



Third Party Revenue By Clinic, AUGUST 2015 (YEAR TO-DATE)



Announcements

On August 26th, Dental Services conducted its first **Craniofacial Clinic** during which 17 patients were assessed to determine a course of treatment. This Craniofacial Clinic encompassed several specialties such as audiology, Otorhinolaryngology (aka Ear Nose and Throat or "ENT"), **Oral and Maxillary Facial Surgery** (OMFS), **Pedodontics**, **Speech Pathology**, Health IT, and a host of Dentists and Dental Assistants. All these providers are collaborating to provide a team approach in which care is coordinated for patients with a variety of congenital or acquired craniofacial conditions such as **cleft lip and palate**.

On Monday, August 31, 2015, we conducted our weekly **Urgent Care and Emergency Department Operations**Meeting during which we focus on ongoing efforts to improve the function of the departments and the patient experience. During the meeting, we conducted a phone interview with **Dr. John Weddle**, an emergency physician who lives in the area and is a Cherokee. Dr. Smallwood and Dr. Nolan were both very positive about the phone interview and we are proceeding with scheduling an onsite visit.

Achievements

Our **Fit Life Step Challenge** concluded with over **20 million steps** recorded by the 14 teams and 7 individuals that participated. The winning team was the **Hastings Emergency Department** and they'll be rewarded by being served lunch in the department. Our individual winners were **Randy Cox** (Optometry Clinic), **Terissa** (**Skye**) **Maxey** (Dental Services), and **Dr. Gregg Woitte** (Women's Health). The Hastings Fit Life Team plans to continue this quarterly event to continue fostering positive health behaviors.

Surgical Services performed 400 surgical procedures during August 2015.

Patient Transport transported 132 patients during August 2015, traveling 7,232 miles.

- Diabetes Program- 100 patients attended the Diabetes Self-Management Education classes in August. FY 15 Special Diabetes Program for Indian Communities Directed Grant (SDPI CDG) competitive application published on Federal Register, August 7th; application due on October 7th. Attended webinar on the FY 16 SDPI CDG application on Aug. 11, 12, 18, 20, 25, and 27th. Met with several Community health and prevention services staff to discuss changes to the SDPI CDG for FY 16 and to start planning process for incorporating program at end of Sept. 2016 and planning activities for competitive grant application. SDPI Diabetes Prevention Program/Healthy Heart Demonstration Project Grant Program (funded since 2004) will not be funded after 2016. Met with CN Dieticians/DPP/ Community Prevention staff to request input for SDPI competitive grant application. Began writing FY 16 SDPI CDG application. Coordinated & facilitated communication between diabetes programs staff regarding problems with the new EHR program to try and resolve problems.
- Diabetes Prevention Program (DPP) The program has served 687 participants. Active DPP participants 241. Number of Patients entered into Mastery Registry: 15; Number of Referrals beginning from October 1, 2013 to present day: 831. There were 48 people recruited for classes in Salina, Tahlequah, and Stilwell Total Recruitment for FY. Total Retention for FY: 43

- Dietary Services –Reports that they served 684 clients during the month of August. MNT Classes: 29 (This is the number of participants in the classes) Worksite Activities: PN Classes, DSME Classes; DM Classes; Lipids Classes, Hypertension; Weight Mgmt. Classes; Pre DM; Cooking Classes; Blood Pressure Class; DPP Classes; Kidney Health; Employee Wellness. Special Projects:, DM MNT Weekly Audits, Log Teaching Kitchen Refrig/Freezer Temps-weekly, Notify Nurse Manager weekly of DM pts that need added to DM Registry, Reviewed policies in Policy Tech, Research nutrition info needed for patient appts, Gro Store/ Prep-DSME Classes. New Staff: None.
- Breast and Cervical cancer early detection Program The program served 296 Indian/Cherokee women (Clinical Breast Exam, Mammograms, Ultrasound, Pap smear, HPV testing, Colposcopy with or without biopsy, and Colposcopy w/ ECC and ECC) at the cost of \$35,620.36. Educational presentations were given at the Muldrow Senior Citizen Center, at the Jack Brown center in Tahlequah (gave two presentations: one on Breast health and the other on the HPV vaccine), then another presentation was given at the Grove Senior Citizen Center. Attended the CN Child Support Service Health Fair held in Tahlequah.
- Jack Brown Center— Women's Health Coalition toured the facility; Clinical staff participated in a webinar demo on YOMS; JBC held Residential Advisor's Meeting. JBC served a total of 28 clients of those 14 were males and 14 were females. 19 patients are on waiting list.
- Cancer Registry—The program has been granted two years of funding by the National Cancer Institute. The hard work of Cherokee Nation cancer registry and its partners at University of New Mexico Tumor registry is recognized by the CDC cancer surveillance program. A commendation letter and certificate was received by the program.
- CN Emergency Medical Service—CN-EMS handled 450 calls, of those 135 required emergency transport, 158 were transferred, 4,979 clients have been served year to date. In addition program provided EMS training to 915 participants of those 503 were Native Americans.

Health Facilities Program - Program completed 96% of the monthly preventative maintenance work orders. Staff inspected proposed location for a bio waste room at Redbird Smith Health Center and sent recommendations .Staff also inspected Bill Willis building #3 for compliance with ADA/UFAS accessibility requirements. The program provided floor plans and directions to Health Centers for Electronic Health Records installation crew. Program ordered equipment for Health Center snow removal. Also resolved major plumbing issue at Jack Brown center. Submitted GSA vehicle report to CN Transportation Office. Health Services vehicle fleet has 156 vehicles.

The administration of the YRBS Survey is now complete and has been submitted to the CDC for data entry and analyzing.

Public Health Accreditation

Our Public Health Accreditation site visit will be September 29th and 30th. We updated our documents that PHAB returned from our content review and submitted the updates and clarifications they requested. We are updating the bulletin boards at WW Hastings Hospital to reflect the public health aspect.

Sequoyah County PHEs Mary Owl and Lacey Wallace

- The fitness center @ RSHC had 115 employees for the month
- Hosted the Redbird Smith 5K WINGS event (350 runners/walkers)
- Participated in the Ki Bois Back to School Action at the Park (400 participants). This was a free event after the RS 5K that provided various activities like an inflatable water slide, obstacle course, school supply giveaways,

face painting, free haircuts, games, food, and grand prizes of kindle fires that were given away. We also did a survey when parents checked in to see what the greatest need was in the area and poor nutrition ranked at the top of the concerns.

- We assisted one of our community partners in hosting their first annual 5k run for child hunger in downtown Vian. They sold sponsorships for the back of the shirts to raise money for the backpack program for Vian schools that sends food home with low income child on the weekends during the school year.
- Worked with Vian and Gore schools through PICH funds to provide new 24/7 signage to include no vaping on school property.
- Provided 20 new signs each for Gore and Vian that includes updated no vaping on school grounds
- RSHC Community Gardens harvested more than 8 pounds of vegetables for the month. Facilities installed the greenhouse at the clinic. We plan on using the greenhouse more in the fall when the weather cools down.
- Brushy Community Action Organization received a reward for Youth Leadership for receiving the Billie Mills Grant to empower youth to strive to succeed in life.

Cherokee County - PHEs Greg Bilby and Hillary Mead

- Met with Tahlequah BEST, Tahlequah Farmer's Market, and Cherokee County Health Department about Veggie Bucks for their WIC participants. The Farmer's Market manager explained the process of the market and distributed information brochures to the Cherokee County Health Department. The WIC Patient Educator will be distributing the veggie bucks to the participants along with educational information. Tahlequah BEST provided \$2,000 of Veggie Bucks for WIC participants.
- Met with Woodall Public School's 8th grade classes to present for Career Day. Explained to students about a Public Health Educator, took them out to the school garden to show them what had been working on at the school.
- Presented at the ICTC Tahlequah and Muskogee campuses for the Nursing & Sports Medicine Students.

Adair County - PHEs Charlie Stilwell and Tresa Eagle

- Visited with Rocky Mountain and Cave Springs School about updating their 24/7 policy this Fall to include Ecigs and vapor.
- Met with Carla Heldermon from the Stilwell Farmers Market to get an updated list of things needed for the Farmer's market and offered our assistance.
- Visited Stilwell Middle School and Rocky Mountain School to see what items they may need for their school gardens this spring.
