





Employment Programs

Four participants attained employment, three of which were internal and one external.

HOPE Success Story

L. Bocanegra came to Career Services in hopes of gaining experience as a security officer in June of this year. She was moved to the ARPA program in August of this year. She has attended all trainings required within her department and has received great reports from her supervisor Tracey Robertson. He stated "Bocanegra is a great worker and we are lucky to have her. She has a good strong work ethic and willingness to work nonconventional shifts and deal with the elements such as heat and cold." She showed up on time for every shift and has not missed work. Her supervisor also stated "She has good people skills and this really helped her with getting hired." As of October 14, 2021 Bocanegra obtained full time employment with Cherokee Nation Security at the tribal complex. She is an inspiration to others.



JOBS/Tribal TANF

Services provided to 331 families for the month.

- Cash assistance payment standards for both Parent and Child Only assistance units were increased by an average of 13% effective October 1, 2021.
- Approximately \$6,750 was issued in work participation incentives to eligible parents.
- One client successfully exited the program this month after gaining and maintaining full time employment for one full year; she was also eligible to receive the one-time monetary Transitional incentive of \$2,500.

Vocational Rehabilitation

The Cherokee Nation Vocational Rehabilitation (CNVR) program received notice that our grant application submitted to the American Indian Vocational Rehabilitation Services grant competition was reviewed and approved for funding. The Vocational Rehabilitation grant

application received a score of 97 out of 100 points when reviewed by external reviewers with expertise in the content areas. This is a 5 year grant beginning 10/01/21 running through 09/30/26.

The Vocational Rehabilitation program is currently operating under a No-cost Extension (NCE) to expend the remaining funds from our previous grant cycle. Under advisement from our Federal Project Officer the Vocational Rehabilitation program will serve only those individuals who were eligible prior to 09/30/2021, through the end of 12/31/2021. The program will begin accepting new applications 01/01/22.

During the previous grant period CNVR has served 300 individuals with 119 successful employment outcomes. This exceeded our grant award goals and of the individuals who obtained a successful employment outcome: 93% were employed full-time, in an integrated work environment, at or above minimum wage and 7% were employed part-time in an integrated work environment at or above minimum wage. The individuals exiting the Program with gainful employment outcomes work, on average, a 32 hour work week with average weekly earnings of \$412.00. The job retention rate for those who obtained an employment outcome is 96% at a 1 year follow-up.

Disability Employment Awareness Month

On 10/21/21 Principal Chief Chuck Hoskin Jr. signed a Proclamation declaring October Disability Employment Awareness Month. National Disability Employment Awareness Month was declared in 1988 by the United States Congress for the month of **October** to raise awareness of the employment needs and contributions of individuals with disabilities.

Manufacturing Month in Cherokee Nation

On October 6, 2021, Cherokee Nation Principal Chief Chuck Hoskin Jr. signed a proclamation declaring October as Manufacturing Month in Cherokee Nation. Cherokee Nation is dedicated to creating quality jobs for tribal citizens throughout its reservation and, through Career Services and Business Enterprises, promotes business partnerships to strengthen economic growth and the economy of Northeast Oklahoma.

Community Economic Impact



Small Business Client Highlight



Hestin Lamons and Donald Cannon bought the roll-off dumpster portion of Champion Refuse and made it into C&L Site Services. They relocated it near Tahlequah, Okla. C&L provides roll-off dumpster service to all of northeast Oklahoma. Hestin manages the sales and equipment while also delivering dumpsters. Donald handles the accounting and technology side of the business. The Cherokee Nation Small Business Assistance Center helped this business expand to meet the high demand for dumpsters at residential and commercial construction sites around the area. The loan through the Cherokee Nation Economic Development Trust Authority

allowed them to purchase more dumpsters and a second truck to haul those dumpsters to and from job sites. This means they also get to hire another driver full time as their business grows. The loan also helped them decrease their monthly expenses and increase cash flow so that they can fund their next expansion. Hestin and Donald said they are very thankful for the SBAC's staff expertise and help in providing entrepreneurial and lending assistance.









Small Business Lending Impact 2010 through 2021 by County

Artists as Entrepreneurs and Community Tourism as Economic Development


Increasing the business capacity of artists and tourism capacity of communities



The Cherokee Arts Center continues to host monthly Third Thursday Virtual Art Classes on the Cherokee Arts Center & Spider Gallery Facebook page (facebook.com/CherokeeArtsCenter).

Virtual classes have reached over 84,000 people this year. Cherokee National Treasures and studio artists continue to teach classes both virtually and on a limited in-person basis with proof of vaccination from students. During the month of October, the Cherokee Arts Center hosted a month long series of Weaving Wednesday outdoor classes. Regularly scheduled open to the public classes have not returned due to the continuing COVID-19 pandemic.


