#### **Real Estate Services**

The Office of Real Estate Services is responsible for administering the laws, regulations, and policies affecting the protection and management of trust and restricted lands of individual Indian landowners and the land owned by the Cherokee Nation itself, located within the 14 county area of the Cherokee Nation. Real Estate Services operates under a Self-Governance Compact with the Secretary of the Interior.

# II. Program Highlights:

- 1. Appraisals. One appraisal was ordered during the month.
- 2. <u>Purchases</u>. Three tracts were purchased during the month of December. One 10-acre tract in Adair County; four lots in Sequoyah County; and a one-acre tract in Delaware County.

- 3. <u>Last Will and Testaments</u>. One LW&T was prepared and endorsed; two new interviews were taken; one new draft prepared to date.
- 4. <u>Quiet Title Notices</u>. Four quiet title notices were received from the Solicitor's office, researched and returned.
- 5. Report for Distribution. One RFD was requested, researched and submitted to BIA.
- 6. Inventory/Heirship. Five inventory heirships were requested and returned.
- 7. <u>Leases/Permits</u>. One Trust related agriculture lease was submitted; another one is pending. Four new restricted hunting leases were submitted to BIA for approval.
- 8. <u>Environmental Reviews</u>. Four categorical exclusions were requested; three were completed.
- 9. <u>Rights of Way</u>. One Trust-related right of way was approved; two are pending. One Tribal-related right is pending.
- 10. <u>Rights of Entry</u>, <u>Service Line Agreements</u>. Eleven rights of entry were requested and completed; one SLA was submitted.
- 11. <u>On-Site Inspections; home visit.</u> Four on-site inspections were requested and completed; two home visits were made.
- 12. Trespass issues. Two trespass issues were addressed.
- 13. Maps/platting. 12 requests for maps/platting assistance were received and completed.
- 14. Land status calls. 25 land status verification calls were completed during the month.
- 15. <u>District Court Probates.</u> All new probate applications are being researched in preparation for filing in District Court.
- 16. <u>Financial transactions.</u> During the month of December, \$44,900.05 was processed as lease payments and \$171,894.51 was processed through lockbox.
- 17. <u>Research</u>. Two staffers continue performing multi-county research.
- 18. <u>TAAMS</u>. Encoding for the TAAMS project has been awaiting re-opening of EORO; however, plans are being made to perform in-house encoding in the upcoming year. Currently, three staffers are performing final review and updates.
- 19. Impact Aid. Two impact aid verifications were requested and completed.
- 20. <u>Stats</u>. 94 client sign-ins; 85 phone inquiries; 113 obituaries were processed. (These were for a two month period).

The Cherokee Nation Environmental Programs is committed to protect, preserve, and restore in a sustainable manner our Nation's naturally diverse ecosystems for the health and benefit of future generations.

# Clean Air Program:

• Ozone season for Oklahoma ended on November 30; staff performed the final checks on the monitors at the Roland and Pryor sites before pulling them for annual maintenance. The ozone monitors at the mobile and Stilwell sites operate year-round.

#### Clean Water Program:

• Staff sampled Sallisaw Creek, Baron Fork Creek, Spring Creek and Saline Creek for water quality; samples were sent to Green Country Testing for analysis on Ammonia, Chloride, TDS, Total Phosphorus, Sulfate, Nitrate, Nitrite, and TKN.

# **Underground Storage Tanks Program:**

• Staff performed a monthly site visual inspection at the Outpost 1 and at the Roland Travel Plaza. There were no findings at either location.

#### **Special Projects:**

- Staff completed 14 Environmental Screens for housing rehab and replacement projects funded by CN Tribal Funds.
- Staff has received the request to conduct a Phase I ESA Report for the Dotson-Roberts-Peace Pavilion for a Fee to Trust Package. This project is still ongoing.
- Staff did receive 2 request for Special Project work for the Tahlequah and Kenwood Speaker Villages. Staff completed the Tahlequah Speaker's Village Property Phase I ESA Report. These projects are still ongoing.

# **General Assistance Program**

- Staff held a Town Branch litter pick-up event in Tahlequah in cooperation with the City of Tahlequah Storm Water Management on October 27, 2022. Approximately 15 staff picked up trash and recyclable materials along the creek and in the parks.
- Staff will hosting an E-Waste collection event on December 2<sup>nd</sup> in the parking area on the north side of the CN Warehouse, in Tahlequah. The event is open to the public.

#### Miscellaneous:

• Staff is working on future activities for the Tribal Sustainable Food Initiate and will be reaching out to one or two area schools to participate. In addition, staff is planning to conduct a food audit at Sequoyah High School.

• Staff held an E-waste collection event in Tahlequah in which they collected some 4,500 lbs. of electronics.

#### THE INTER-TRIBAL ENVIRONMENTAL COUNCIL

Inter-Tribal Environmental Council (ITEC) is a consortium of Native American tribes from Oklahoma, Louisiana, Texas, and New Mexico. *CNEP serves the consortia as the lead environmental agency.* In this capacity, CNEP provides technical assistance, data analysis, multi-media sampling, and training opportunities to the 44 member tribes. These efforts are funded under the following programs:

#### **ITEC Technical Assistance:**

- Staff performed independent audits on air monitors for the Quapaw Nation and for the Fort Sill Apache Tribe.
- Staff completed the Seneca Cayuga Nation's Public Facility Construction Property Phase I Environmental Site Assessment (ESA).
- Staff began work on the Phase I Environmental Site Assessment (ESA) for the Thlopthlocco Tribal Town for the Morrow Property.

# ITEC Underground Storage Tanks Program (UST):

 Staff provided an on-site inspection training, inspection and testing for the Otoe-Missouria Tribe, the Tonkawa Tribe, and for the Seminole Nation's Department of Commerce.
