Adult Education/Career Literacy Participant Success:

I first met Artie David Brown just before Christmas 2013. Mr. Brown worked at the Adair County Landfill on the equipment. He had a very busy schedule, being the father of four and working odd hours. It was going to be hard for him to make time to come to Adult Education classes. We talked about motivation and why he wanted to get his G.E.D. He wanted to find a better paying job, something with benefits.

Unfortunately, Artie was just not coming to class very often. I made calls, sent letters, but no response. I finally decided that I would look him up at his job site. The first time that I showed up at the Landfill, he was very surprised. He thought he was in trouble, but he got used to seeing the van pull in. I would take him study materials and always tell him, "I will be back." When I left, he would always smile and wave.


He still didn't come into class very often; but slowly Artie started taking one test at a time, completing each of them. I think he just gave in so I would stop bothering him. Finally, on November 14th, 2014, Artie took his last test, *Reasoning Through Language Arts*. He was so worried, but when he came in to let me know that he had passed, he was smiling from ear to ear. He also was the first client in our program to complete the new revised G.E.D. test.

Another year has almost gone by and it is almost time to recognize our G.E.D. graduates. I needed Artie to come in and fill out the last of his paperwork. (He probably thinks I will never stop bothering him.) Another week went by and his wife came by with paper work for me to take a look at. It was for a background check. Mr. Brown has been looking for a better job during this whole time. He just needed validation that he had received his G.E.D. through our program. He now has a new job working for a company in Antarctica.

Congratulations Artie Brown, it was a pleasure working with you. I think you are safe! I am pretty sure they won't let me drive a company vehicle to Antarctica!!
