II. Program Highlights

a. Tribal Transportation Self-Governance Program

On June 9, Cherokee Nation received notice that we were deemed eligible to participate in the U.S. Department of Transportation's Tribal Transportation Self-Governance Program. In doing so, Cherokee Nation became the first tribal government in the nation to formally participate in the program. We are working closely with the Department of Transportation on next steps. This summer, we will enter into negotiations with the Department to agree upon a compact and funding agreement. Cherokee Nation originally requested to participate in the Program in February, following the Department's Final Rule becoming effective in October 2020. The goal of the Tribal Transportation Self-Governance Program is to offer greater control, flexibility, and decision-making authority over federal funds used to carry out tribal transportation programs, functions, services, and activities (PFSAs) in tribal communities.

b. 2021 Virtual Broadcast Tribal Self-Governance Conference

Cherokee Nation will be hosting the upcoming virtual Tribal Self-Governance Conference this fall. We look forward to working with the Self-Governance Communication and Education Tribal Consortium to highlight the important and innovative work Self-Governance tribes are doing across Indian Country, including some of our own efforts.

c. Public Law 102-477 Updates

Public Law 102-477 allows tribes to seamlessly integrate federal employment, training, and related services to maximize efficiency and ensure our tribal citizens receive as many services as possible. We are currently working across departments to ensure everyone is coordinated in our efforts. We are working closely with Career Services and Human Services to meet our goals and priorities.

d. Reports

Later this summer, we will be submitting our Minimum Data Collection Report, which is our annual Self-Governance report. We are working with departments to gather data and prepare the report to submit to the Bureau of Indian Affairs. We continue to track our reports closely and submit them as they are requested by the Bureau of Indian Affairs Division of Workforce Development and the Office of Self Governance.

e. Funding Updates

To date, Cherokee Nation has received a total of \$8,087,588 in CARES Act dollars for our Self Governance programs under the Department of the Interior and \$51,364,059 in CARES Act dollars for our PL 102-477 programs. We do not yet know what our American

Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funding levels will be for Self Governance programs, but we do know that we will be receiving \$159,868,174 in ARPA Supplement Stabilization and Childcare Development Fund (CCDF) Funding.

f. Tribal Consultations, Trainings, and Calls

We continue to stay engaged with trainings and calls. We recently participated in the PL 102-477 Quarterly Tribal Work Group Meeting. The meeting included reports from our federal partners, including the Department of Health and Human Services, the Bureau of Indian Affairs Division of Workforce Development, the Bureau of Indian Affairs Office of Self-Governance, the Bureau of Indian Education, and the Department of Education. We also participated in an Oklahoma Tribal Child Care Development Fund Listening Session.

Oklahoma Indian Gaming Association (OIGA) will have the Annual OIGA Conference and Trade Show at the Oklahoma City Convention Center in Oklahoma City on August 16-18 2021. (Attached is the Registration form) The OIGA Conference is live and the host hotel is the Omni Hotel.

On June 25, 2021, the Gaming Commission Meeting was held at the Hard Rock Casino in Catoosa. The Cherokee Nation Gaming Commission issued for Employees Gaming Licenses twenty-two (22) temporary permits, twenty-nine (29) suitability determinations, forty-one (41) orders and ninety-two (92) renewals. Attached are the total numbers for Gaming Licenses for Key Employees and Primary Management Officers (PMO) per Casino property. (Not all staff employees require a Gaming License)
