
## 1,428 children with assigned ICW workers

Indian Child Welfare workers went to court 554 times on behalf of Cherokee children and families. Indian Child Welfare staff worked on cases in 35 states.





### **Child Protective Services**

#### In July

Child Protective Services (CPS) received 148 referrals of child abuse/neglect.

148 referrals involved 241 children.

2 of the 148 were co-investigated by OKDHS and CPS.

8 of the 148 were investigated by CPS in Indian Country.

150 of the 148 referrals were from within reservation boundaries.


35 of the 148 referrals are those for which ICW is solely responsible.

#### ADAIR COUNTY PROJECTS:

1. Dahlonegah South Road (TCM Dist. 7) – Bid was awarded to APAC-Central with a bid of \$7,450,450.00 and a project end date of March 31, 2024. Construction is 31% complete. Subgrade, pipes, fencing, and RCB's.

#### **CHEROKEE COUNTY PROJECTS:**

- 1. Coos Thompson aka Bridge 67 (TCM Dist. 1) This project received \$1,051,050 in TTP Bridge Funds along with ARPA, and TTP funds. Currently this project is under environmental review, provided through EST, Inc. Preliminary Right of Way Documents have been received and are being reviewed.
- 2. Indian Road (TCM Dist. 3 & 5) Cherokee and Sequoyah County Bronze Oak, LLC. was awarded this project in the amount of \$1,730,689.90. This project has a completion date of October 4, 2023. Construction began on January 23, 2023. Construction is 95% complete. Finishing Guard rail and stripe.
- 3. Mud Valley Road (TCM Dist. 1 & 3) Estimated project cost is over \$18,000,000. The Cherokee Nation was awarded the Nationally Significant Federal Lands Tribal Program (NSFLTP) Grant in the amount of \$12,932,457. Cherokee County RWD 3 has completed their relocation and is performing punch list items. AT&T, LREC, and LRTC is nearing the completion of their relocations. Paragon Contractors, LLC. has been awarded this project for a construction cost of \$13,345,543.00. Construction started on May 3, 2023 with a construction end date of January 23, 2025. Contractor working on Subgrade and earth work, RCB's side drain pipes and Fence. Construction is 20% completed
- 4. Northeast Fort Gibson Phase II (TCM Dist. 1 & 4) Estimated project cost is \$4,288,414 This project has been rebid and awarded to Bronze Oak, LLC for \$4,205,870.36. A preconstruction meeting was held on July 11<sup>th</sup>. A notice proceed has been issued. Contractor working on RCB'S Subgrade, slopes, fencing, and ditch liners. Construction is 10% complete.

#### **DELAWARE COUNTY PROJECTS:**

 Kansas Roundabout – (TCM Dist. 9) – This is a cooperative project between ODOT, Delaware County and CNDOT. Cherokee Nation contribution is \$279,836.02 of TTP Safety Funds. H&G Paving Contractors has been awarded the project at \$992,648.74 with a construction end date of January 5, 2023. As of July 15<sup>th</sup>, the total LDs assessed is \$57,600. They have not earned enough to run an end of July

estimate. The threshold for running an end of the month estimate is that it must be at least \$1,000. The LDs are continuing to accrue from the July 16<sup>th</sup> till now, but we do still grant weather days.

#### **SEQUOYAH COUNTY PROJECTS:**

1. Bridge 55 - (TCM Dist. 6) - This is a cooperative project between ODOT, Sequoyah County and CNDOT. Cherokee Nation contribution is \$2,069,482.63. \$1,000,000 of that contribution is TTP Bridge Funds. Paradigm Construction & Engineering is the contractor on this job with a contract price of \$1,941,377.98 and a construction end date of August 11, 2023. As of July 31, 2023 the project is 63.5% complete.

# Service Spotlight

This newsletter is intended to provide a spotlight on a service recently provided through the Cherokee Nation Engineering & Sanitation Facilities Construction program.

Mr. Byrd is a Cherokee citizen and speaker who lives in the Blunt community of Sequoyah County. Mr. Byrd received a tiny home through the Speaker Services and Planning & Development programs. After the home was plumbed and wired, the Sanitation Facilities Constuction program provided water and septic services for the home. The home site was extremely rocky with solid bedrock only a few inches under the top of the ground and extending over the entire site. The construction required rock excavation using a hydraulic hammer which took a great deal of time and at great expense. Construction started on August 2<sup>nd</sup> and lasted until August 8<sup>th</sup>.

### **Financial Coaching**

378 families are in the homebuyers' pipeline, having either completed or are currently active in financial counseling.

Families using MAP to purchase a home must attend a comprehensive homeownership training. 230 people have attended classes in FY23.

Employees and the public have the opportunity to attend financial education classes on topics ranging from creating spending plans to balancing checkbooks.

FY23 to date, 26 families have attended financial education classes.

#### iSave Program

iSave is a mechanism for eligible Cherokee citizens to update and rehabilitate the home they own. iSave is a matched savings program in which participants save money over a period of time and the iSave program matches the families' savings to build financial assets. 59 families are actively saving in iSave for home rehabilitation and 17 households have received matching funds to make home repairs or improvements in FY23.

Matching funds can be used for anything that increases the value of the primary residence, for example, a storm shelter, flooring, fencing, sidewalks, major appliance replacement, roofing, plumbing, etc.


