Key Project Summary

Capital Projects

- Cherokee National Capitol Update:
 - The exterior masonry restoration began the first week of March and includes stripping paint from the brick, replacement of deteriorated brick, tuck-pointing and sealing the masonry. When complete, the masonry will be restored to the original, historic appearance. Work is being done by Builders Unlimited, a TERO vendor, and should be complete by Cherokee National Holiday 2015.
- Saline Courthouse:
 - Master planning and architectural development including bridge evaluation and a plan to rebuild a bridge or relocate the entry route is currently underway.

Museum Promotions

- Cherokee Nation Museums have launched a new schedule of cultural classes, lecture series, and events including a Spring Break event on March 19, with activities for children and free admission. Check VisitCherokeeNation.com for event info.
