Marshal Service - Shannon Buhl

Marshal Buhl reported they now have fifty Marshals, with many more needed to hire. They will be opening offices in Pryor and Stilwell and soon in Sequoyah County. Councilor Vazquez inquired if there is a plan to open an office further north. Councilor Deere inquired if they plan to utilize the JW Sam building in Catoosa. Councilor Callison requested clarification on how the area offices would work and what number to call if an emergency. Councilor Legg requested clarification on the hiring process and training. Chair Shambaugh commented on the large area to patrol and gave appreciation for the additional marshals.

Office of the Attorney General - Sara Hill

Ms. Hill gave an update on the 2022 numbers as well as the Brackeen, Hooper and Strobble cases. She announced they would be hosting the Oklahoma Bar Association's mock trials on Monday. She offered to answer questions from the report provided. Councilor Callison inquired about pubic defenders.

FOIA-GRA - Gwen Terrapin

Ms. Terrapin reported for 2022 there were a total of thirty-six FOIA requests with five of those outstanding. There are three FOIA requests for 2023 to date and all of those are outstanding. The website has been updated. She offered to answer questions from the report.

Election Commission - Marcus Fears

Mr. Fears announced the filing period for elected officials is February 6th through the 9th for the 2023 election cycle. He offered to answer questions from the report provided.



II. Program Highlights

a.) Motor Vehicle

- 1. Year to Date Motor Vehicle revenue for FY23 compared to FY22 as of December 31st 2022 & December 31st 2021, had an overall decrease of 4.19%.
- 2. The month to month revenue comparison for December 2021 (FY22) compared to December 2022 (FY23) shows an decrease of 6.77%.

- 3. We have received our report for December 2022 purchases and payment from the State of Oklahoma and rebates are scheduled to be distributed to the retailers by or before February 15, 2023.
