



Provalus is growing at a rapid pace. The Provalus team in Tahlequah has been fully operational for about 6 months, with a projected multi-million dollar economic impact on the local community over the next five years. Their goal is to bring new jobs to the area in the form of technology and support positions.

Since coming to Tahlequah they have hired over 200 full time employees. A number of our Career Services Clients and Cherokee citizens have gained full time jobs working there.

The new space in Tahlequah is currently in the works to become a fully revitalized technology center! With the rapid growth, we're excited to see what the future has in store for them.

Cherokee Nation Career Services participant now employed with Career Services



Seth Martin is a former Career Services program participant with the American Rescue Plan Act. ARPA provides relief funds to state, local, and tribal governments that have been negatively impacted by the coronavirus pandemic. He is now a full-time employee in the office where he was trained. "I am a Tahlequah, Oklahoma, native. I was born and raised here," said Martin. "I got my first job as a cart pusher at the local grocery store at fifteen years old and then spent a short time in college." Martin felt he wasn't fully committed to being a student so he decided to leave school and explore different career opportunities. "I was just getting started and didn't know if I wanted an office job or an outside job," said Martin. "I started out as a forklift driver and eventually became an ironworker. I was able to help build towers and skyscrapers all over the United States. Another position I had was as the team lead in a large shipping and receiving warehouse. Unfortunately, the Covid-

19 pandemic came along and I was laid off." Martin, like many others, was very despondent over losing his job. He didn't know where to turn or how to move forward because he had never been unemployed. That's when he received a call from Cherokee Nation Career Services. "My sister had been a participant with Career Services and she asked her counselor to reach out and see if they could assist me with job training or some type of

employment opportunity," said Martin. "I was just a guy who was down on his luck, looking for any type of work, and they trained me for job that I hope will be a career for a long time." Martin was placed in the Career Services administration office and eventually hired as an Administrative Clerk. "I get to plan and oversee job fairs, construction hiring events, ribbon cuttings, and pretty much everything that our public relations group does to promote the programs Career Services provides," said Martin. "I feel really lucky to be with Career Services. I work with some great people and they help me grow professionally every day. I learn something different from each person. I definitely owe everything to Career Services and look forward to working for the Cherokee Nation for a long time."



Gadugi Portal Call Center – Gina Blackfox, Director

Five 9 – Call Center Software. The new software has definitely had a positive impact on how interactions are processed. Citizens now have an option to choose which campaign they are applying to and the call is transferred to the assigned agent who has been designated as the subject expert. The caller may choose to leave a message in the queue for a call back rather than being placed on hold. This new system has provided consistency on responses to callers and has improved the work environment tremendously. The software also provides the supervisor with real time statistics regarding call volume, subjects, and the length of conversation. The program provides the ability to listen in on calls or refer to recordings to review calls. The program has definitely made an overall improvement on greater customer service to Cherokee citizens.

The call center has taken 9866 total calls and interactions as of 3/30/23.






Small Business Lending Impact 2010 through 2023 by County


