GED TESTING UPDATE - February 13, 2014

Career Services has worked diligently these last few months to upgrade our GED testing system to meet the requirements for the state mandated 2014 Computer Based GED Test. Previous years we have performed paper based testing so the change has been an extensive one for us. We have had to remodel existing areas as well as obtain new equipment, furniture and supplies. The change has also involved procuring and installing new software.

With this change we planned to have three assessment centers as follows....

Stilwell

This assessment center is officially open for testing and is located in our Career Services Stilwell Office. The center is currently open Tuesdays, Wednesdays and Thursdays from 8:30am to 4:30pm.

Tahlequah

This assessment center is officially open for testing and is located in the WW Keeler Tribal Complex next to Career Services. The center is currently open Tuesdays, Wednesdays and Thursdays from 8:30am to 4:30pm.


Pryor

Work on this center has begun this week with revisions being made first to the HVAC. This center will be located in the same building that houses the Career Services Pryor Literacy Center in Cherokee Heights. We hope to have this center open by May 2014.

In addition to these three centers we are in the process of trying to establish an MOU with Sallisaw Public Schools to provide one person to administer the GED Test at their Adult Learning Site up to two days a month.

In addition to the new computer based GED testing we will be able to provide the Certification Examinations for Oklahoma Educators (CEOE) and we will continue to provide MOUS Certifications in our Tahlequah Assessment Center as well as WorkKeys Career Readiness Certifications and the OKCIS Interest/Aptitude assessment at all of our locations.

We have four individual that are certified to administer the new GED test via computer. Two staff are primary and the other two staff will serve as backups in addition to their regular job duties.
