COUNCIL OF THE CHEROKEE NATION

A RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING CHEROKEE NATION COMMUNITY SERVICES TO SUBMIT AN APPLICATION FOR COMMUNITY SERVICES BLOCK GRANT APPROPRIATION OF AMERICAN RECOVERY AND REINVESTMENT ACT FUNDS

WHEREAS, the Cherokee Nation since time immemorial has exercised the sovereign rights of selfgovernment in behalf of the Cherokee people;

WHEREAS, the Cherokee Nation is a federally recognized Indian Nation with a historic and continual government to government relationship with the United States of America;

WHEREAS, the Cherokee Nation recognizes a need to provide services to combat the central causes of poverty;

WHEREAS, the Cherokee Nation Community Services Group is applying for funding in the amount of \$452,874 to enhance the capacity of existing services that address the social, physical, and economic needs of its citizens, families, and communities.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CHEROKEE NATION, that the Council of the Cherokee Nation authorizes an application for funding to the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services and that the Principal Chief (or his designee) is authorized to negotiate and execute all official documents in this regard.

Cherokee Nation Plan for Recovery Act Funds "ROPE" Program Community Services Block Grant FY 2009 – 2010

Goals:

The Cherokee Nation (CN) Recovery Act Plan includes the following goals and program activities for the remainder of fiscal year 2009 and all of fiscal year 2010. The purpose of the ROPE (Rise Out of Poverty forEver) program is to ameliorate the effects of poverty among young people and their families in selected Cherokee Nation schools and communities.

- Establish partnerships with rurally, isolated county schools districts and the CN Sequoyah School to address poverty-related behaviors and mindsets that affect student learning.
- 2. Develop a culturally-based case management model that will increase the capacity of CN direct service workers to more effectively interrupt the cycle of poverty among tribal members.

Program Activities:

Goal 1 - Establish partnerships with rurally, isolated county school districts

- Meet quarterly with superintendents of 5 county schools districts in Adair, Cherokee, Delaware, Mayes, Sequoyah counties and the CN tribal school, Sequoyah School, to implement the Rise Out of Poverty forEver (ROPE) program to serve approximately 275 middle school (grades 6 – 8) students.
- Host a two day Bridges Over Poverty conference for interested school personnel (administrators, teachers, aides, parents) and select representatives from the school to participate in the advanced Training Certification of Teachers workshops.
- The Trainer and School Coordinator Consultants will implement the new curriculum, Bridges Over Poverty material, Bizworld & Bizwiz, field trips, Cherokee Job Awareness Day, business speakers, student incentives, and other special activities focused on instilling a desire for a future life out of poverty.
- Provide emergency funding to families that keep children from attending school (e.g. head lice treatment, detergent and other cleaning supplies, transportation, food, special clothing/shoes, medical supplies, temporary mental health and family counseling, etc) that are not provided by the school, CN tribal program or civic agency.

Enhance services of the Bright Futures Truancy Prevention Program

Goal 2 Develop a culture based case management model

- Convene tribal elders, "Guardians of Cherokee Lifeways", to work with a team of CN direct service workers to develop a new case management approach that is grounded in tribal values and cultural attributes.
- Cultural Content Writer and Facilitator will facilitate a working group and develop the case management model based on input from CN direct service programs (Education, Human Service, Career Service, Community Service, Health departments).
- Field test the new case management model hosting an overnight outdoor adventure for 6 groups of 15 young people that will feature Cherokee lifeway activities emphasizing tribal values and cultural attributes focused on instilling a desire for a future life out of poverty.
- Cultural Content Writer and Facilitator will refine the new case management model and assist in the presentation at a CN Conference.

The ROPE program will serve low-income young people and families that live in the fourteen county jurisdictional area of northeastern Oklahoma. The five rural school districts selected for implementation are in the counties with the highest Cherokee population, the lowest level of academic achievement, and the highest poverty in Oklahoma.

These two approaches are designed to impact two large service delivery systems, the rural public schools and the Cherokee Nation, which is the largest employer in northeastern Oklahoma. The goal is to change the attitude, skills and behaviors of various "gate keepers" in these two large systems to empower them to help break the cycle of poverty by helping young people and their families believe a better future exists---out of poverty.

The Cherokee Nation Community Services Department will administer the funds for the project but whenever feasible will contract directly with all consultants, the schools, and others for program implementation. No new jobs are created but contacts will be awarded to 18 individuals and 6 schools that will serve approximately 275 students and 3,000 clients of CN direct service programs.
