

Cultural Tourism Update Cherokee Nation Tribal Council Education and Cultural Committee March 12, 2012

Projects in Action

- The restoration phase of the Cherokee National Prison and Interpretive Center was completed in November. Exhibits will be installed in February and a ribbon cutting is tentatively scheduled for March 2012.
- Restoration planning for the Cherokee National Capitol that will utilize \$150,000 Save America's
 Treasures Grant is currently underway. Exhibit concept work is currently underway.
- Currently working with Fossil to produce a Cherokee Nation branded syllabary watch that will be available by summer 2012. (Mock up of the watch is attached)
- Cherokee Nation Gift Shops are currently working on several new t-shirt designs that will be available late spring or early summer.
- The Cherokee Compass program will launch in the spring to promote day-trip tour packages. The
 compass program will feature incentives focused on CN owned sites as well as the Cherokee Heritage
 Center and will offer discounts to guests from area merchants in an effort to promote economic
 development in the 14 counties.
- Cultural Tourism's new smart phone application is scheduled to launch mid April.
- Working with Tahlequah Main Street and the Tahlequah Chamber on updated signage to promote downtown Tahlequah. Also, working on QR code signage for our sites that ties in with Tahlequah Main Street.
- Sponsorship solicitation has begun for the Cherokee Art Market with media sponsors already in place.
- CNCT currently has close to 40 groups booked for tours so far this fiscal year, 13 of which have already taken a tour. This equates to about 3100 individuals. We also have 11 education tours booked for FY2012, which equates to about 500 children.

Marketing/Public Relations

- Cultural Tourism's Facebook page continues to flourish with close to 6,000 fans. CNCT is averaging 400 page visits and more than 100 interactions per week. Our weekly trivia Tuesdays and Cherokee Word of the Week continue to be fan favorites.
