

## TOTAL AMBULATORY PATIENTS VISITS -FEBRUARY 2015





## TOP FIVE AMBULATORY CARE DIAGNOSIS FOR CNHSG, FEBRUARY 2015




# Third Party Revenue By Clinic, FEBRUARY 2015 (YEAR TO-DATE)



- I attended the Cherokee Nation Legislative Day on February 18, 2015, and also served as Nurse of the Day at the Oklahoma State Capitol.
- On Thursday, February 26<sup>th</sup>, we hosted a group from Storz Endoskope to continue our work on pilot projects between Cherokee Nation Health Services and Storz.
- During the evening of February 26<sup>th</sup>, I attended and helped present during the Cherokee Nation Health Services Awards Ceremony.
- Throughout February, we experienced inclement weather and relied heavily upon our Facilities Management staff to conduct snow and ice clearing operations. Our providers and staff exhibited a great dedication to maintaining operations regardless of the challenges presented by the weather. In particular, our ambulance crews demonstrated great fortitude as they continued to respond to emergency calls and conducted transfers as soon as road conditions were deemed to be passable.

#### **Announcements**

• The Hastings Auxiliary purchased two mobile device charging stations to provide a convenient way for patients to recharge their electronic devices; the devices have been stationed in the Dining Room and in the ED's large waiting area so that patients and visitors can have access to a quick recharge for their mobile phones.

#### **Achievements**

- On February 4<sup>th</sup>, in recognition of the efforts by our Orthopedic Clinic providers and staff in eliminating the waiting list for major orthopedic procedures (e.g., hip and knee arthroplasty, carpal tunnel release, etc.), an ice cream social was provided for the providers and staff to express appreciation for their hard work and diligence in working through our backlog of patients awaiting these life-changing procedures.
- Dana Mann, one of our Respiratory Therapists has passed the Neonatal Pediatric Specialist (NPS) exam, offered by
  the National Board of Respiratory Care. The NPS exam objectively measures the essential skills and abilities required
  of the Respiratory Therapist to provide treatment and evaluation for patients with respiratory insufficiencies and
  attend high risk deliveries as part of our neonatal resuscitation team.

#### **Volume**

- The ED and Urgent Care treated 6,196 patients during February 2015 and experienced a Left Without Being Seen (LWOBS) rate of 2.35% in the ED and 7.34% in Urgent Care.. ED Arrival to Discharge time held at 153 minutes, 12 minutes above our goal; ED Arrival to Transfer was 311 minutes; ED Arrival to Admission to Med-Surg was 341 minutes and ED Arrival to Admission to ICU was 289 minutes.
- Surgical Services performed 362 surgical procedures during February 2015.
- Transport Services transported 101 patients during February and traveled 5,173 miles.

- Breast and Cervical cancer early detection Program The program served 193 Indian/Cherokee women (Clinical Breast Exam, Mammograms, Ultrasound, Pap smear, HPV testing, Colposcopy with or without biopsy) at the cost of \$22,136.14. Educational events were held at Vinita, Bartlesville, Sam Hider Jay HC's and Claremore Indian Hospital.
- Cancer Registry—The program is in the process of hiring a new registrar. Presently the Cherokee Cancer Registry now has a total of **7,042 cases** in the SEER\*DMS system. **Top Cancer Sites**: Lung and Bronchus, Breast, Prostate, Kidney and Renal Pelvis.
- CN Emergency Medical Service—CN-EMS handled 373 calls, of those 124 required emergency transport, 115 were transferred. In addition program provided EMS training to 732 participants of those 255 were Native Americans.
- Behavioral Health Services—Behavioral Health provided mental health and substance abuse services to 1815 patients, of those 1139 were unduplicated patients. Of the patients served at the Tahlequah and CIH sites, 958 were Cherokees citizens.
- **Jack Brown Center** The new location of the JBC up and running. The JBC served a total of **22** clients of those 14 were males and 08 were females.


