a.) Motor Vehicle

- 1. Year to Date Motor Vehicle revenue for FY15 compared to FY14 as of July 31st 2015 & July 31st 2014, had an overall increase of 24.17%.
- 2. The month to month revenue comparison for July 2014 (FY14) compared to July 2015 (FY15) shows an increase of 18.08%.



Description of Budget exceptions: No budget exceptions to report. Two of three Self Governance Analyst positions are vacant.

II. Program Highlights

1. Indian Health Service Contract Support Costs Workgroup:

The Indian Health Service (IHS) Contract Support Costs Workgroup met in Phoenix, Arizona on August 24th-25th. Vickie Hanvey is a technical representative to the Workgroup for the Oklahoma City Area. Mickey Peercy from Choctaw Nation and Rhonda Butcher from Citizen Potawatomi Nation are the Workgroup members for the Oklahoma City Area. Topics discussed at the meeting included Direct Contract Support Costs, Fixed rate/lump sum proposals, contract/compact amendments language, and revising the CSC policy. There were presentations made by the DOI- Interior Business Center and the HHS- Division of Cost Allocation regarding the indirect cost negotiation process. Ms. Hanvey is part of a subworkgroup to analyze "carryforward" and "cost incurred" approaches.

2. National Indian and Native American Employment and Training Conference:

Self-Governance staff attended the 36th Annual National Indian and Native American Employment and Training Conference in Durant, OK. Vickie Hanvey served as a panelist for the "BIA Contract Support Costs: 101 Training" sessions. The training was targeted at tribes that were either new or exploring entering self-governance compacting or contracting of BIA programs. Staff also attended several breakout sessions and trainings related to submission of PL 102-477 financial and statistical reporting. Vickie Hanvey accepted the "Division Chief's Award" from Mr. Terry Parks, Acting Division Chief of the BIA Office of Indian Services Division of Workforce Development, on behalf of Cherokee Nation's 102-477 Program. Each year, one tribe operating employment and career training programs under a PL 102-477 Plan is selected as the "Chief's Award" winner. The Nation's 102-477 Program consists of programs operated by Career Services and Child Care.





3. Department of the Interior FY 2016 Reprogramming Request:

The Self-Governance Office recently received a draft copy of its FY 2016 Reprogramming Request and its accompanying footnotes from the Department of the Interior Office of Self-Governance. The Reprogramming Request serves as an estimate of funding that Cherokee Nation will receive via its Multi-year Funding Agreement (MFA) with the DOI in FY 2016. Self-Governance staff has reviewed the Reprogramming Request and submitted them to administration for approval. The Reprogramming Request must be executed with the Department of the Interior Office of Self-Governance in order to receive funding for FY2016.

4. Tribal Interior Budget Committee:

Self-Governance staff participated in the Tribal Interior Budget Committee (TIBC) meeting on August 4-6. Vickie Hanvey serves as the alternate representative to TIBC for the BIA Eastern Oklahoma Region. TIBC consists of tribal and federal representatives from both the regional and national level and is the primary body that advises the Assistant Secretary – Indian Affairs, on budget tribal budget priorities, issues, and concerns within the Department of the Interior (DOI). Budget topics discussed at the meeting included the Tiwahe Initiative, the new BIE, distribution of JOM funds, contract support costs, tribal courts funding, transportation funding, and the Office of Special Trustee.

5. Department of the Interior Office of Special Trustee (OST) Trust Evaluation

Contractors with the OST Office of Trust Review and Audit (OTRA) visited Cherokee Nation in May to conduct a regular trust evaluation. The Nation recently received a draft copy of the trust evaluation and is now in the process of formulating a response to the contents of the evaluation. It is anticipated that the Nation's response will be submitted in mid-September.

The Department of the Interior, per 25 CFR 1000.351, is required to conduct trust evaluations of Tribes that have assumed management responsibilities of trust assets via Self-Governance agreements. The Self Governance Office served as the contact/coordinator of the evaluation, which reviewed several different trust programs, including Real Estate, Human Services, Information Technology, Natural Resources, and other departments.

6. Cherokee Nation Department of Transportation Funding Agreement:

On September 3rd, Self-Governance and the Cherokee Nation Roads Department received an executed copy of Amendment #4 to the Nation's FY 2015 Tribal Transportation Program Funding Agreement. The amendment totaled \$1,0009,826 and is an advance of FY 2016 Tribal Transportation Program Funding. The funds received under this amendment will be deducted from the Nation's FY 2016 RFA.

NEGOTIATIONS:

DOI, OST Negotiations:

Self-Governance staff plans to reengage in renegotiation discussions with the DOI Office of Special Trustee to renegotiate our Real Estate Appraisal Services and Beneficiary Processes Program Memorandums of Understanding. Self-Governance is coordinating with program staff throughout the renegotiations which will resume in the near future.
