II. Program Highlights

a.) Motor Vehicle

- 1. Year to Date Motor Vehicle revenue for FY13 compared to FY12 as of June 30th 2013 & June 30th 2012, had an overall increase of 6.20%.
- 2. The month to month revenue comparison for June 2012 (FY12) compared to June 2013 (FY13) shows an increase of 8.63%.

- 3. The Cherokee Nation Retail Subsidy for Smoke Shops has been paid through June to all qualified retailers.
- 4. The Tax Commission had three positions open at the Collinsville office two of those have been filled and the new agents started August 5th training in Tahlequah. The third position has been selected and we are waiting for confirmation from Human Resources on that position. The Tahlequah office had two open positions one has been filled that agent also started on August 5th and is now in training. We are currently interviewing for the second open position at Tahlequah. We had one position for the Sallisaw office which we have completed interviews and made a selection for that position. We are awaiting another panel for the open position at the Adair office.







I. Budget Highlights - please refer to Monthly Financial Report

Description of Budget exceptions: No budget exceptions to report. Government Resources, including Evaluation and Compliance, Self Governance and Grants Administration, is operating at approximately 50% staffing.

II. Program Highlights

a. In brief:

1. Veterans Affairs:

The CN Self Governance Office is continuing to coordinate negotiations for a reimbursement agreement with the Veterans Affairs department. The reimbursement agreement will allow Cherokee Nation Health Services to be reimbursed by the VA for services provided to Cherokee veterans at Cherokee Nation health facilities.

2. Department of Interior Multi-Year Funding Agreement Negotiations:

Self-Governance staff and members of the Office of the Attorney General began negotiations of a new Multi-Year Funding Agreement with the U.S. Department of the Interior. The proposed FA would cover FY2014-FY2018. An initial face-to-face meeting occurred at the Eastern Oklahoma Regional Office of the Bureau of Indian Affairs on July 17th. Cherokee Nation Self-Governance Staff are continuing negotiations electronically with Department of Interior representatives.

3. Contract Disputes Act Litigation:

Vickie Hanvey and staff are assisting the Cherokee Nation Office of the Attorney General with litigation against the United States Department of Health and Human Services for underpayment of contract support costs claims. Litigation will be filed in the District Court for the District of Columbia. The litigation is in response to IHS' inaction regarding Contract Disputes Act claims that were filed in 2012. Cherokee Nation's claim is for \$49,834,352. Staff is continuing to research and compile financial data and records in support of the Nation's claims for underpayment by the Indian Health Service. Staff research is cost effective and reduces legal fees paid to outside counsel.

4. Contract Support Cost Summit:

Self Governance staff attended the Tribal Contract Support Cost Summit on July 31st and August 1st. The Summit focused on the current state of Contract Support Cost litigation and settlements across Indian Country. Tribal leaders, attorneys, and subject matter experts discussed documents that would be needed to support CSC claims, best accounting practices, litigation/settlement strategy, and the state of current discussions between tribal and federal attorneys.

5. Indian Health Service Self-Governance Training:

Vickie Hanvey served as a guest lecturer and instructor at an Indian Health Service Self-Governance training session in Washington, DC on August 6-7. Cherokee Nation Self Governance staff participated in the training. The training focused on the IHS Self-Governance pre-negotiation, negotiation, and post-negotiation process. Tribal and IHS representatives served as instructors for the training.

6. Public Law 102-477 Administrative Flexibility Workgroup:

Self Governance and Career Services staff continue to participate in the PL 102-477 Administrative Flexibility Workgroup. The Administrative Flexibility Workgroup is a joint Tribal-Federal Workgroup charged with the purpose of finding a solution to Federal insistence that Tribes undergo more burdensome reporting requirements in order to operate under a 477 Plan. Additionally, some Agency officials are advocating that Tribes have less flexibility in the re-allocation and re-budgeting of funds within the parameters of an

approved 477 plan. Self Governance staff are working to advocate for the continued flexibility and operation of 477 Programs as was intended by Congress when it passed PL 102-477.

7. Delaware Tribe of Indians

Vickie Hanvey has continued to work with the Cherokee Nation Office of the Attorney General regarding the Delaware Tribe's Aid to Tribal Government funding.

8. Federal Tort Claims Act

The Self Governance Office, in coordination with Health Services and Finance staff, provided research assistance in support of a wrongful death case involving the Cherokee Nation. The U.S. Department of Health and Human Services and Department of Justice determined that Federal Tort Claims Act coverage applied and filed to dismiss Cherokee Nation as a plaintiff in the case.
