Alternative Education, Career Skills, and Testing Report

Alternative Education is currently implementing a virtual classroom platform to assist with distance learning throughout our Career Services locations. Access to instructors virtually will give clients that are unable to attend class increased communication opportunities.

Our Tahlequah location is installing smart television technology so clients can receive real time, in-person instruction and guidance from staff.

Alternative Education is now enrolling eligible Cherokee Nation Tribal Citizens into our "Responsive Incentive" program that provides \$250 to students directly following the successful completion of each of the four GED subject tests (a total of \$1000 for each GED graduate).

Career Skills staff are continuing to provide specialized trainings and online content to address programmatic needs and continue service with COVID precautions. 107 contacts/completions were achieved between career skill classes, individual employability consultations, reentry employment skills contact, confidentiality training and resume assistance during the reporting period.

Through testing services including Pearson VUE, GED, HiSET and MOS, 134 tests, were administered during the reporting period and one GED client graduated.

Upcoming Program Initiatives

The Alternative Education Program is working with other departments, such as Cherokee Nation Housing Authority, in an effort to expand recruitment efforts and is also overseeing the development of two youth-focused ARPA Career Initiatives.

The first ARPA Career Initiative is a virtual platform that focuses on our Youth Employment participants under the age of 20, and is intended to increase their knowledge and awareness of the opportunities available for further education and training to achieve career success. It will include weekly webcasts of information about Cherokee Nation government, culture, services and vocational opportunities, along with reminders about application deadlines, scholarships and testing for those youth interested in pursuing higher education.

The second program addresses tribal youth ages 14-15. It is a hybrid model of our Summer Youth Employment program and youth day camp. Initially, there will be three, 8-week camps, one each in Pryor, Tahlequah and Sallisaw. These will focus on career interests and opportunities, as well as, post-secondary training and education programs in the area, combined with cultural components of our Cherokee heritage.

Career Readiness Act

Building Trades Program

Providing training in basic building trades, participants learn occupations such as carpentry, masonry, and electrical work, and how to effectively compete for employment. We currently have six building trades participants, all of which received OSHA 10 Certifications this past month. They have been training in the shop and getting some hands on work experience when availabe.

High Voltage Lineman Training Program

Cherokee Nation Principal Chief Chuck Hosking Jr. and Deputy Chief Bryan Warner recognized ten students during the High Voltage Lineman Class 4 Graduation on September 24, 2021.


