The Big Event is a one-day event that allows Northeastern State University students, faculty and staff to say "thank you" to members and businesses of the Tahlequah community for their continued support. NSU is allowing a few extra community organizations, including TLJC staff and students, to participate in the day's activities. The Big Event jobs include painting houses, raking, weeding, cleaning, window washing, working school carnivals and much more!
