



Employment Programs



The month of September was a busy one for Career Services Staff. We began to prepare for the end of fiscal year transition early in the month and then ended with a Staff Development and Team Building training day. Career Services Staff each attended one day of training held at Cherokee Casino West Siloam on September 27th and 28th. Presentations were given by each of our programs including Employment, Vocational, Recovery, Economic Development and QUEST, Grants and Compliance, Youth and Employability Skills. Staff were treated to lunch while learning new

Our Career Specialists have been diligently working with their participants and encouraging their attendance at one of the many EMPLOYABLITY SKILLS CLASSES that were offered to those who will be transitioning off of their Work Experience Program. Many of our participants took full advantage of this class to get assistance with resume building, mock-interviewing, Dress for Success, and registration with OESC and OK CAREER GUIDE. We have received positive feedback from employers who have interviewed participants for full-time employment saying "the mock-interviews helped and they answered questions very well". To date we have 51 participants with "letters of intent to hire" and 30 participants who have already obtained full-time employment and are on the job.

Career Services worked in conjunction with Human Resources to host a RECRUITMENT INTERVIEW EVENT on Tuesday, October 17th in Tahlequah. This event was specifically for Work Experience participants who are actively seeking full-time employment with Cherokee Nation. The turnout was great and we are hopeful that this event will lead to high-quality jobs for our transitioning participants.




Representatives from Career Services Employment and Training Programs attended the Inter Tribal event hosted at the Hard Rock Casino in Catoosa.

Wildland Fire Program

Personnel

The Wildland Fire program has nine permanent staff members and five vacant positions. We will receive funding for an additional five positions in FY 2024. In conjunction with the Bureau of Indian Affairs, we have trained over 50 new wildland firefighters over the past year. These firefighters work on a call-when-needed basis within the Cherokee Nation reservation or are placed with other Tribal programs in eastern Oklahoma to bolster the overall workforce.

Fire personnel have recently completed a Wildland Pumps and Water Use course and an Engine Operator course. We will be hosting a basic firefighter course at the Talking Leaves Job Corps on November 6-10.

Fire Suppression

- · Responded to 274 wildfires for the Calendar Year.
- Assisted with fire suppression in Arizona, Montana, Minnesota, Michigan, and throughout Oklahoma.

Fire Prevention

The prevention program has completed educational events at 10 elementary/middle schools and conducted 2 community events. We have four additional school programs coming up, including two in collaboration with the City of Tahlequah Fire Department. These events aim to educate children and their families about the proper use of fire and how to prevent potentially catastrophic wildfires. The prevention program has also been actively investigating human-caused fires to determine the specific cause and origin.

Fuels Management

Preparation for annual prescribed burns and mechanical treatments is underway. These projects will occur on Restricted lands, Tribal trust lands, and Tribal fee lands throughout the reservation. A significant project for the fuels staff is to complete phase 2 of 3 treatments at the Sequoyah Hunting Preserve (SHP). The phase 2 treatment is a prescribed burn of 1,870 acres. The SHP treatments seek to reduce hazardous wildland fuels while also enhancing wildlife habitat and restoring the ecological integrity of the preserve.

Community Economic Impact






Small Business Lending Impact 2010 through 2024by County


