased profitability on the TSA, Edgewood and SAMD contracts.
- Construction EBITDA was \$267,000 favorable to budget. This was primarily due to the favorable performance of CNCS which was a result of higher than anticipated profitability on the Central Commons and Parking project which is nearing completion.
- <u>CMS / CNHS</u> resulted in an EBITDA of \$49,000 which was favorable to budget by \$57,000. The favorable budget variance was due to the end of specific Navy contracts with lower profit margins.
- APSE net income of \$13,000 was \$73,000 below budget. This was driven by lower than expected revenue of \$521,000. This was due to \$806,000 of unrealized revenue that will be recognized in January due to issues with a key supplier.
- **CCRC** net income of \$42,000 was favorable to a budgeted breakeven. The primary driver for the positive variance was increased profitability on the Picatinny job.





- 2. Talking Leaves Job Corps was named a Gold Star Center by the National Job Corps Association for 2014. This will be the third year in a row.
- 3. One of our Vocational Training participants went from a seasonal part-time job where he worked only 20+ hours per week to a full-time position earning \$16.00 per hour.
- 4. Although the next participant has not completed CDL training, we wanted to mention him in this report. William is a learning disabled citizen who came into our office determined to change his life in order to provide for his family. He enrolled in CDL training last year, but failed his final test. William worked through the Holidays studying, determined to pass. He successfully passed the test and is now training with Central Tech! William could have been content to continue drawing social security disability but he is working hard to better himself and support his family!

c. <u>Initiatives</u>

- 1. Staff are preparing for the new Spring semester that begins in January.
- 2. Talking Leaves Job Corps continues Work Based Learning Partnership with Congressman Markwayne Mullins' office in Muskogee Oklahoma.
- 3. The first of four JD-NEG Fast track Apprenticeship trainings is scheduled for Tahlequah and will begin Feb 24th.





Private sector jobs created or retained through small business lending




Community Jobs Created or Retained Current Year to Date - 76 Total Jobs

Application submitted to US Department of Treasury **CDFI Fund for a \$1 million** grant to increase our commercial lending capacity.

Partnering with Grand Gateway Economic Development Association and the Oklahoma Department of Commerce to conduct **4 Economic Development Workshops** targeting PSO communities in the **northern counties**. These workshops will include up to 18 options for rural economic develop, including retail, main street, growing local, etc. Communities interested in more in-depth, one-on-one training will be scheduled. This model will be expanded to southern counties in the future.

Partnering with GIS to provide community economic developers with **community based economic data reports** that will including economic leakage and community sales reports. Communities will go through Commerce to access these reports and will receive training on how to use them for economic development.

NORA will be hosting a one-day summit in Pryor in March or April focusing on **education's impact on economic development.** Further information will be forthcoming.

NOTEWORTHY

The Cherokee Arts Center provides teaching space and specialized equipment for artists to increase their revenues. Year to date, **287 people have attended 36 artist taught classes** and the equipment has been used **224** times by 78 artists.

Year to date, 1,989 people have taken advantage of the Cherokee Arts Center this includes 1,187 visitors to the Spider Gallery.

The **Spider Gallery currently represents 78 artists.** The Gallery has participated in 9 events giving Cherokee artists exposure to over 1,000. Total Spider Gallery Sales are \$23,217.15 for year to date.

Artists have earned \$15,719.25 through Cherokee Arts Center and Spider Gallery activities. Tourism related small business and artist loans total \$363,405 year to date.

The Spider Gallery Store is an annex to the Gallery, which is also located in the Cort Mall. This store will showcase lower cost items made by Cherokee citizens and some of our own product lines. This will increase sales and revenue for the Gallery and increase foot traffic into the Cort Mall.

"I love the Cherokee Art Center both as an artist and as a Tahlequah resident. I can drop by with something I've made and staff members are quick to do an intake into Spider Gallery. They encourage participation by artists in demonstrating and vending creations during special events or by teaching a workshop and I get great gifts for friends and family there. Lots of public meetings are held there, too. I'm very proud of how active and vital the Center is and how beautiful Spider Gallery looks. And I'm thankful that CAC hosts Tahlequah Writers' monthly meetings. You never hear 'no,' while you always hear 'yes, we can do that.' They have a great can-do attitude"





Increased Number of Certified Indian Owned Businesses


Cherokee Nation Total Certified TERO Vendors




Certified Indian Owned Businesses Ownership






Awarded to Certified Indian Owned Businesses in 2015 -**Total Procurement Dollars** \$20,878,741.64






