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Real Estate Services

The Office of Real Estate Services is responsible for administering the laws, regulations, and policies affecting the protection and management of the trust and restricted lands of individual Indian landowners and the land owned by the Cherokee Nation itself, located within the 14 county area of the Cherokee Nation. Real Estate Services is operated under a Self-Governance Compact with the Secretary of the Interior.

II. Program Highlights:

- 1. <u>Sale or Purchase of Land</u>. One tract of land was purchased during the months of September/October in Hulbert, Oklahoma.
- 2. <u>Appraisals</u>. Three appraisals were ordered; five were approved during the month of October.
- 3. Quiet Titles, Administrative Law Judgments (ALJ), Estate closings, Inventory/Heirships. Six Quiet Title requests were received, five of which were researched and returned; one pending to date. One ALJ was requested and currently being researched. ALJ Quota received from BIA for FY16, which is being worked on. Fifteen Inventory/Heirships were requested, researched and returned; none pending to date.

- 4. Report for Distributions, Transmittals, IIM Setups. Six Report for Distributions were requested, researched and sent to BIA for finalization; four were finalized by BIA and returned. Nine Summary Distributions were requested; four were submitted to Solicitor's office; five remain in progress to date. Two IIM setups were accomplished.
- 5. <u>Last Will & Testaments</u>. Eight Last Will and Testaments were prepared and endorsed for Cherokee citizens; four interviews were completed.
- 6. <u>Narratives/Title Status Reports (TSR)</u>. Three TSRs were requested, completed and returned.
- 7. <u>Deed Approval Applications</u>, <u>Restriction Removal Applications</u>. One deed approval application was requested and submitted. One restriction removal application is in progress.
- 8. <u>Leases.</u> Two restricted hunting leases were submitted and approved. One restricted agriculture lease was submitted and pending.
- 9. <u>District Court Probates.</u> There are 117 total inventory applications for probate on the waiting list.
- 10. <u>Rights of Way, Rights of Entry.</u> One Right of Way was submitted for approval; four are pending; 13 rights of entry were requested and processed.
- 11. On-Site Inspections, Home Visits, Trespass issues. 18 on-site inspections were requested and 17 completed to date; four home visits were requested and completed; one trespass issue was addressed.
- 12. <u>Environmental Reviews.</u> Two environmental reviews were requested during the month; two were completed and received.
- 13. <u>Maps/platting/survey assistance</u>. 53 requests for maps/platting assistance was completed during the month.
- 14. Jurisdictional calls. 45 jurisdictional calls were completed during the month.
- 15. <u>Financial transactions</u>. \$129,685.71 was processed through the lockbox; and \$36,144.80 was received in the office for lease payments during the month.
- 16. <u>Trust Asset and Accounting Management System Project</u>. When the TAAMS project started, there were 12,669 allotments that required research. There are 315 files remaining for status determination, research and abstracting.
- 17. Stats. 125 client sign-ins (walk-ins), 72 phone inquiries, 38 obituaries processed.

II Highlights:

a) CNEP hosted a "Self-Governance at EPA" one-day meeting. It was attended by several tribes. There have been several discussions about SG at EPA and the Cherokee Nation is attempting to work with the federal government and other tribes to set up a pilot project where the Nation would use the SG model with its EPA funds and programs. A CNEP staff member attended the Self-Governance Quarterly Meeting and met with an EPA official to discuss this topic.

b) Water Issues:

- Staff sampled the Lower Illinois River for fish tissue. Staff pulled fish tissue plugs from Channel Catfish, Spotted Bass, Bluegill Sunfish and Longear Sunfish for total mercury.
- Staff sampled Lake Greenleaf on September 15th for water quality. Lab analysis was completed for E.Coli bacteria, total phosphorus, nitrogen, nitrate, nitrite, ortho phosphorous, nitrogen as ammonia, sulfate, fluoride, turbidity, hardness and metals. Metals were sent to Green Country Testing for analysis and we should have the results in the next few weeks.
- Staff sampled Lake Tenkiller for herbicides and pesticides on September 22nd. Green Country Testing picked up the samples to be processed. Results from the pesticide and herbicide samples show levels below the detection limit.

c) TU Indoor Air Asthma Study Update:

Various CNEP staff continues to work in partnership with the University Tulsa's Indoor Air Program to participate in Home to School asthma research. Four new research field technicians were added to the project and have been receiving hands on field training and obtaining their certifications.

Currently the project lacks around 12 families to complete the roster for home sampling. Field technicians have been notified to recruit the remaining families during their home visits.

Field technicians are completing anywhere from 10 to 15 home visits a week to gather data and collect dust, Adenosine Triphosphate (ATP), and air samples to turn in to the research team. New protocols have been implemented in order for these visits to be performed in an orderly and timely manner. The new protocols are showing better results and positive outcomes.

Trust Application Activities:

• Staff received a technical review from the Bureau of Indian Affairs (BIA) for W.W. Hastings Hospital Phase I Environmental Site Assessment (ESA) report. Staff made the changes accordingly to the ESA report and submitted two copies to Cherokee Nation

Real Estate Services as part of the Trust Acquisition Package. Staff also reviewed the Phase I ESA report with Lee Jackson, Facility Manager for W.W. Hasting Hospital. Mr. Jackson will schedule a walk-through at a later date of the facility with CNEP staff to make certain that all aspects of the facility are in proper and orderly condition.

• Staff received a request for a Phase I ESA from Cherokee Nation Real Estate Services for removal of restrictions for the Jennie Neely Property near Webbers Falls, Oklahoma. Staff ordered data reports from Environmental Data Resources (EDR) and all EDR data reports were reviewed. A site visit was made to the property to search for any indicators of recognized environmental conditions. Pictures were also taken of the property and the adjoining properties. Aerial and historical topographic maps were made using the EDR Drawing Tool. CNEP staff discovered no evidence of recognized environmental conditions or significant environmental concerns in connection with the Subject Property. No further action or investigation appears warranted at this time. The Phase I ESA report was completed, finalized and submitted to Real Estate Services.
