



Ambulatory Care Visits Month of June 2018-2022




<u>Dental Services</u> <u>Month of June 2019-2022</u>




No. of Rx filled Month of June 2019-2022

^{*}Dental: The program has six dental assistant vacancies and has for over 6 months. Four of which have the expanded functions. It has been difficult to find qualified applicants for these positions. Full staffing would be 13 dental assistants. We currently have 2 hygienists, one oral surgeon, one pediatric dentist, 2 staff dentists, one deputy chief dentist, and one chief dentist.

Having only 5 dental assistants on the floor greatly limits the number of patients seen per dentist. We are in the process of re-advertising with an increased recruitment incentive. Once these vacancies are filled, staff dentists should be able to see 8 to 10 patients per day.





Patient Visits and Revenue







Ambulatory Care 3rd Party Revenue: Year to Date



Third Party Revenues Combined: Year to Date




Third Party Revenue Comparison CN WW Hastings Hospital Year to Date
