### October 2014

### **Budget Highlights**

- October 2014 CNB consolidated net income of \$9.2 million was \$1.5 million above budget and \$880,000 higher than prior year.
- CNE EBITDA of \$15.4 million was \$1.0 million favorable to budget. Higher revenue was driven by a mix of gaming, food and beverage and retail revenue at the Hard Rock, Tahlequah, Ft. Gibson, and Ramona properties.
- Technology Portfolio EBITDA of \$1.0 million was \$348,000 above budget. October revenue was favorable to budget by \$1.7 million. The positive variances in both revenue and EBITDA at the Technology Portfolio are primarily due to the start of new contracts that were won in September 2014.
- CNI EBITDA loss of \$649,000 was below budget due to lower than anticipated revenue of \$1.2 million in the Distribution segment coming from Telecom.
- The CNB Parent Company EBITDA was \$17,000 unfavorable to budget, which was driven by higher than anticipated employee costs.
- Combined, EBITDA at all other entities was \$180,000 above budget.

### **Capital Expenditures**

October YTD capital expenditures were \$9.7 million for all entities.

### **Operating Highlights**

- CNE EBITDA of \$15.4 million in October was \$1.0 million above budget.
- Total revenue of \$49.0 million was \$1.4 million above budget due to higher than anticipated gaming, retail, and food and beverage revenue at the Hard Rock, Tahlequah, Ft. Gibson, and Ramona properties.
- Total operating expense of \$33.6 million was \$334,000 unfavorable to budget. The primary driver was higher costs of goods sold
  and gaming costs associated with higher revenue.
- Groundbreaking for the South Coffeyville casino took place on August 27th. The 17,000 square foot facility will offer 300 games and will take approximately 6 months to finish.
- CNB has agreed to lease property adjacent to the Hard Rock casino to Woodmont Outlets, which plans to invest \$80 million into premium outlet shops to be called "Cherokee Outlets." The Outlets, along with a new Entertainment area, called "The District," is expected to be completed in 2016.
- CNB also announced plans for the Cherokee Springs Plaza, which will include retail, restaurants, auto sales lots, office space, convention space, two hotels, and a casino adjacent to the Cherokee Springs golf course in Tahlequah.
- The Roland property held a groundbreaking event on April 29, 2014 for a new casino and hotel. The target date to open the casino is late May 2015, with the hotel scheduled to open later in the year.
- The Catoosa property has completed the renovation of the Cherokee hotel tower, which began on June 1st.
- The Creek casino in Tulsa is planning a \$335 million expansion including a 500 room hotel tower, new casino and restaurant, pool bar, theater and event center, with an expected completion date of 2016.

### **Operating Highlights**

- EBITDA loss of \$649,000 was \$62,000 unfavorable to budget. The negative variance was primarily due to lower than anticipated profitability in the Distribution segment of \$157,000.
- CNI's revenue totaled \$4.1 million, which was \$1.0 million below budget. This was driven by lower than budgeted revenue in the Distribution segment of \$1.2 driven by lower parts sales to AT&T...
- Total operating expenses of \$4.8 million were \$975,000 lower than budget, primarily driven by lower cost of goods sold associated with lower revenue.

### **Operating Highlights**

- The IT Portfolio generated revenue of \$11.5 million compared a budget of \$9.8 million.
- October EBITDA was \$1.0 million compared to budgeted EBITDA of \$677,000. The positive variances in both revenue and EBITDA
  are primarily due to the start of new contracts won in September 2014 that were higher than anticipated.
- CSG and CNT revenue of \$3.7 million exceeded the budgeted amount by \$1.1 million. The positive budget variance was due to the start of new contracts won in September 2014.
- CNGS, CNTS, and CNMC revenue was \$7.7 million in October. Revenue was favorable to prior year by \$1.5 million and was favorable to budget by \$796,000. The favorable variance is also attributable to the start of new contract wins.
- Cherokee Nation Assurance (CNA) revenue of \$119,000 was unfavorable to budget by \$200,000. The unfavorable variance to budget was attributable to the delayed start in new contracts, which are expected to start in November.

### **Operating Highlights**

- CNSD EBITDA of \$73,000 was \$42,000 favorable to budget. The favorable variance to budget was due to increased profitability on the Fort Benning, West Point and TSA security contracts.
- Construction EBITDA of \$156,000 was \$160,000 favorable to budget. The favorable performance of CNCS was a result of additional revenue on new contracts as well as the end of the Freezer/Chiller roof replacement job in Hawaii.
- **CMS / CNHS** resulted in an EBITDA of \$5,000 which was favorable to budget by \$18,000. The favorable budget variance was due to additional billable hours in October and improved cost control measures.
- APSE net income of \$29,000 was \$40,000 above budget. This was primarily driven by lower operating expenses of \$59,000, which
  was due to receiving better pricing on finalized orders.
- <u>CCRC</u> net loss of \$1,000 was favorable to budget by \$40,000 due to higher than anticipated profitability on construction projects. Revenue was below budget due to decreased activity on the Picatinny projects. Revenue is expected to return to budgeted levels next month.





### Community Jobs Created or Retained Five Year Period 2010-2015 - 710 Total Jobs




#### Community Jobs Created or Retained Current Year to Date - 70 Total Jobs




### **Economic Investment in Local Communities**

#### **NOTEWORTHY**

The Cherokee Arts Center provides teaching space and specialized equipment for artists to increase their revenues. Year to date, **50 people have attended 11 artist taught classes** and the equipment has been used 175 times. Year to date, **816 people** have taken advantage of the Cherokee Arts Center.

The **Spider Gallery currently represents 76 artists.** The Gallery has participated in 9 events giving Cherokee artists exposure to over 1,000. Total Spider Gallery Sales are \$5,915.14 for year to date.

**Artists have earned \$4,949.50** through Cherokee Arts Center and Spider Gallery activities. Tourism related small business and artist loans total \$357,405 year to date.




