

II. Program Highlights

a.) Motor Vehicle

- 1. Year to Date Motor Vehicle revenue for FY21 compared to FY20 as of August 31st 2021 & August 31st 2020, had an overall increase of 20.53%.







II. Program Highlights

a. Tribal Transportation Self-Governance Program

On June 9, Cherokee Nation received notice that we were deemed eligible to participate in the U.S. Department of Transportation's Tribal Transportation Self-Governance Program. The goal of the Tribal Transportation Self-Governance Program is to offer greater control, flexibility, and decision-making authority over federal funds used to carry out tribal transportation programs, functions, services, and activities (PFSAs) in tribal communities. Since the June 9 determination, Cherokee Nation's negotiating team has worked diligently to draft a compact and funding agreement. Cherokee Nation has been working with the U.S. Department of Transportation's negotiating team to come to an agreement. We are awaiting additional feedback from the U.S. Department of Transportation before we move forward.

b. 2021 Virtual Broadcast Tribal Self-Governance Conference

Cherokee Nation hosted the virtual Tribal Self-Governance Conference on September 14 through 16. It was a success, and Cherokee Nation enjoyed the opportunity to engage. We look forward to continuing to work with the Self-Governance Communication and Education Tribal Consortium to highlight the important and innovative work Self-Governance tribes are doing across Indian Country, including some of our own efforts.

c. Public Law 102-477 Updates

Public Law 102-477 allows tribes to seamlessly integrate federal employment, training, and related services to maximize efficiency and ensure our tribal citizens receive as many services as possible. We are currently working across departments to ensure everyone is coordinated in our efforts. In mid-August, we received notification of approval on a Plan Amendment related to childcare. We also recently submitted an additional Plan Amendment, and the Bureau of Indian Affairs Division of Workforce Development has 90 days to respond to our request. We anticipate that the amendment will be approved.

As a result of our successes with our PL 102-477 Plan and programs, we have begun receiving requests for technical assistance from other tribal governments. In conjunction with Career Services, we work to fulfill these requests and work with other tribes. We recently worked with the Muckleshoot Tribe and the Lummi Nation to assist them in integrating some of the workforce development programs into their Plan.

We are also working to maximize our opportunities in this space, and we continue to engage our federal partners and other tribes to learn from their work.

d. Reports

We have not received any reporting requests from the Office of Self-Governance this month. We will soon be receiving a request to complete our Financial Assistance and Social Service Report (FASSR), and will soon begin work on our annual P.L. 102-477 narrative and financial report. We continue to track our reports closely and submit them when the Bureau of Indian Affairs Division of Workforce Development and the Office of Self Governance request them.

e. Funding Updates

To date, Cherokee Nation has received a total of \$8,557,160.75 in CARES Act dollars for our Self-Governance programs under the Department of the Interior and \$51,364,059 in CARES Act dollars for our PL 102-477 programs. We have also received 17,757,154 in American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funds for our Self-Governance programs and \$165,631,972 in ARPA funds for our PL 102-477 programs.

f. Tribal Consultations, Trainings, and Calls

We continue to stay engaged with trainings and calls. We have engaged in several meetings with our federal partners in recent weeks. We participated in the National Indian and Native American Employment / Public Law 102-477 Training in September, as well as the Tribal Self-Governance Conference. Additionally, we participated in the P.L. 102-477 Annual Federal Partners meeting, which included Assistant Secretary for Indian Affairs Brian Newland and several other federal officials. We also participated in the Fall 2022 Oklahoma Self-Governance Coalition Meeting, which brings together Self-Governance tribes in Oklahoma to share best practices and updates.
