


Community Youth Applications by County

Programs with Court Interaction

OCAPS: Out-Of-District Court Advocacy and Permanency Services

- Involved in child welfare cases in non-jurisdiction counties in Oklahoma and all 50 states.
- Most work is done telephonically or electronically.
- Emphasis on education about the Indian Child Welfare Act and ensuring States comply with it.

SCAPS: State Court Advocacy and Permanency Services

- Involved in child welfare cases inside the 14 counties of which all or part are within the jurisdiction of the Nation.
- Emphasis on education about the Indian Child Welfare Act and ensuring OKDHS compliance, and sometimes provide Tribal Foster Homes.
- Provides services to the families when OKDHS fails to do so or as an alternative to OK DHS services.

TCAPS: Tribal Court Advocacy and Permanency Services

- Involved in child welfare cases which are wholly under the jurisdiction of the Nation and OKDHS is not involved.
- These cases originate on Indian Country or are transferred in from State district courts. Hearings are held at our Tribal Court House. Tribal Foster Homes are fully utilized.


GPA: Guardianships and Private Adoptions

- Involved in civil adoption cases to include voluntary adoption, involuntary adoption and birth parent adoptions.
- Monitors Guardianships and Private Adoptions for compliance with the Indian Child Welfare Act and the best interests of children.
- Serves Cherokee children and their families in Tribal Courts and State Courts throughout the United States.

CPS: Child Protective Services

- Receives referrals involving allegations of maltreatment of Cherokee children.
- Investigates allegations of child maltreatment in Indian Country and co-investigates with DHS in some counties when Cherokee children are involved.


1,471 Children with Assigned ICW Workers



In September

Indian Child Welfare workers went to court 409 times on behalf of Cherokee children and families. Indian Child Welfare staff worked on cases in 32 states.





Eligibility Notices, Prevention, & Intervention

When a county or state's child welfare agency gets involved in the life of a family that they suspect to be Cherokee, they are required by the Indian Child Welfare Act (ICWA) to send notice to the tribe. The tribe must then reply to confirm or deny whether the children are members of (or eligible to become members of) the tribe.

Currently, with 7 case workers processing approximately 200-300 pieces of mail per month, response times may vary due to vacancies and depending on the amount of mail received. The tribe has a goal of responding between 45-60 days.

In September

Cherokee Nation received:

484 notices involving 831 children from the State of Oklahoma.

1,374 notices involving 2,269 children from locations outside of Oklahoma.

1,858 notices involving 3,100 children in total.

The average response-to-notice time this month was 91 days.

Indian Child Welfare Family Protection Services Unit (FPS) assists families in need of handson training to correct the conditions that lead to children being removed from their home.
These services often include completing a 28-week parenting program that discusses topics
like discipline, nutrition, budgeting, and housekeeping. We primarily assist all our tribal CAPS
cases but can assist in state cases when a request is made. This helps ensure that families
have the tools they need to be reunited. We have also added the Triple P Parenting
curriculum to our program.

In September

FPS served 13 children and 10 families.

Child Protective Services

In September

Child Protective Services (CPS) received 340 referrals of child abuse/neglect.

340 referrals involved 560 children.

I of the 340 were co-investigated by OKDHS and CPS.


13 of the 340 were investigated by CPS in Indian Country.

226 of the 340 referrals were from within reservation boundaries.

30 of the 340 referrals are those for which ICW is solely responsible.

- 2 Cherokee child(ren) were removed from tribal land due to confirmed abuse/neglect.
- 2 child death(s) occurred from within the reservation boundaries.
- 0 near death(s) occurred from within the reservation boundaries.

Types of Abuse/Neglect Reported




Certification & Placement Services

(Foster & Adoptive Homes)

Types of Certified Placement Resource Homes

- •Non-Relative Foster: Families who are willing to take in children they do not know on a temporary basis, but may last years. These families usually do not adopt children.
- •Relative Foster: Families who are related to the children and are fostering them. They do not take in children they are not related to.
- •Non-Relative Adoptive: Families who hope to adopt children when the children's parents' rights are terminated. These homes take placements of children who are legally free for adoption.
- <u>Emergency</u>: Homes that take placement on an emergency basis not to exceed 48 hours.
- •Respite: Homes that take placement on a temporary basis, not to exceed 10 days.

ADAIR COUNTY PROJECTS:

- 1. Dahlonegah South (TCM Dist. 7) Estimated project cost is \$5,108,775. Right of Way acquisition is complete. The water and electric have been relocated. Phone is scheduled to relocate after November 16, 2021. Final changes are being made to plans.
- 2. Malloy Hollow (TCM Dist. 7) Estimated project cost is \$8,823,442 Right of Way acquisition is at 30 percent acquired.
- 3. Rocky Mountain School Loop Bridge (TCM Dist. 7) Estimated project cost is \$1,206,956 Silver Spur has been awarded the project for the amount of 1,401,918 and a completion date of June 01, 2022. Remaining funds from the road project will be reprogramed to the bridge project. Silver Spur cannot begin clearing and grubbing until after November 16, 2021 for environmental issues.

CHEROKEE COUNTY PROJECTS:

- 1. Northeast Fort Gibson Phase I (TCM Dist. 1 & 4) Estimated project cost is \$14,875,141. Construction of Phase I is complete. A final inspection was performed on August 11th, final payment was issued October 15, 2021 and the final acceptance letter was sent to the contract on October 18, 2021.
- 2. Northeast Fort Gibson Phase II (TCM Dist. 1 & 4) Estimated project cost is \$4,286,784. Bid opening was September 30, 2021. Four bids were submitted. The bids are under review.
- 3. Hulbert Lost City Road (TCM Dist. 1) Estimated project cost is \$5,309,853. Placing of concrete structures has started. The project is 45% complete.
- 4. Mud Valley (TCM Dist. 1 &3) Estimated project cost is \$14,432,000. Right of Way acquisition of 79 total parcels continues. Seventy three percent (58) of the parcels have been acquired.

CRAIG COUNTY PROJECTS:

1. NS4340 also known as White Oak road (TCM Dist. 11) – Estimated project cost is \$9,442,834. This project is 90% complete with the contractor placing signs, stripe and preliminary punch list items.

MAYES COUNTY PROJECTS:

1. Chimney Rock Hollow (TCM Dist. 9)—Estimated project cost is \$7,908,924. Project is 30% complete: Contractor is placing RCB and side drains and working on subgrade.

SEQUOYAH COUNTY PROJECTS:

1. Dwight Mission Road (TCM Dist 5) – Estimated project cost is \$10,263,728. This is a cooperative project between ODOT, Sequoyah County and CNDOT. This project is approximately 75 % complete. A detour has been constructed, along with drainage structures, erosion control, and widening of shoulders. Solid Slab Sod has been laid as well. No change






