- Licensing Attended NARA meeting and Rogers Co. ECC. Also made referrals to DF, OEH, Warmline, and Child Welfare.





ADAIR COUNTY PROJECTS:

- 1. Bell North Red Plains sent final exhibits on June 21, 2017.
- 2. Bell School South In process of Right of Way acquisition.
- 3. Bidding Springs Road Survey is currently in progress. Design to begin when survey completed.
- 4. Bunch Road Currently in bridge design.
- 5. Chewey Road NEPA is completed. The firm of Smith-Roberts Has started acquisition
- 6. Dahlonegah South NEPA has been completed. The firm of Smith-Roberts started the acquisition process November 1, 2016. Four parcels out of 22 parcels have been acquired.
- 7. Dahlonegah West- Holloway Updike and Bellen Engineers working on 60% plans.
- 8. Honey Hill Phase I The bid opening was on September 7, 2017. Four bids were submitted with T. McDonald Construction being the lowest bidder. No award has been at this time. All bidders are non TERO.
- 9. Lyon South Road Design is at 90% stage. Holloway Updike and Bellen Engineers has finalized H&H and submitted to CNDOT design.
- 10. Lyon Switch Road Design is working on 90% plans.
- 11. Malloy Hollow—Design is working with environmental services to supply information needed for the 404 application. Received preliminary relocation plans from Ozark Electric and attended Cherry Tree RWD board meeting to discuss the need to relocate the existing waterline. Final plans completed. Utility easements and R/W acquisition to begin when R/W department available.
- 12. North Salem (Bethel Road) Red Plains is revising the exhibits and easements.
- 13. Rocky Mountain School Loop Bridge Design complete. Waiting on 404 permit for NEPA to be approved.
- 14. Sally Bull Hollow Awaiting the level III archeological report so we will know how to proceed in design.
- 15. Smith Hollow Red Plains is revising the utility exhibits and easements.

CHEROKEE COUNTY PROJECTS:

COMMUNITY SERVICES COMMITTEE REPORT

- 1. Hulbert-Lost City (Grace Huddlen) –Right of Way is currently at 81% (34 parcels out of 42 acquired). Five of the remaining parcels are Restricted Indian Land and r/w packets were submitted to RES on 5/22/2017.
- 2. Mud Valley Road Aerial data has been received and submitted to Guy Engineering for design.
- 3. Northeast Fort Gibson- The NEPA process is complete. Utilities are in the process of being relocated.
- 4. Ross Street- Construction plans are at 90% stage and have been reviewed by the second level engineer (CGA Engineers). CGA has also submitted the Traffic Signal Control Plans to ODOT for their review. Guy Engineering will be acquiring the right of way on this project. They are currently preparing the r/w documents and securing appraisals. Guy submitted an updated timeline, and stated that all appraisals will be completed by 11/24/2017. Acquisition will begin thereafter.
- 5. Tenkiller School Construction is -100% complete. Project contract currently in liquidated damages. Final estimate signed awaiting processing -.

CRAIG COUNTY PROJECTS:

1. NS-4340 Road – Right of Way sent AT&T's packet to Real Estate Services October 22, 2016. All Utility Easement Applications on Trust Lands have been approved. Acquisition is 100% complete.

DELAWARE COUNTY PROJECTS:

- 1. Leach/Kenwood Road –Clearing is completed. Construction is -44.5% complete. Contrac liquidated damages began on February 11, 2017.
- 2. Kansas/Dry Creek Holloway Updike & Bellen completed all ownership changes and submitted updated easements and exhibits on 7/18/2017. Appraiser is finishing appraisals. Right of Way is preparing parcel folders to begin r/w acquisition in the next few months

MUSKOGEE COUNTY PROJECTS:

- 1. Northeast Fort Gibson- Utility relocation is moving forward.
- 2. Texanna Road Survey has been processed. Pavement borings being performed. Preliminary design underway. Right of Way completed title research for all property owners.

SEQUOYAH COUNTY PROJECTS:

 Dwight Mission/Sequoyah Landing Road – A preconstruction meeting has been scheduled for June 27th with awarded contractor JOB Construction. This project has a fixed completion date of July 31, 2017. September 15 currently under conctruction 97%

2. Moonshine Road – Four bids were received with Glover coming in the lowest at \$2,460,090.71 with a completion date of December 15, 2017 project construction NTP 9-05-2017 project is 2% complete

WASHINGTON COUNTY PROJECTS:

 Matoka Bridge (Br. #84) – Awarded to H&H Bridge Company, construction begins April 3, 2017 and is scheduled to be completed by July 21, 2017 Cherokee Nation contributed \$700,370.24 to Washington county as per the agreement between Cherokee Nation and Washington county.

III. CHEROKEE TRANSIT SYSTEM:

There are currently two van orders: order #1 – two bi-fuel conversion vans will be delivered before September 30th. Bids for 6 additional gasoline vans were received with John Vance Auto being the lowest bidder. Estimated time of delivery is December 12, 2017.






The Mortgage Assistance Program policy change was effective September 13, 2017. Significant changes include a revised first time homebuyer definition, maximum home purchase price of \$150,000 and tiered rates of down payment assistance ranging from \$10,000 to \$20,000. During FY18, the prioritization policy is in place meaning in order to receive financial assistance, a household must actively participate in credit coaching for at least 8 months.

The **iSave policy change** was also effective September 13, 2017. Significant changes include a match rate of 3:1, elimination of the MAP IDA program, and conversion of existing MAP IDAs to rehab individual development accounts allowing more flexibility for use of matching funds.

Thanks to the iSave Program, I was able to replace the siding on my home and obtain property insurance! My home was previously uninsurable because of the condition of the siding.

MAP Applications and Financial Counseling




541 families are in the home buyers' pipeline, either having completed or active in financial counseling.

Since FY07, 803 families unable to obtain a non-predatory mortgage on their own have completed self-sufficiency counseling and obtained a non-predatory mortgage.

70 families this year have finished counseling to obtain a non-predatory mortgage.

We use a **Financial Prosperity Spectrum** to measure financial coaching and asset building for MAP families.



The coaching and Homebuyers Education class were very helpful. There were a lot of things I didn't understand, but the MAP coach and trainer taught me so much.

1,705 consumer loans totaling \$1,975,216.55 have been made through the Small Business Assistance Center as of September 15th. Five of these were Foreclosure Prevention loans totaling \$84,891.18.


415 families are actively saving in iSave for home rehabilitation or home purchase. iSave is a matched savings program wherein income eligible families save a certain amount of money over a period of time and the iSave program matches the families' savings to build financial assets.

Families purchasing a home must attend an intensive **homeownership training** class. Year to date **481 families have attended these classes**, which are held throughout the Cherokee Nation.

Citizens, Cherokee Nation employees and CNB employees have the opportunity to attend financial education classes on topics ranging from spending plans, balancing checkbooks and couponing. Year to date 4,771 people have attended community and work based financial education classes.



Protecting Children, Families and the Nation

Month of August: 1,760 Children

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Programs with count interestion

OCAPS: Out-Of-District Court Advocacy and Permanency Services

- Involved in child welfare cases in non-jurisdiction counties in Oklahoma and all 50 states.
- Most work is done telephonically or electronically.

Emphasis on education about the Indian Child Welfare Act and ensuring States comply with it.

SCAPS: State Court Advocacy and Permanency Services

- Involved in child welfare cases inside the 14 counties of which all or part are within the jurisdiction of the Nation.
- Emphasis on education about the Indian Child Welfare Act and ensuring OKDHS compliance, and sometimes provide Tribal Foster Homes.
- Provides services to the families when OKDHS fails to do so or as an alternative to OK DHS services.

TCAPS: Tribal Court Advocacy and Permanency Services

- involved in child welfare cases which are wholly under the jurisdiction of the Nation and OKDHS is not involved.
- These cases originate on Indian Country or are transferred in from State district courts. Hearings are held at our Tribai Court House. Tribal Foster Homes are fully utilized.

GPA: Guardianships and Private Adoptions

- Involved in voluntary adoptions when the birth parents wish to place their child for adoption
- Monitors Guardianships and Private Adoptions for compliance with the Indian Child Welfare Act and the best interests of children.
- Serves Cherokee children and their families in Tribal Court and parts of Oklahoma.


CPS: Child Protective Services

- Receives referrals involving allegations of maltreatment of Cherokee children.
- Investigates allegations of child maltreatment in Indian Country and coinvestigates with DHS in some counties when Cherokee children are involved.

Exercise of Tribal Sovereignty

In August:

Indian Child Welfare workers went to court 521 times on behalf of Cherokee children and families.

Eligibility Notices

When a County or State's child welfare agency gets involved in the life of a family that they suspect to be Cherokee, they're required by the Indian Child Welfare Act (ICWA) to send Notice to the tribe. The tribe must then reply to confirm or deny whether the children are members of (or eligible to become members of) the tribe. The tribe has a goal of responding between 45-60 days.

Month of August

Cherokee Nation received:

- State of Oklahoma 664 notices involving 1,099 children
- Outside of Oklahoma 840 notices for 1,232 children.
- a Totaling 2,331 children and 1,504 notices.
- □ The average Response-to-Notice time this month was 77 days.

Prevention and Intervention

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
Indian Child Welfare Family Protection Services
Unit (FPS) assists families in need of hands-on
training to correct the conditions that lead to
children being removed from their home. These
services often include completing a 28 week
parenting program that discusses topics like
discipline, nutrition, budgeting, and housekeeping.
We primarily assist all our tribal CAPS cases but
can assist in State cases when a request is made.
This helps insure that families have the tools they
need to be reunited. We have also added Triple P
Parenting curriculum to our program this year.

Child Protective Services (CPS) received 373 referrals of child abuse/neglect.

373 referrals involved 639 children

- 1 of the 373 were co-investigated by OKDHS and CPS

- 7 Cherokee child(ren) were removed from Tribal land due to confirmed abuse/neglect.

Types of Certified Placement Resource Homes

Non-Relative Adoptive: Families who hope to adopt children when the children's parents' rights are terminated. These homes do not take foster placements.

Non-Relative Fost/Adopt: Families who take foster placement of children knowing their parental rights are not terminated and they could return home, but if they don't the placement family will have the first chance to adopt them.

Non-Relative Foster: Families who are willing to take in children they do not know on a temporary basis, but may last years. These families usually do not adopt children.


Relative Adoptive/Foster: Families who are related to the children and are fostering them or planning to adopt them. They do not take in children they are not related to.

Emergency/Respite: Families that take very short-term placement of children while more permanent placements are sought or when only a short-term placement is needed.
