Alternative Education, Career Skills, and Testing Report

Program Highlights

Adult Education celebrated seven new GED graduates during the month of February. This brings the total number of graduates this fiscal year to 33. Recruitment efforts were focused on the Tulsa area this past month and we are beginning to see new clients coming in from this area. Cherokee Nation Business Technology Program started the new semester on February 26th. The participants have completed their Orientation and are already working on MOS 365 programs. They spent their first week completing a variety of Employability Skills trainings and team building exercises. Career Skills Instructors held a total of 13 trainings this month. Departments participating in the trainings were: HACN, TLJC, Business Technology, Gadugi Call Center, and Building and Trades. The HACN classes will continue weekly through April.

Upcoming Program Initiatives

Career Exploration planning is in full force. We are very excited about this year's four day per week schedule as it allows us to have a strong cultural focus. The first three weeks of the six week program are planned and we are currently working on the last three weeks and the banquet. This year the program will be in Cherokee County and will have openings for fifteen students ages 14-15. Applications will be available March 18th online and at the Career Services Learning Center.

Building Trades Program

In the dynamic month of February, our Building Trades students embarked on a journey filled with new challenges, marking significant milestones in their pursuit of excellence. These dedicated individuals, trailblazers in their own right, courageously tackled the first two module exams as part of their quest for National Center for Construction Education (NCCER) credentials.

With unwavering determination, our students triumphed over the construction safety and hand tools exams, setting a strong foundation for their future endeavors. As they gear up for the next module exam on power tools in the upcoming weeks, their enthusiasm and commitment remain steadfast.

Recognizing the importance of a comprehensive approach to learning, we have strategically planned the sequence of module exams. While the construction math module awaits, we believe it will be most beneficial for our students to tackle it towards the end, allowing them to build upon their existing knowledge and skills. This module encompasses a diverse array of mathematical concepts, from manipulating fractions to calculating areas and volumes, ensuring our students are equipped with a robust understanding of mathematical principles essential in the construction industry.

In addition to academic pursuits, our students have actively engaged in practical training opportunities. They recently completed a 10-hour Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA) course, underscoring their commitment to safety standards in the workplace. Furthermore, our Life Skills Class, focused on the potential ramifications of substance abuse and the importance of responsible behavior, provided invaluable insights for personal and professional growth.

Amidst their academic and practical endeavors, our students have embarked on creative projects that showcase their craftsmanship and ingenuity. From crafting personalized rocking chairs to mastering the intricacies of power tools, they are honing their skills while unleashing their creativity. A friendly competition awaits as we invite guests to evaluate their creations, with the winner earning a well-deserved lunch courtesy of their instructor.

Meanwhile, hands-on experiences continue within our workshop, where students delve into the art of sheetrock repair. Guided by their instructor, they learn the intricacies of patching holes and repairing damages, invaluable skills that will serve them well in their future roles in facility maintenance.

Looking ahead, our students eagerly anticipate the opportunity to give back to the community through volunteering with Habitat for Humanity. As they participate in the construction of a home, they will gain practical experience in layout planning, sheathing, and operating essential tools, further enriching their skill set and fostering a spirit of altruism.

Vocational Rehabilitation

Vocational Rehabilitation (VR) counselors attended various outreach activities this month including:

- People with Disabilities Awareness Day in Oklahoma City at the Oklahoma History
 Center. This event was sponsored by the Oklahoma Department of Rehabilitation
 Services. There were 70 organizations or programs represented. Cherokee Nation
 Vocational Rehabilitation shared a table with the Oklahoma Tribal Vocational
 Rehabilitation Council (OKTVR) which consists of the 10 tribal vocational rehabilitation
 programs in Oklahoma.
- 2. Mayes County Career Expo in Pryor at the Mid-America Expo Center. The schools represented were: Pryor High School, Adair High School, Chouteau-Mazie High School, Claremore Sequoyah High School, and the Thunderbird Youth Academy.

- 3. Talking Leaves Job Corps Student Training Exposition at Job Corps. Attendees included: representatives from the Green Country Workforce Development Board, Cherokee Nation Career Services (Diane Kelley), Workforce Director for Mid-America Industrial Park, Vocational Rehabilitation and Job Corps Outreach. This event was to identify resources available for Talking Leaves Job Corps students.
- 4. Cultivating Cherokee Traditions in Pryor at the Mid-America Expo Center. Resource tables included at the event were: Career Services, JOBS/Tribal TANF, Vocational Rehabilitation, Talking Leaves Job Corps, CN Human Services, CN Food Distribution, CN Foundation, CN Education, CN Childcare, CN Head Start, CN WIC, and Oklahoma Works. Activities included: corn husk doll making, beading, basket weaving, and other activities. This event was sponsored by Career Services TANF and Youth Programs.

Vocational Rehabilitation now has a Quick Response code (QR) that when scanned will direct the person to the VR page on the CN website. This will enable the person to view the information regarding VR, eligibility criteria, documents needed, and download the application for services along with the Program email address to send the application. The QR code will be included on Program flyers and brochures. The Program is also working on having the application, on the website, be a fillable document. This will make it easier for the consumer to get the completed application to the Program.

Nursing Scholarship Program:

The Cherokee Nation Registered Nursing Scholarship Program stands as a beacon of opportunity, offering vital financial support to aspiring Cherokee students pursuing an Associate of Applied Science in Nursing degree. This initiative not only nurtures individual ambitions but also serves a greater purpose: to fortify our Cherokee Nation by cultivating a cadre of skilled nurses dedicated to advancing the health and well-being of our communities.

At the heart of our program lies a commitment to "growing our own" Cherokee nurses, a commitment underscored by our pledge to cover the entirety of their nursing education expenses. Upon graduation, these scholars enter into a Contract Service Agreement, pledging their expertise to Cherokee Nation Health Services. This dual commitment not only addresses the pressing nursing shortage but also ensures the seamless staffing of critical inpatient and outpatient positions across our healthcare facilities, including those in the forthcoming new hospital.

In Spring 2024, our scholarship program welcomed a cohort of five exceptional Cherokee Citizens, selected from a pool of 12 applicants following rigorous interviews. These scholars hail from various corners of our nation, representing a diverse array of hometowns. Among them are four bright minds embarking on their nursing journey at Connors College, commencing their studies on January 16th, and one determined student commencing studies at Carl Albert State College on January 17th.

Career Services staff were proud to attend a ribbon cutting event of our Vocational Training Partner, 160 Driving Academy, in Tulsa. The event marked the grand opening of a new location in Midtown Tulsa, a testament to the academy's commitment to addressing the prevalent worker shortage.

At the 160 Driving Academy, individuals can enroll in a comprehensive 4-week course comprising 160 hours to obtain their Commercial Driver's License (CDL), equipping them with essential skills for the transportation industry.

During the event, discussions centered on the introduction of a new Learning Management System (LMS) program, designed to facilitate seamless follow-up for all our students engaged with 160 Driving Academy. Notably, the presence of 160's Regional and General Manager underscored the significance of this collaboration.



CHEROKEE NATION FOUNDATION PROGRAM REPORT

April 2024

ACT Prep

Cherokee Nation Foundation offers several ACT prep opportunities throughout the year for Native American students preparing for the national exam. The free courses are currently offered in a virtual format and are designed for students in grades 10-12, with preference given to Cherokee Nation citizens. Participating students must be registered for the upcoming National ACT exams. Students register on the website at Cherokeenationfoundation.org if they would like to participate.

Testing With Success Workshops

Shelly Beaty, Testing with Success, is scheduling Zoom ACT workshops with our schools and individual students (on Saturdays) who wish to have a virtual option. The ACT sessions cover all subjects and through guided practice illustrates the copyrighted strategies that have shown phenomenal results on recent tests. See various workshops and descriptions below:

<u>CNF-Academic Achievement Services from</u> <u>Elementary to Grad School</u>

ACT Advanced Workshop (9th thru 12th grade): Due to the pandemic and vast learning loss among all students, CNF has decided to include 9th & 10th grade students to participate in our indepth ACT study course. Studies have shown that this current generation needs repetitive skill building, as well as visually guided practice to grasp, and ultimately master, the concepts needed to achieve higher scores on this difficult test. By including these lower grades, students will "see" and "retain" vital subject related objectives that may have been lost during the lack of educational time due to covid. Each participate will receive ACT materials that will show different ACT examples year to year. and they will receive updated copyrighted strategies over each section. They will also be offered other testing resources when needed once they begin actually testing.

ACT Virtual At Large Sessions: The NEW ACT virtual sessions will help Cherokee students across the United States and not just the Oklahoma students. Each participate

will receive the copyrighted strategies in each subject, as well as two current ACT practice exams. They will also receive email access to the testing specialist for clarification of missed questions, and extra testing resources when needed. ACT virtual workshops are offered prior to every National Test in September, October, December, April, and June.

GRE Strategies Testing Workshop: (Advanced Studies/College Students): The loss of educational advancement due to COVID-19 did not just happen for elementary, and secondary students, but for college students, as well. Many college students who have decided to further their academic goals and future careers by attending graduate schools are struggling to pass the mandatory GRE examination that is required for degree acceptance. This test prep workshop offered by CNF gives vital strategies for passing this advanced studies test. Each college participate will receive copyrighted strategies. and subject specific study materials to achieve passing scores to submit to the college of their choice. This session will be virtual in format so Cherokee, and other native students. across the U.S. can participate in this needed program.

OSAT & Praxis Teacher Certification Test Prep: Perspective Oklahoma Educators are now required to take, and pass, the Oklahoma Subject Assessment Tests(s), and/or the Praxis Subject Specific Assessment exam to receive certification in the state of Oklahoma. The Praxis exam is also valid and used in many other states across the U.S. Many teachers are finding it difficult to pass these mandatory examinations. They are also experiencing some learning challenges in this post covid climate. CNF is offering a test prep course for future Cherokee educators to help pass the Lower, Middle, & Advanced Level certification tests in all core subjects (English, History, Math, & Science). Each participate will receive copyrighted strategies for passing the lengthy multiple-choice section, as well as the constructed response essay section for each subject specific test. They will also receive other resources, as well as guided practice, to help pass any of the testing certification requirements.

3rd thru 8th Grade OSTP Workshops: Oklahoma third grade & fourth grade students are struggling to pass the mandatory state tests, especially in the loss of educational instruction due to the pandemic, and CNF is now wanting to include them in our successful OSTP workshops. These sessions give students the copyrighted strategies to pass with a proficient and/or an Advanced pass score on the ELA, Math, as well as Science, and Writing for 5th & 8th grade state required examinations. The subject specific skills needed to achieve success are built upon, year after year, and the foundational elements needed to master many educational concepts is formed when drawing in the younger students. Cherokee College Prep Institute

The Cherokee College Prep Institute (CCPI) is a college-readiness program designed to increase the percentage of Cherokee students completing their college education.



CCPI 2024 will be held at Rogers State University, in Claremore, Oklahoma, July 21-25. Cherokee Nation Foundation will partner with Cornell University, Duke University, Northeastern State University, Oklahoma State University, Rogers State University, Swarthmore College, Syracuse University, University of Central Oklahoma, University of Oklahoma, University of Minnesota, University of Pennsylvania, and Yale University to offer free college admissions workshops in July 2024.

Representatives from participating universities will discuss the college admissions process and share what highly selective schools are looking for, how admissions decisions are made, and how students can best prepare. Other workshop topics included:

Junior Achievement

The Cherokee Junior Achievement program is part of a financial literacy initiative backed by the Cherokee Nation Foundation and Cherokee Nation Businesses. The program serves students by teaching and promoting financial literacy concepts and skills students will take with them as they enter college and the work force. During the COVID-19 pandemic, Junior Achievement successfully converted these programs to a virtual format as well.

Junior Achievement

JA Biztown- combines in class learning with a day long visit to a simulated, fully interactive town. The program helps students make the connection between what they learn in school and the real world.

Financial Literacy-This unit introduces students to bank services and practices that will help them be successful at JA BizTown and in life. Students begin to understand the basics of deposits, checks, and withdrawals, and they build on that knowledge to understand electronic banking and bank cards.
