

Executive & Finance Committee Career Services October Monthly Report Diane Kelley, Executive Director

Career Services was awarded another Dislocated Worker grant from the Department of Labor. The two-year, \$8 million grant is titled Trade and Economic Transition — National Dislocated Worker Grant (TET-NDWG) and will provide 400 dislocated workers with employment and training services.


The **Day Training Program** had three participants enter unsubsidized employment. One was with Cherokee Nation and two were externally. Seven participants attained the Food Handler Certification.

The **Tribal Employment Rights Office (TERO)** is preparing for the annual TERO Banquet to honor vendors. The TERO Banquet will be held November 1, 2018 at the Hard Rock Hotel and Casino Tulsa.

The **Tribal Economic Development Program (TED)** held another job fair at West Siloam Springs and saw 72 people. We held a Job Fair at the Hard Rock and had 42 people apply. We held a Job Fair at Roland and saw 82 applicants. We have also meet three times with a company called "Project Rodeo" that is looking at employing 175 people.

Career Services staff attended the RSU Chili Cook-off at Mid-America Industry Park and won both categories.





Commercial Lending Impact 2010 through 2019 by County





CNEDTA small business loans not only create jobs and but spur private sector economic investments at an approximate rate of dollar for dollar: FY18 loans leveraged \$4,968,217 in private dollars and since 2015 CNEDTA loans have leveraged \$14,760,768 in private dollars.

Entrepreneurial and Small Business Training

Entrepreneurial capacity building, through one-on-one assistance and in workshops settings, is available throughout the year to help entrepreneurs with business planning, strategic growth, marketing assistance, social media marketing, cash flow management, procurement and affordable financing.

In 2019, Business training workshops attracted 129 people representing Indian owned businesses.

Additionally, 12 entrepreneurs received one-on-one business coaching.

Commerce staff visits all business loan clients annually to monitor business progress, employment increases, view collateral and evaluate any entrepreneur or management need training to ensure business growth and success.


Kawi Café a model experiential entrepreneurship training program








Entrepreneur Skills Learned by Kawi Participants



Artists as Entrepreneurs and Community Tourism as Economic Development

Increasing the business capacity of our Artists and tourism capacity of our communities

The Cherokee Arts Center provides teaching space and specialized equipment for artists to increase their revenues. Year to date, 70 people have attended 14 artist taught classes and the equipment has been used 83 times by 40 artists. One artist space is used exclusively by the National Treasures to both work and to teach class. Year to date artists have taken advantage of the Cherokee Arts Center 159 times.
