

The Cherokee Nation Gaming Commission will have a meeting on March 8, 2024 at 9:30am at the Tahlequah Casino Chota Center.

Compliance Updates:

The CNGC Compliance staff that are located at the Tahlequah main office are tasked with reviewing game counts, investigative reports and CNE's policies & procedures. The Compliance department is also tasked with machine installs at each of the casinos. The In-House Progressive funds were approved by the Commission during the January 12, 2024 meeting. These funds will be reinvested into upcoming promotions for gaming patrons. Promotions for Hard Rock and corporate properties including South Coffeyville, Ramona, Grove, West Siloam Springs, Roland, Sallisaw, Tahlequah, and Fort Gibson for February and March were presented and approved. Approval was granted for advertising and tournament play for the Run Good Poker Series and the upcoming World Series of Poker Tournament, scheduled to begin in March. II. Program Highlights-477 Program Update:

Public Law 102-477 allows tribes to seamlessly integrate federal employment, training, and related services to maximize efficiency and ensure our tribal citizens receive as many services as possible. Self-Governance is currently working with departments to ensure everyone is coordinated in our efforts for effectiveness of P.L. 102-477. Self-Governance is working to maximize opportunities in this space and will continue to engage federal partners and other tribes to learn from their work.

a. Reports

Self-Governance submitted Cherokee Nations P.L. 102-477 Annual report on 12.29.23.

b. Funding Updates

On December 15, 2023, Cherokee Nation received notice of award for a Living Language Grant Program. This grant is approved for a project period of 36 months, with an annual award amount f \$300,000.00. Cherokee Nation will utilize the LLGP to implement the Cherokee Immersion Teacher Institute (CITI), which will administer professional development and extended training for current and future Cherokee language teachers. CITI will focus on enhancing Cherokee language teachers throughout the 14-county reservation and beyond.

c. Tribal Consultations, Trainings, and Calls:

Self-Governance attended the Oklahoma Self-Governance Coalition Meeting in Tulsa, OK. This meeting brings Self-Governance Tribes together to discuss updates from Bureau of Indian Affairs and Indian Health Services.
