Executive & Finance Committee Career Services June Monthly Report Diane Kelley, Executive Director

Career Services has submitted a Letter of Intent to the Department of Health and Human Services Dallas Regional Office for the Tribal Temporary Assistance to Needy Families Program (**Tribal TANF**). We had to revise our original Letter of Intent due to a conflict with Muscogee (Creek) Nation in population and service area. We share six counties and were both proposing to serve all other Native Americans in those areas.

We met with the Muscogee (Creek) Nation and presented a compromise that they accepted:

There is still a lot of work to be done before we can begin administering the TANF Program. We are currently planning on a January 1, 2019 start date.

example, Cherokees are
employed building Cherokee
homes which in turn gives
Cherokees housing. He spoke
for quite a while and gave a
little history lesson of Jincy's.

The **Disability Employment Initiative** staff attended the state DRS Training Academy for one week. This allowed us to receive pertinent training and information as well as network with state workforce staff. They also attended and worked the informational table for the Elevate Youth (ages 16-24) Conference.

DEI Staff attended an informational meeting with the state's Social Security Benefits counselor to gain knowledge about the rules and regulations of social security benefits. Josh and Marsha attended the 4-County Partners meeting in Tahlequah. Josh and Cheryl attended the week long CANAR Conference. DEI staff presented a short overview of the DEI Program at the OKTVR meeting.

The first DEI Leadership Advisory Group meeting was held. There were 11 participants in attendance. The next meeting is scheduled for August 30th.

Monthly Disability Awareness Email was sent out to approximately 105 internal employees of Cherokee Nation Career Service on June 22nd. The topic of this awareness email was PTSD.

employees for their peak season.


Claremore Manufacturer takes part in Oklahoma Works Apprenticeship Program Creating New Welders Goal of Program

CLAREMORE — Four young adults embraced a head start on a career Friday at Pelco Structural.

The Claremore-based, steel-pole manufacturer recognized them for being the company's first enrollees in the Governor's Oklahoma Works Apprenticeship Program, which assists in filling the skills gap in the current workforce by providing job and classroom training.

With partners Northeast Technology



Center and the Cherokee Nation, Pelco asks participants to sign a one-year commitment to the program to help address the shortage of welders in northeast Oklahoma.

"The partnership with NTC and the Cherokee Nation is very, very important to us," Pelco President Phil Albert said. "I think every good thing that happens, relative to this workforce program, has some touch from (Principal) Chief (Bill John) Baker and the Cherokee Nation as it relates to businesses like mine in northeast Oklahoma.

"Our business is a team sport, and our secret sauce is our human resource. It's our people."




Enrollees are Justin Corley, 30, of Owasso; Justin Copeland, 23, of Verdigris; Edan Cole, 21, of Sand Springs; and Taylor Bailey, 27, of Tulsa.

"I'm super excited," Corley said. "I can't wait to get started. ... I've had a good first impression so far, so I plan on staying."

Said Cole, "I really want to do this."

The Oklahoma Works initiative was implemented by Gov. Mary Fallin and is a coalition of state agencies, educational institutions, businesses and other partners. The program's strategic priorities are coordinated by the Governor's Council for Workforce and Economic Development.

Students in Claremore will under a four-week, 160-hour training program at NTC, said Jerad Girten, industrial coordinator at NTC.





Private Commercial Lending Dollars Leveraged 2015-2018: \$8,378,920


Total Community Investment through Small Business Lending 2015-2018: \$16,716,335




Businesses Create Community Based Jobs

U.S. Opportunity Zone Act 2018

Provides a mechanism for companies and individuals to invest capital gains into low income census tracts for commercial and residential real estate development. Investments may be up to 10 years and such investments will defer the capital gains tax during investment and may decrease the basis for the taxes by 15% if invested the full 10 year period.

Opportunity Funds must be the investment vehicle; IRS rules are still pending. Should be simple to create and will expect a return on investments.

Entrepreneurial and Small Business Training

Entrepreneurial capacity building, through one-on-one assistance and in workshops settings, is available throughout the year to help entrepreneurs with business planning, strategic growth, marketing assistance, social media marketing, cash flow management, procurement and affordable financing.

In 2018, Business training workshops and the annual Engage Expo attracted 2,936 people representing Indian owned businesses, 119 of which were TERO certified businesses. Additionally, 102 entrepreneurs received one-on-one business coaching.




Kawi Café a model experiential entrepreneurship training program



The Cherokee Arts Center provides teaching space and specialized equipment for artists to increase their revenues. Year to date, 1,262 people have attended 220 artist taught classes and the equipment has been used 1,123 times by 927 artists. One artist space is used exclusively by the National Treasures to both work and to teach class. Year to date artists have taken advantage of the Cherokee Arts Center 2,651 times.
