Budget Highlights

- May 2013 CNB consolidated net income of \$8.0 million was 23% unfavorable to a budget of \$10.4 million.
- CNE net income of \$8.5 million was \$2.1 million lower than budget. Lower than budgeted revenue of \$818,000 in addition to higher
 than budgeted expenses related to increased employee expense as well as costs related to the widening project of Highway 75 near
 Ramona drove the variance.
- The Technology Portfolio experienced net income of \$433,000, which was 16.0% above budget due to higher than budgeted awarded contracts.
- CNB Parent company net loss of \$587,000 was \$235,000 unfavorable to budget. The budget variance was driven by unrealized profits from the purchase of new, diversified businesses. The budget included \$250,000 in additional profits due to investments in new businesses. As the strategic direction has changed, those profits will not be realized for the remainder of the year.
- · Combined, all other entities were below budget.

Operating Highlights

- CNE net income of \$8.5 million in May was \$2.1 million unfavorable to budget.
- Total revenue of \$47.2 million was \$818,000 unfavorable to budget due to higher than budgeted promotional allowances and lower than budgeted gaming revenue.
- Total operating expense of \$34.6 million was 4% unfavorable to budget primarily due to higher gaming related expense as well as costs associated with the Highway 75 construction project near Ramona.
- The new hotel tower at Catoosa is now completely opened.
- The Choctaw casino in Pocola expanded its gaming floor from 1,400 to 2,500 games. This could negatively affect gaming activity at the Roland casino.
- The Creek Casino in Tulsa is planning a \$250 million expansion including a 500-room hotel tower, new casino and restaurant, pool bar, theater and event center, with an expected completion date of early 2015.

Operating Highlights

- Net loss was \$379,000 compared to a budgeted net loss of \$332,000.
- CNI's revenue totaled \$5.0 million in May 2013 which was consistent with budget.
- Total operating expenses of \$5.3 million was 1% above budget.
- Manufacturing continues to perform below budget and was partially offset by higher profitability in Distribution Services.

Operating Highlights

- The IT Portfolio generated revenue of \$9.1 million compared a budget of \$7.8 million.
- May EBITDA was \$578,000 compared to budgeted EBITDA of \$493,000. The May EBITDA margin of 6.4% was consistent with budget.
- CSG and CNT revenue of \$3.3 million was favorable to prior year by \$136,000. The variance was attributable to additional contract
 opportunities being awarded.
- CNGS and CNTS revenue of \$5.7 million was \$1.8 million favorable to budget. The favorable budget variances are due to higher than anticipated contract volume during FY13.
- CSG submitted a proposal to the U.S. Geological Survey Nation for scientific support services for the earth resources observation and science center. This proposal is valued at \$13 million over 5 years.
- CNA was awarded a new contract with the Southwestern Power Administration to begin work in June 2013. This contract is a firm fixed price contract with a base year and four option years. Total value of the contract is \$1.6 million.

Operating Highlights

- <u>CNSD</u> net loss of \$17,000 was unfavorable to a budgeted net income of \$100,000. Decreased activity in the CNRW. AMCOM, and SAMD contracts contributed to lower than budgeted net income.
- **CNCS** resulted in a net income of \$130,000, which was favorable to budgeted net income of \$52,000. The unfavorable variance was due to higher than budgeted activity on the Dover AFB contracts.
- Mobility Plus resulted in a net loss of \$64,000 compared to budgeted net income of \$57,000. The budget variance was primarily
 the result of lower than anticipated revenue of \$199,000.
- <u>CMS / CNHS</u> resulted in a net income of \$7,000 compared to a budgeted net loss of \$18,000. Higher revenue and better margins contributed to the favorable budget variance.
- APSE net loss of \$21,000 in May 2013 compared to a budgeted net loss of \$3,000. Lower revenue and higher employee cost
 contributed to the unfavorable budget variance.
- CCRC net income of \$53,000 was unfavorable to a budget of \$194,000. Gross Margins were lower than budget due to the concentration of construction revenue during the month, which have lower margins, as a percent of total revenue. May 2013 revenue was \$2.7 million compared to budget of \$1.8 million. Higher revenue was the result of revenue recognized on the Picatinny construction projects and on the BIA dormitory project. In addition revenue was recorded on a Puerto Rico surveillance camera system during the month.

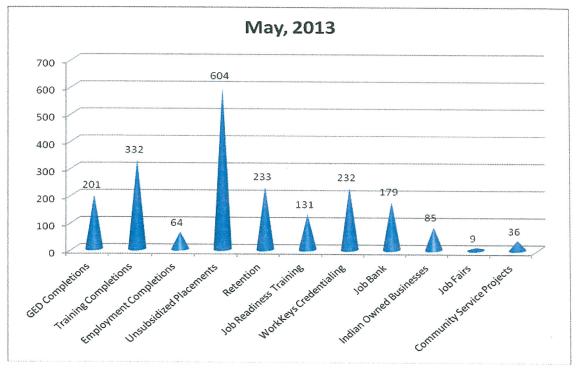

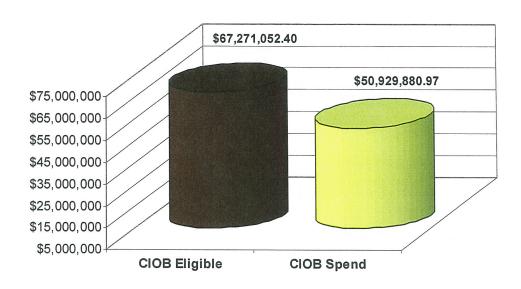
b. Notable accomplishments:

 - 3. TERO met with Southern Plains Tribes to prepare for hosting the **National TERO Conference** on June 30-July 3rd.
 - 4. **Electronic notification to TERO certified Indian-owned businesses** when a procurement opportunity they qualify for posts on www.cherokeebids.org. Notification will be through email and text messaging. The first step in coding vendors has been complete and Information Systems is working on the notification. Training for departments and testing should be completed this summer with full implementation before the end of the fiscal year.

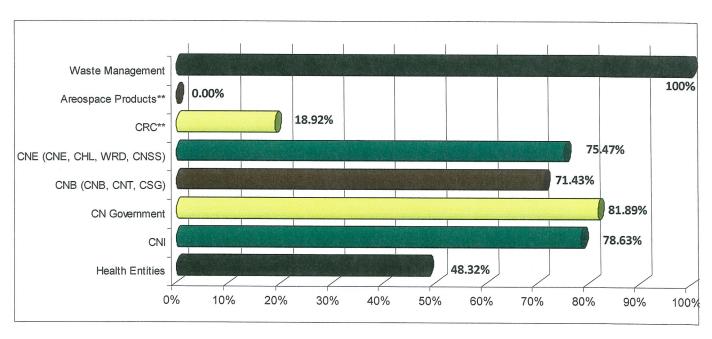

Future plans/new initiatives

1. Artists as Entrepreneurs:

- a. Working with the Bradford Exchange to test the market for a **Cherokee coin series**. Still in discussion stages. Anticipated outcomes of this project are a revenue stream for the Cherokee Arts Center and income for local Cherokee artists.
- b. Entering into discussions with Oklahoma Israel Exchange regarding cultural exchange and commercial marketing distribution channels for Cherokee artists.
- c. Entering discussions with the **Jewish Federation of Tulsa** to discuss marketing distribution channels for Arts Gallery and Cherokee artists.
- d. Arts of the Avenue was a success with 25 Cherokee artists and 2 Youth Cherokee artists, 2 non-Cherokee artists, and 18 non-Native artists with 2 non-Native youth artists. In addition to artists, the event had 3 Cherokee food vendors (2 of which were TERO), 2 non-Native food vendors, 8 Cherokee musicians, 2 Native musicians, and 10 non-Native musicians performed.

2. Entrepreneurship Competitions:

- a. **Youth Entrepreneur Day** will be scheduled for Tahlequah and we are working with Rogers State University Innovation Center to coordinate a second day in the northern counties to encourage more widespread competition.
- b. **Entrepreneurship Competition** for adults is under design. We will be seeking vendor sponsorship for this event and anticipate cash prizes to start or expand a business. This event will be held in conjunction with similar events throughout the state in the fall 2013.

Please note in the commercial account we currently have approximately \$700,000 in available commercial funds and receive approximately \$75,000 in monthly payments. As of June 7, we have approximately 1.2 million in pending loan requests, some of which are likely to be approved in the next month. If this increased need for small business financing continues, we will likely have to reduce maximum loan amounts and prioritize funding.

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US Labor Department's Office of Disability Employment Policy announces National Disability Employment Awareness Month October 2013

Everybody's fighting some kind of stereotype, and people with disabilities are no exception. The difference is that barriers people with disabilities face begin with society's attitudes --- attitudes often rooted in misinformation and misunderstandings.

People with disabilities are the largest minority group in the nation and are uniting as an economic and social power. Individuals with disabilities are neighbors, friends, classmates, family members and co-workers. The power is great...we've changed the face of dollar bills:







We helped pass the Civil Rights Act of 1964. AND we've made society better for everyone, not just people with disabilities. For example:

Curb cuts designed for wheelchair users are also used by people with baby carriages, delivery people, traveling/airline passengers with luggage, and people on skateboards and roller blades, etc.



- Automatic door openers (like those you use to enter/exit Wal-Mart);
- Garage door openers;
- Remote control for televisions, air conditioners, radio/stereo, etc.

Benefits of vocational rehabilitation services include increased earnings, reduced public assistance use and costs, and increased tax contribution. Other benefits include increased consumer spending and economic stimulation occurring as a result of a consumer going to work. For every dollar spent on VR services, \$21 dollars are returned to society.
