


Community Youth Applications by County

Programs with Court Interaction

OCAPS: Out-Of-District Court Advocacy and Permanency Services

- Involved in child welfare cases in non-jurisdiction counties in Oklahoma and all 50 states.
- Most work is done telephonically or electronically.
- Emphasis on education about the Indian Child Welfare Act and ensuring States comply with it.

SCAPS: State Court Advocacy and Permanency Services

- Involved in child welfare cases inside the 14 counties of which all or part are within the jurisdiction of the Nation.
- Emphasis on education about the Indian Child Welfare Act and ensuring OKDHS compliance, and sometimes provide Tribal Foster Homes.
- Provides services to the families when OKDHS fails to do so or as an alternative to OK DHS services.

TCAPS: Tribal Court Advocacy and Permanency Services

- Involved in child welfare cases which are wholly under the jurisdiction of the Nation and OKDHS is not involved.
- These cases originate on Indian Country or are transferred in from State district courts. Hearings are held at our Tribal Court House. Tribal Foster Homes are fully utilized.


GPA: Guardianships and Private Adoptions

- Involved in civil adoption cases to include voluntary adoption, involuntary adoption and birth parent adoptions.
- Monitors Guardianships and Private Adoptions for compliance with the Indian Child Welfare Act and the best interests of children.
- Serves Cherokee children and their families in Tribal Courts and State Courts throughout the United States.

CPS: Child Protective Services

- Receives referrals involving allegations of maltreatment of Cherokee children.
- Investigates allegations of child maltreatment in Indian Country and co-investigates with DHS in some counties when Cherokee children are involved.


1,543 Children with Assigned ICW Workers



In December

Indian Child Welfare workers went to court 427 times on behalf of Cherokee children and families. Indian Child Welfare staff worked on cases in 32 states.

Eligibility Notices, Prevention, & Intervention

When a county or state's child welfare agency gets involved in the life of a family that they suspect to be Cherokee, they are required by the Indian Child Welfare Act (ICWA) to send notice to the tribe. The tribe must then reply to confirm or deny whether the children are members of (or eligible to become members of) the tribe.

Currently, with 7 case workers processing approximately 200-300 pieces of mail per month, response times may vary due to vacancies and depending on the amount of mail received. The tribe has a goal of responding between 45-60 days.

In December

Cherokee Nation received:

465 notices involving 842 children from the State of Oklahoma.

826 notices involving 1,373 children from locations outside of Oklahoma.

1,291 notices involving 2,215 children in total.

The average response-to-notice time this month was 26 days.

Indian Child Welfare Family Protection Services Unit (FPS) assists families in need of handson training to correct the conditions that lead to children being removed from their home.
These services often include completing a 28-week parenting program that discusses topics
like discipline, nutrition, budgeting, and housekeeping. We primarily assist all our tribal CAPS
cases but can assist in state cases when a request is made. This helps ensure that families
have the tools they need to be reunited. We have also added the Triple P Parenting
curriculum to our program.

In December

FPS served 12 children and 8 families.

Child Protective Services

In December

Child Protective Services (CPS) received 322 referrals of child abuse/neglect.

322 referrals involved 578 children.

0 of the 322 were co-investigated by OKDHS and CPS.


13 of the 322 were investigated by CPS in Indian Country.

218 of the 322 referrals were from within reservation boundaries.

33 of the 322 referrals are those for which ICW is solely responsible.

- 4 Cherokee child(ren) were removed from tribal land due to confirmed abuse/neglect.
- 0 child death(s) occurred from within the reservation boundaries.
- 0 near death(s) occurred from within the reservation boundaries.

Types of Abuse/Neglect Reported




Certification & Placement Services

(Foster & Adoptive Homes)

Types of Certified Placement Resource Homes

- •Non-Relative Foster: Families who are willing to take in children they do not know on a temporary basis, but may last years. These families usually do not adopt children.
- •Relative Foster: Families who are related to the children and are fostering them. They do not take in children they are not related to.
- •Non-Relative Adoptive: Families who hope to adopt children when the children's parents' rights are terminated. These homes take placements of children who are legally free for adoption.
- <u>Emergency</u>: Homes that take placement on an emergency basis not to exceed 48 hours.
- •Respite: Homes that take placement on a temporary basis, not to exceed 10 days.




Court Docket Appearances




Case Load by County







Mrs. Lawson is a Cherokee citizen living near Skiatook, OK in Washington County. Mrs. Lawson applied to the SFC program in August 2021 with a partially collapsed septic tank. A site evaluation was completed and a Purchase Order was issued in September 2021. In December, Jerry Excavation pumped out and crushed the existing septic tank and installed a new 1000 gallon septic tank in accordance with current regulations.

- 1. Rocky Mountain School Loop Bridge (TCM Dist. 7) Estimated project cost is \$1,206,956 The project is 10% completed. Drilling shafts and placing concrete pier cap one completed.
- 2. Dahlonegah South Road (TCM Dist. 7) Estimated project cost is \$5,308,775. All utilities have been relocated except Windstream, it is delayed due to a supply shortage for essential materials.

CHEROKEE COUNTY PROJECTS:

- 1. Northeast Fort Gibson Phase II (TCM Dist. 1 & 4) Estimated project cost is \$4,288,414 H&G Paving Contractors, Inc. was awarded the project for \$2,840,987.40 with a construction ending date of December 3, 2022. Construction is 5% completed with clearing, grubbing, and temporary fence is underway.
- 2. Hulbert Lost City Road (TCM Dist. 1) Estimated project cost is \$7,094,832. Placing of concrete structures and fill material. The project is 53% complete. Project is in Liquidated damages as of December 2, 2021
- 3. Mud Valley (TCM Dist. 1 & 3) Estimated project cost is \$14,320,000. Right of Way acquisition of 79 total parcels is 79% acquired. Parcels not acquired have been submitted to the District Attorney's office for condemnation.

CRAIG COUNTY PROJECTS:

1. NS4410 Road (TCM Dist.11) – Estimated project cost is \$5,597,000. The waterline relocation has slowed due to weather and rock excavation. Estimated completion date will likely be extended to the end of March 2022.

MAYES COUNTY PROJECTS:

1. Chimney Rock Hollow (TCM Dist. 9)—Estimated project cost is \$8,685,924. Project is 42% complete: Contractor is back filling RCB's and side drains and working on subgrade and aggregate base.

Contractor continued asphalt placement and temporary centerline striping and construction signage has been placed to remove the Road Closure from E1050 Road to E1020 Road.

Financial Coaching



393 families are in the homebuyers' pipeline, having either completed or are currently active in financial counseling.

YTD, 34 families have finished counseling and obtained a non-predatory mortgage.



Families using MAP to purchase a home must attend a comprehensive homeownership training. To date, in FY22 53 people have attended 16 virtual classes.

Employees and the public have the opportunity to attend financial education classes on topics ranging from creating spending plans to balancing checkbooks. FY22 to date, 6

people have attended 3 community and work based financial education classes.

iSave Program

iSave is a mechanism for eligible Cherokee citizens to update and rehabilitate the home they own. iSave is a matched savings program in which participants save money over a period of time and the iSave program matches the families' savings to build financial assets. 58 families are actively saving in iSave for home rehabilitation and 8 households have received matching funds to make home repairs or improvements in FY22.

Matching funds can be used for anything that increases the value of the primary residence, for example, a storm shelter, flooring, fencing, sidewalks, major appliance replacement, roofing, plumbing, etc.


