LEGISLATIVE ACT 16-07

AN ACT AMENDING LEGISLATIVE ACT #26-06 AUTHORIZING THE COMPREHENSIVE BUDGET FOR FISCAL YEAR 2007 – Mod. 5; AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CHEROKEE NATION:

SECTION 1. TITLE AND CODIFICATION

This legislative act shall be titled and codified as "An Act Amending Legislative Act #26-06 Authorizing the Comprehensive Budget for Fiscal Year 2007 – Mod. 5".

SECTION 2. PURPOSE

The purpose of this amendment is to authorize and approve the use of funds, subject to the availability of such funds, in accordance with Section 4, changing the amounts of certain cost centers approved in the "Comprehensive Budget Act for Fiscal Year 2007" or subsequent amendment. The cumulative total of the budget is increased by \$18,249,242 for a total budget authority of \$395,401,893. The following items are identified as estimated General Fund sources in excess of appropriated uses to wit:

SECTION 3. LEGISLATIVE HISTORY

The provisions of compliance, policy of accountability, authorities and severability provided in Legislative Act #26-06 are applicable to this amendment.

SECTION 4. FUNDING AUTHORIZATIONS

The changes reflect increases to cost centers set forth in the program budget justifications incorporated herein. This amendment changes the total amount of the comprehensive budget authorization by an increase of \$18,249,242, to wit:

- A. An increase in the General Fund budget authority of \$6,144,951 related to several program's carryover funding as well as several new initiatives. Vetoed Severable provision increasing to 1010/460 by \$1,500,000. See attachment and written a bjections.

 B. A net decrease in the Motor Vehicle Tay Fund budget authority of \$113.552 related to
- B. A net decrease in the **Motor Vehicle Tax Fund** budget authority of <\$113,552> related to carryover adjustments and prior year revenue apportionments.
- C. An increase in the **Tribal Force Account Fund** budget authority of \$53,654 related to the Environmental Protection Commission.
- D. An increase in the Enterprise Fund budget authority of \$50,000 related to the Landfill.
- E. An increase in the **DOI-General Fund** budget authority of \$7,900,350 related to special construction funding and indirect cost shortfall funding for Sequoyah High School as well as carryover authority on the fire fighter program.
- F. An increase in the **DOI-Self Governance Fund** budget authority of \$235,739 to transfer funds related to SHS shortfall of indirect cost funding, additional realty funding and a new Mineral Assessment grant related to the Wind Energy Development Project.

- G. An increase in the IHS Self Governance Health Fund budget authority of \$95,000 related to an Optometry contract with Northeastern State University.
- H. An increase in the **I.H.S. Self-Governance T.E.H. Fund** budget authority of <u>\$77,021</u> related to a solid waste cleanup project.
- I. An increase in the DHHS General budget authority of \$186,274 related to the Compassion Capital Fund prior year carryover funding.
- J. An increase in the NAHASDA Fund budget authority of \$3,869,805 related to Housing Authority's Mortgage Assistance and Title VI Subsidy from the 2005 Indian Housing Plans.
- K. A decrease in the Capital Projects Fund budget authority of <\$250,000> pursuant to a change in accounting treatment of the Pow-Wow grounds improvement project.

SECTION 5. PROVISIONS AS CUMULATIVE

The provisions of this Act shall be cumulative to existing law.

SECTION 6. SEVERABILITY

The provisions of this Act are severable and if any part or provision hereof shall be held void the decision of the court so holding shall not affect or impair any of the remaining parts or provisions of this Act.

SECTION 7. EFFECTIVE DATE: EMERGENCY DECLARED

It being immediately necessary for the welfare of the Cherokee Nation, the Council hereby declares that an emergency exists, by reason whereof this Act shall take effect immediately upon its approval and signatures.

SECTION 8. SELF-HELP CONTRIBUTIONS

To the extent that this Act involves programs or services to citizens of the Nation or others, self-help contributions shall be required, unless specifically prohibited by the funding agency, or a waiver is granted due to physical or mental incapacity of the participant to contribute.

Dear Speaker Frailey and Council Members:

I am returning the enactments passed by the Tribal Council at the regular meeting held on March 12, 2007 as required by our Constitution. The Cherokee Constitution (Article V, Section 11) requires that every enactment approved by the majority of the Council be presented to the Principal Chief before it becomes effective. I have carefully considered each enactment and I have approved all of them as follows, with the exception of a rider in one (1) legislative act.

APPROVED RESOLUTIONS

- 1. Resolution No. 26-07, A Resolution Authorizing the Bureau of Indian Affairs (BIA) to Revise and Update the Cherokee Nation's Inventory of Indian Reservation Roads.
- 2. Resolution No. 27-07, A Resolution Confirming the Renomination of John T. Cripps as a District Judge of the Cherokee Nation District Court.
- 3. Resolution No. 28-07, A Resolution Authorizing Commerce Staff to Develop and Submit a Loan Application to USDA to Replenish Funds Available for Small Businesses.
- 4. Resolution No. 29-07, A Resolution Authorizing Cherokee Nation Environmental Programs to Submit a Formal Grant Application to the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service for a Tribal Wildlife Grant.
- 5. Resolution No. 30-07, A Resolution Authorizing a Grant of Easement for Right of Way Over Tribal Trust Land in Adair County Known as CMS-32 Between Cherokee Nation and Fred and Ronda Holtz, for Access.

OTHER LEGISLATION

1. <u>Legislative Act No. 16-07</u>, An Act Amending Legislative Act #26-06 Authorizing the Comprehensive Budget for Fiscal Year 2007 – Mod. 5; and Declaring an Emergency.

This budget Act contains an item that has been vetoed on two prior occasions: \$1.5 million for a second special staff bonus for government employees in this fiscal year. The history of this provision is long and contentious:

10/26/06 - double bonus rider added to Budget Modification #1 in Committee

11/13/06 - passed in Budget Modification #1 at full Council; vetoed

12/12/06 - veto sustained

12/14/06 - double bonus rider added to Budget Modification #3 in Committee

01/22/07 - passed in at full Council; vetoed

02/12/07 - veto sustained

02/23/07 - double bonus rider added to Budget Modification #5 in Committee

03/12/07 - passed in Budget Modification at full Council

I have, in each instance, expressed my objections to this item as required by our Constitution. In each instance my veto has been sustained. For part of the Council to continue down this path is irresponsible, destructive to the Nation's operations, and an abuse of legislative authority. Certain Councilors have proposed positive legislative alternatives, and these overtures have been repeatedly ignored by the majority. Councilors have repeatedly requested separation of the vote on this measure which was rejected in each case. Another alternative offered by a Councilor was to convert the fund into a program that perhaps we could all agree upon. This was also dismissed by the Council. When reasonable people disagree, the responsible course is to constructively work together to reach a solution. I stand ready to do so.

This "second bonus" item has a unique and distinct identity, evidenced by its becoming a rider to three separate Legislative Acts of the Council (two vetoed Acts, and now this Act). It has become of such distinct character that it may become a rider to any Act of the Council. Enactments may either be approved or returned with objections from the Principal Chief to the Council (Article VI, Section 10, Cherokee Nation Constitution). 25 CNCA § 21 requires that each Act include a section stating that the provisions of each Act are severable. This Act contains this Severability section (Section 6).

I am hereby returning my objections to this rider or provision called "Employee Appreciation, \$1,500,000" to Legislative Act No. 16-07. I have no objections to all other provisions that were enacted, and will faithfully execute them. My objections to this provision follow:

I originally proposed a \$2.1 million bonus for employees, to cover both the bonus and other associated costs. However, it appears that some council members did not understand that proper accounting practices dictate that we charge our fringe and indirect rate equally and mistakenly promised \$1000 to every employee. Now, to make up for council members' promises, the Cherokee people are being asked to spend \$1.5 million to cover up for that mistake. That's \$1.5 million to be added on to a range of other improvements in employee compensation in this year:

- a. A special bonus of \$2,100,000
- b. Merit increases of approximately \$2,280,000
- c. Minimum wage increases of approximately \$270,000
- d. Christmas gift increased to \$50 each, or approximately \$110,000

e. Performance Incentive and Exceptional Service Awards per year of approximately \$490,000 (estimate based upon actual 2006)

I am responsible for administrating employee compensation. In doing so, I must ensure that compensation is fair, competitive and responsible, and that personnel costs are contained. This has been an unprecedented year for bonuses and pay increases. We have done it all this fiscal year: adjusted for better minimum wages, granted across-the-board bonuses and gifts, and paid employees for good performance. This is as it should be, because this has been a great year for the Cherokee Nation.

However, we must keep in mind what our jobs are as elected officials. It is not our job to try to buy votes from employees by adding bonus on top of bonus. But the Council, by refusing to separate out the double bonus from the rest of the budget, has put important programs on hold. Instead of voting separately on the double bonus, they have tried the old political tactic of lumping the double bonus in with projects like water lines in Rocky Mountain, cancer and diabetes treatment money and mortgage assistance. A few Councilors have decided to hold the entire budget hostage. I think they have forgotten that we work for the Cherokee citizens.

Further, many of the Cherokee Nation employees are upset that the bonus, which is supposed to represent a thank you for a job well done, has been turned into a political football. This issue is deliberately being used to divide the Council and draw attention away from the good work employees do. Cherokees who are not employees have contacted our programs concerned about a second bonus. They, rightly, have reminded us that we should be dealing with the challenges that face <u>all</u> Cherokees.

Our employees are well deserving of the record increases we have approved and allocated this year. I am proud of their dedication and service to the Cherokee people. Our employees often selflessly go above and beyond their required jobs to help Cherokee families in need. Many of these employees work hours and hours past their normal work times on weekends and nights to make sure Cherokee families have water and shelter. These employees don't go to these great lengths because they have something to get out of it for themselves — they do this work because it is in their hearts. They are dedicated to serving the Cherokee Nation—and we should learn from their example.
