# Alternative Education, Career Skills, and Testing Report

Alternative Education continues to serve GED clients through in-person instruction, over the phone assistance, and with our online AZTEC platform and another Adult Education Teacher has been added to the Tahlequah office. The Adult Education Teacher in Stilwell is coordinating classes with individuals working at the surgical mask plant to offer them GED services after hours.

Career Skills staff is also working to expand services to address barriers of our program participants; instructors have been working with our Reentry Program to tailor classes and services to overcome the intensive barriers our Tribal Citizens face when reentering their communities and locating employment.

Testing Centers remain open and are providing services in Tahlequah, Pryor, and Stilwell.

# Upcoming Program Initiatives

The Alternative Education Program is working to expand services in southern Adair County and is currently completing focused recruitment efforts to promote our services to potential GED clients in the area.

An Adult Driver's Education course is in development, which will address this specific employment barrier. The class will assist adult students with taking and passing the written driver's examination, learning basic driving skills and techniques, and also promote safe driving practices for participants.

# **EMT Training**

The first class of EMT training will begin Jan 5, 2022.

Classes will be held Monday and Wednesday from 6pm to 10pm until April 30, 2022 in Pryor.

The EMS Training program will provide a National Registry of Emergency Medical Technicians (NREMT) Certificate and Oklahoma State, Emergency Medical Technician along with Paramedic level Training. The NREMT is the National Level of Certification where state entities are responsible for licensing to practice in prospective states.

We are working with Oklahoma Emergency Medical Training Academy in Pryor Oklahoma to provide the EMT training. Mike Miller is the Owner and Lead instructor for this entity. He is a Flight nurse and paramedic with 20+ years either in an ambulance or on a Helicopter. He began this school as an endeavor to prepare for the next phase of his career which is teaching. The EMT training lasts for a total of 16 weeks and will teach all aspects of EMS at this level

- 60 Hours of On the Job experience with an Ambulance Service
- 8 Hours of Basic Life Support Training
- National Registry of Emergency Medical Technician testing
  - o Both Adaptive Cognitive Exam and Psychomotor skills exam

# Paramedic Training

We're currently working with a number of area training institutions to get more Cherokee Citizens into these programs.

Students in Oklahoma may choose between paramedic training, certificate, and associate's degree programs, all of which may lead to eligibility to take the requisite licensing exam.

Admission to such programs may require CPR certification, previous certification as an EMT, a background and/or drug screening, among others, depending on the school. All paramedic programs include a practicum element, which may be fulfilled by clinical hours or an internship, as the program requires.

There are currently schools that have state-approved programs that also meet Department of Transportation requirements. These programs prepare students for NREMT-P exams and state licensure exams.

#### **Vocational Rehabilitation**

The Vocational Rehabilitation program has been operating under a No-cost Extension (NCE), 10/01/21 to 12/31/21, to expend the remaining funds from our previous grant cycle. During the NCE Vocational Rehabilitation was only serving those individuals who were eligible prior to 09/30/2021. Fortunately, the Program was able to expend those funds early and ended the NCE on 10/09/21. We are now taking and processing new applications for our disabled consumers who are planning on attending a training program in the spring.

In conjunction with the Disability Employment Initiative, the Vocational Rehabilitation team celebrated our partnership with Oklahoma Workforce. We were also able to donate a replica of our accessibility kiosks to Green Country Workforce Development Board, which will likewise increase their ability to provide more accessibility to jobseekers utilizing their services.



# **477 Vocational Success Story**

K. Benge is a Licensed Practical Nurse graduate of Northeast Area Vocational Training –Kansas, Oklahoma. She began her studies May 07, 2020 and successfully completed September 30, 2021. She was a great student and her priorities were to earn good grades, maintain good time and attendance, and achieve the goal of Licensed Nurse.

Prior to her entrance into the Practical Nursing field, Benge was a Certified Nurse Aide. She was still working at Hartsworth Senior Living in Vinita, Oklahoma when she entered the Practical Nursing program. She would soon learn it would be too difficult to continue working and keep her grades up to a level that she expected of herself.

When she needed additional nursing direction or encouragement, she would go to her mother, who was assisted by Career Services in 2015/2016 with her LPN career. It was very gratifying to assist both mother and daughter and help both meet their goals.

Benge has completed her training, received her Oklahoma State Board license, and has secured employment in the last few months. She submitted an application at Monroe Manor in Jay, OK where her mother is a nurse and was immediately hired as the new LPN! How exciting for a new graduate. She is earning a competitive wage and will continue each year to increase her salary.

Benge plans further her education bin a Registered Nursing program at Rogers State College, Claremore, Oklahoma or Northeast Oklahoma A&M, Miami, OK. After obtaining her RN credentials, she thinks she may prefer to work at a larger facility or hospital.

Benge is very grateful to the Cherokee Nation for financial assistance to help her reach her immediate goal and relief of working and attending school. Grades are earned not given and this student is pleased with her success. This bright young lady will do very well in work or education.

YTD (Oct 21 to Oct 22) 1345

- 1. Outreach numbers for FY 20-21 ended with 8,941 contacts. Due to the pandemic, reorganization of the staff, closed schools and other numerous circumstances, the numbers were well under what Shanista Cloud had collected while in full function mode at the Cherokee Heritage Center.
- 2. Outreach activities increased during the month of October as schools celebrated Indigenous Peoples Day. The three staff members dedicated to cultural outreach visited 20 schools with 1,345 contacts (combined virtual and in person). Staff is to be commended for strictly adhering to covid procedures set by Education Services.
- 3. Throughout much of October staff assisted with PPE deliveries to schools and delivered 79,457 masks and 3,978 bottles of hand sanitizer. They worked in close tandem with respective councilors on delivery and community support.
- 4. Staff was able, with the help of Jeannette Whitmire of the Communication Department, to develop five instructional videos in pinch pots (pottery), basketry, making mini stickball sticks, the construction of cornhusk dolls and five stories told by Robert Lewis.
- 5. In a continued partnership with Cowboy Hall of Fame and Western Heritage Museum, OKC, they were shared with the museum for their annual Native American Month activities. This partnership was developed among staff at the Cherokee Heritage Center and has carried on since outreach staff was transferred to Cherokee Nation.
- 6. Four Cultural Resource Center staff members were able to travel to Oklahoma City, October 14 to visit the newly opened First Americans Museum as professional development.

7. Staff learned the art of moccasin making taught by Tonia Hogner-Weavel with students being JOM and Cultural Resources staff.

# Accomplishments:

- 1) The Blue Ribbon Steering Committee was revived and the meetings have been most productive. This committee convenes monthly to brainstorm on feasible improvements in the Children's Village. Improvements areas include playgrounds, training, activities, recruitment, retention, and morale boosting events. The committee is comprised of Children's Village staff in a rotating fashion to ensure everyone has an opportunity to make recommendations. This has proven to be a great way of hearing from all stakeholders in making the Children's Village an enjoyable work place. The Children's Village is the largest facility in the ECU and it takes great coordination to keep staff on the same page. The committee has made some great recommendations.
- 2) The number of vacancies continue to be a concern and the rate of onboarding is constantly being reviewed. Advertisement for various positions are posted continuously. There were three new hires in October.
- 3) One Admin staff completed her ChildPlus Administrators Certification. The 40-hour training on the child tracking software prepares her to assist in maintaining, monitoring and generating various

reports on attendance, trends, screenings and personnel. There is one additional staff currently enrolled in the certification training.

#### New Initiatives:

- 1) The ECU received final approval from the Cherokee Nation IRB to continue participation in the Family and Child Experience Survey (FACES). The ECU initially participated in the study in 2015. We are one of 22 AI/AN grantees chosen to participate in a study in 2015 and did not include AI/AN grantees before then. For obvious reasons, the study was paused in 2020 and will resume late fall of 2021 or early spring 2022. It is a five-year survey.
- 2) Kicked off a series of meeting to discuss the new facilities in Tahlequah and Pryor/Sallisaw. The Tahlequah site will house the current Children's Village operation, relocate the Tahlequah Early Learning Academy (TELA with four Early Head Start classrooms) currently in a Tahlequah Public School facility and add two more classrooms. With the addition of the TELA site, Tahlequah will house Head Start and Early Head Start with 16 classrooms. The new Pryor facility will house two Early Head Start infant and toddler classrooms in one section of the building with a separate kitchen. The combination of the ECU and CDC programs under one roof will set the stage for a wonderful collaboration in providing comprehensive services to children and families.
- 3) The AI/AN annual conference is scheduled virtually the week of Nov 15-19. This training is free and covers a wide range of topics for all components of Head Start and Early Head Start.
