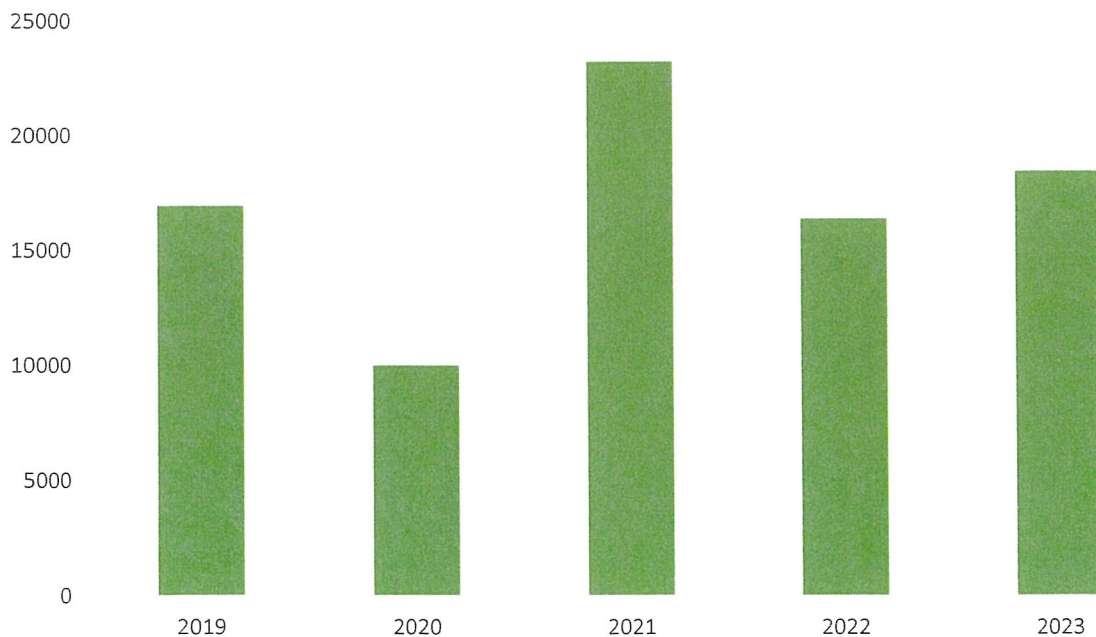

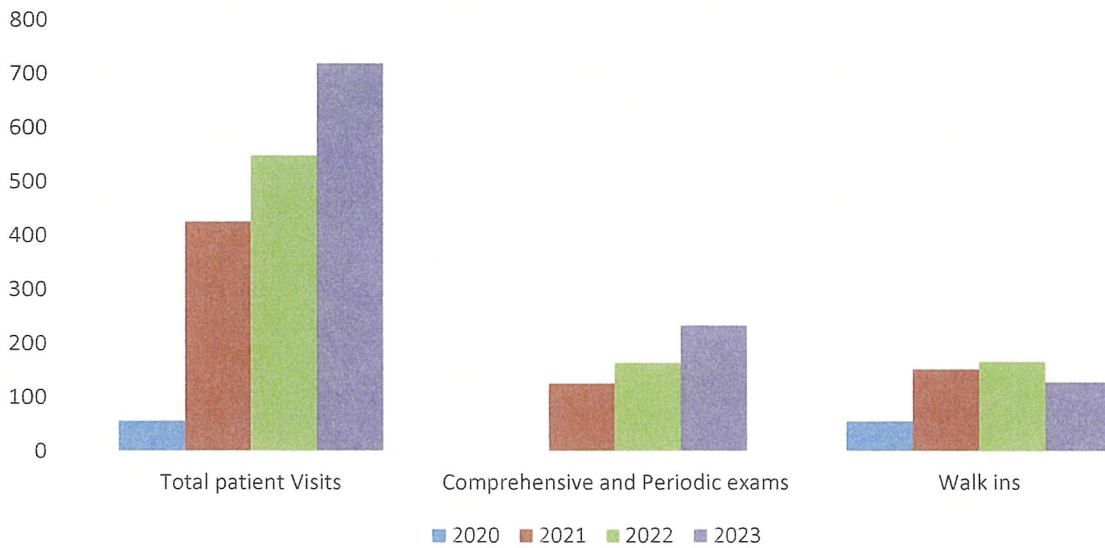

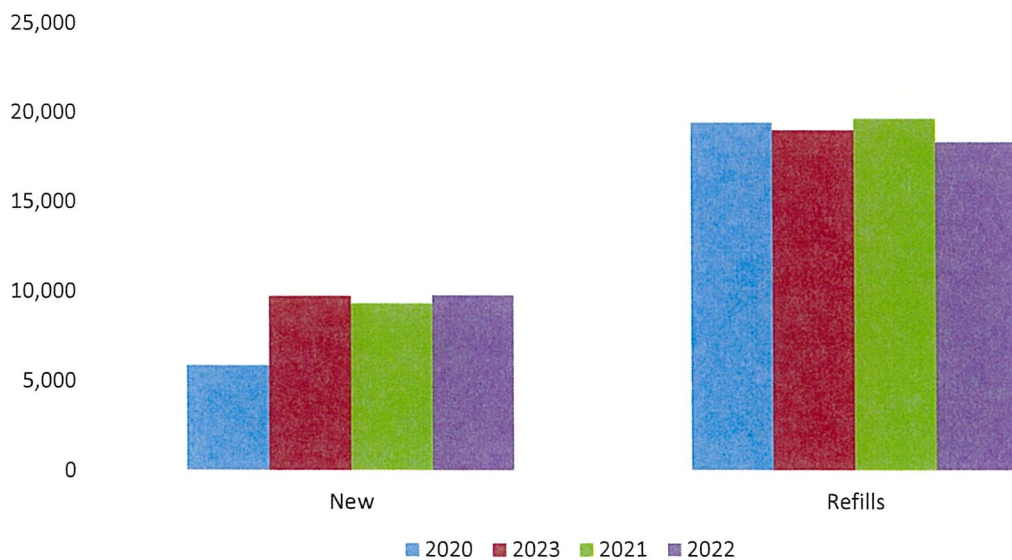
Ambulatory Care Visits Month of April 2019-2023



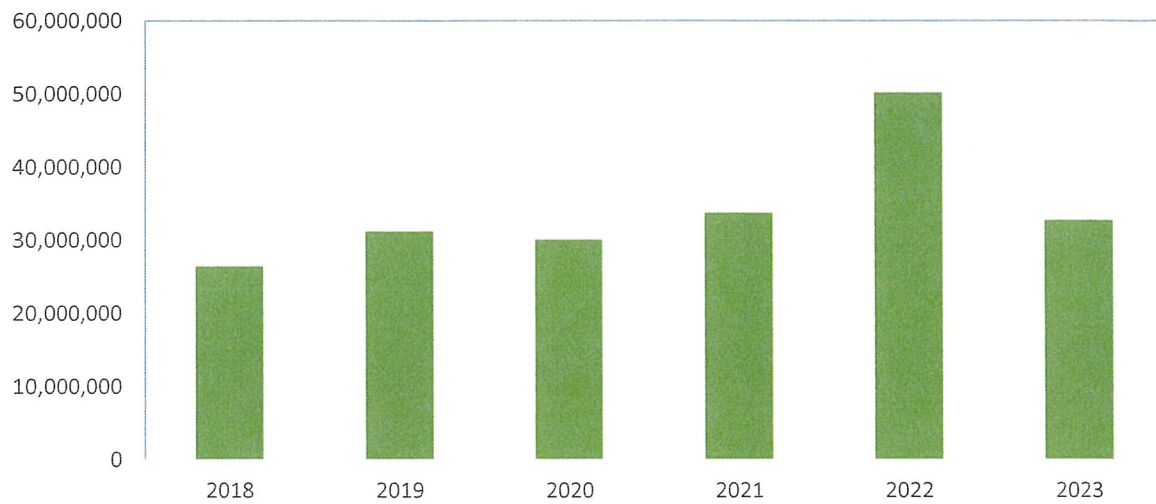
Dental Services Month of April 2020-2023

Highlights

SHHC Oklahoma Health Care Authority staff was onsite to do a site visit of CNHS Physical Therapy. No non conformities were noted on their report.

During the month of April Community Health went to Grove St. Center, Eucha Community Center, Kennwood St. Center and Kansas St. Center to provide blood pressure and/or DM screenings. Community Health Nurses also help Public Educators to do blood pressure screenings at their Community Walk. OBI was on site for Blood Mobile – 33 total donors.

VHC Began virtual new employee orientation to reduce time and expense created by travelling. The Goal will be to roll this out to all other health centers in the coming months.

Misc- Health Departments completed a site visit for the Vaccine for Children's (VFC) program and there were no non conformities noted. Noteworthy efforts were the volume of doses provided from VFC stock with no lost vaccine.

Patient Compliments-

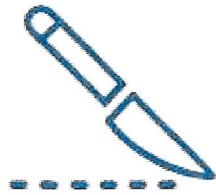

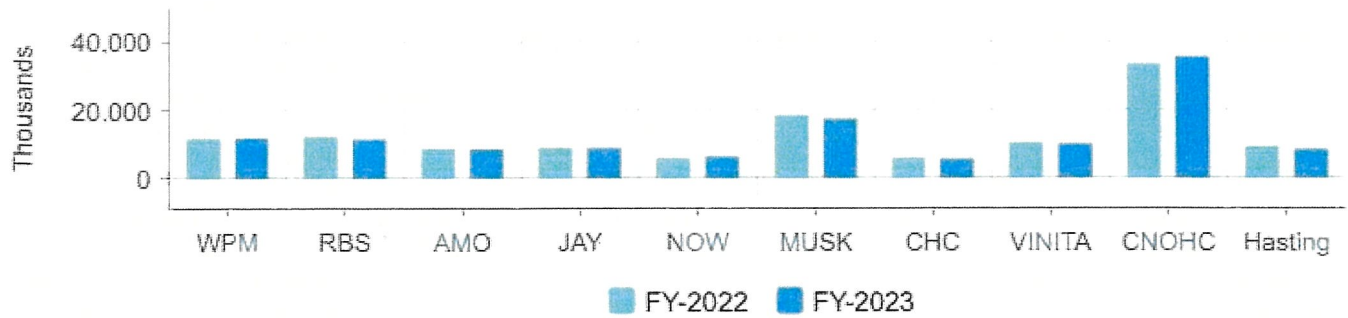

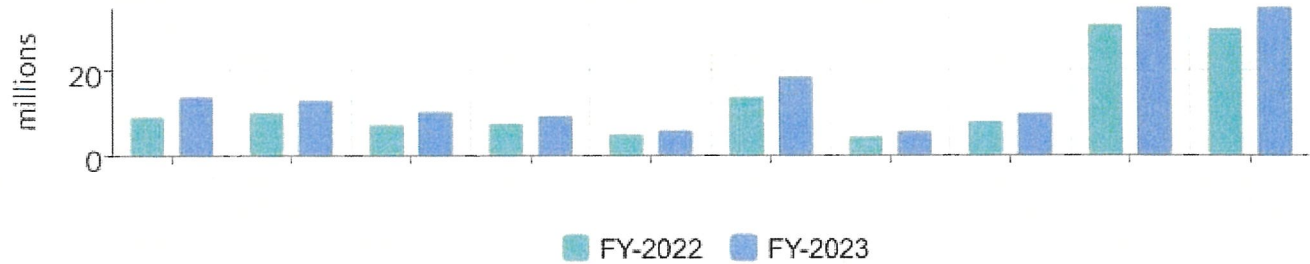

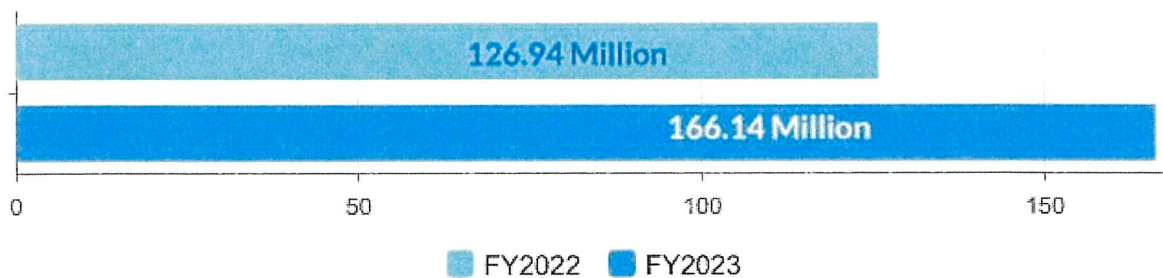
Ambulatory Care Visits: Monthly



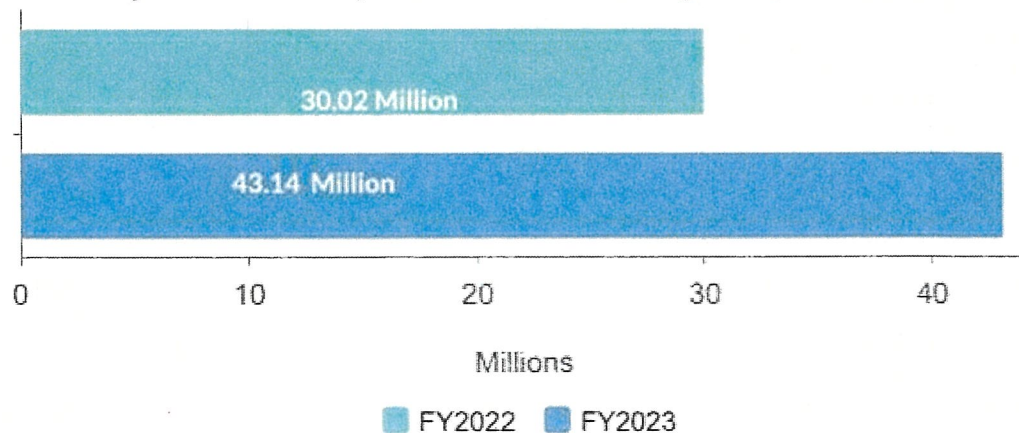
Ambulatory Care 3rd Party Revenue; Year To date



Third Party Revenues Combined: Year to Date



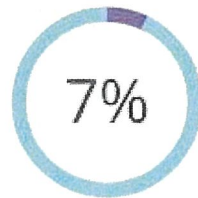
Third Party Revenue Comparison CN WW Hastings Hospital Year to Date



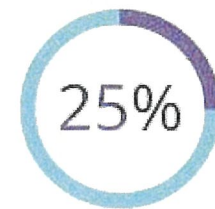

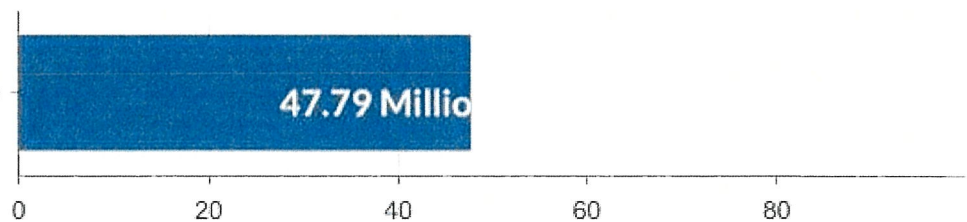

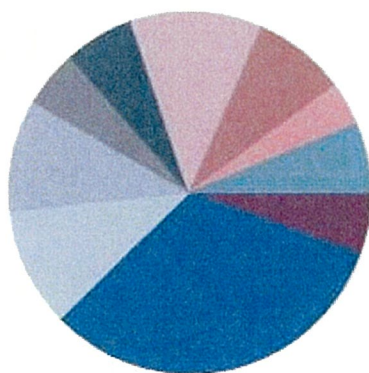

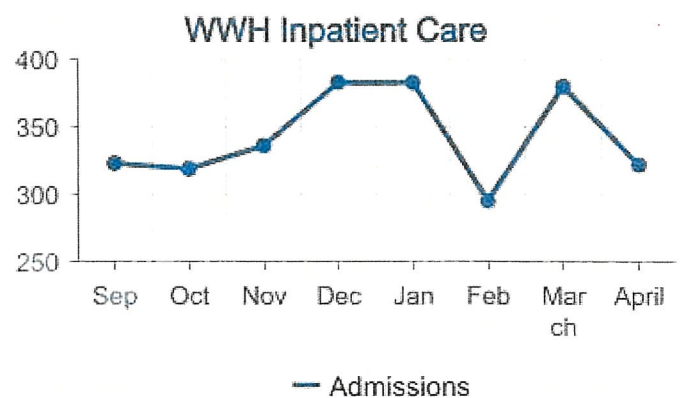
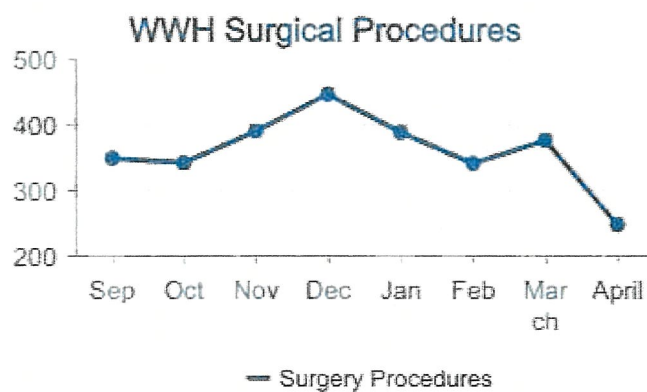
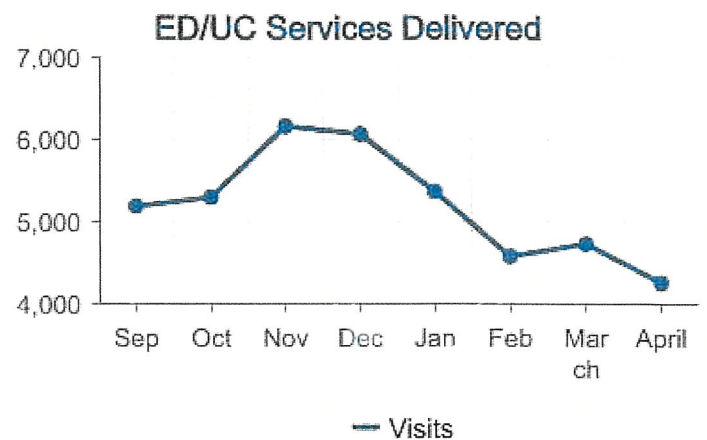
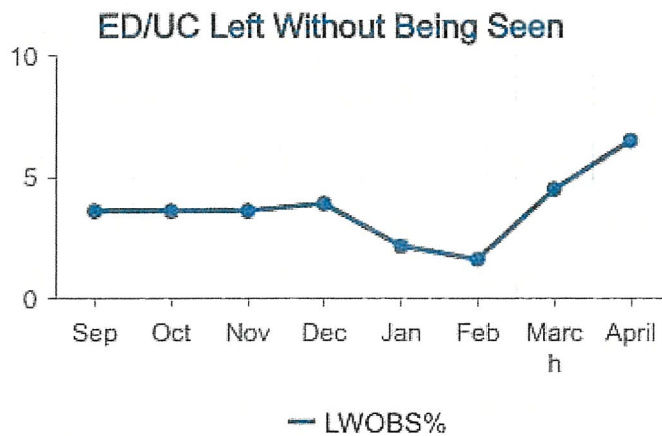
CHS Monthly Referrals by Location



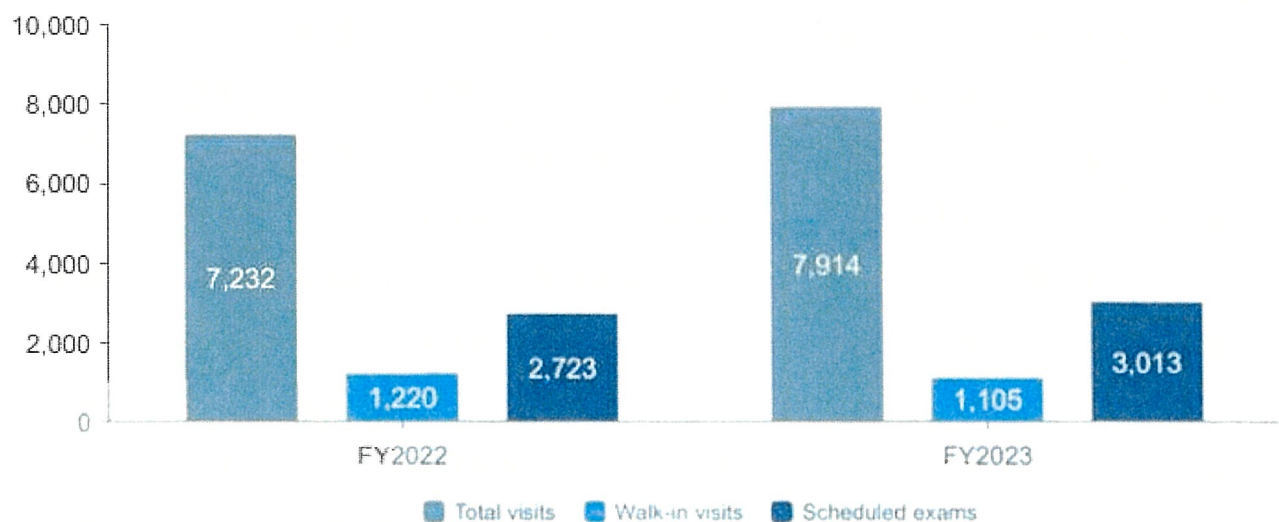
YTD CHS Spend by Location

Working Together Initiative:

Phase 1: Cherokee Nation Public Health (CNPH) launched *Working Together*, an initiative to bring partners together across Cherokee Nation to better understand and address the multiple social, cultural, economic, and environmental conditions that influence Cherokee well-being. A Working Together Team was then formed to review engagement outcomes, and to work towards the following goals:

- Create a shared vision for Cherokee Wellness
- Create a wellness framework reflective of the social and cultural determinants of health.
- Identify indicators to determine how wellness will be measured.

Phase 2 of the project which includes finalization of Cherokee Indicators of Wellness, expanded inclusion of staff from additional programs, and initial collaborative data collection and evaluation started in February. Additional leadership from Health Services, Career Services, Community Services, Indian Child Welfare, and Natural Resources have joined the team since the last report. Phase 2 work has been focused on continued development of the framework as well as individual department meetings to identify potential measurable indicators. Meetings are scheduled monthly for the remainder of 2023 with the next meetings scheduled for July 27, 2023.

Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) Tribal Advisory Committee (TAC):

- TAC Chair Deputy Chief Warner and Authorized Representative Lisa Pivec continue work with CN Government Relations staff to provide input to CDC. The Summer TAC meeting is in the planning stages and will be held on the Oneida Reservation in Wisconsin in September 2023. Deputy Chief Warner TAC and Ms. Pivec are working with CDC leadership to revise language in CDC funding opportunities to be consistent with self-determination and remove requirements for state authorization. To date 2 funding opportunities have been revised after publication to recognize tribal sovereignty.

CDC and the TAC are working together to develop a process to ensure published funding opportunities have the appropriate language.

National Association of City County Health Officials (NACCHO):

- Cherokee Nation Public Health Interim Executive Director, Lisa Pivec, was elected to the Board of Directors representing Tribal Public Health Departments. NACCHO is the only organization dedicated to serving every local health department in the nation. NACCHO serves 3000 local health departments and is the leader in providing cutting-edge, skill-building, professional resources and programs, seeking health equity, and supporting effective local public health practice and systems. Ms. Pivec was elected recently to serve on the governance committee of NACCHO.
