



ADAIR COUNTY PROJECTS:

- 1. Chewey Road Designer: Red Plains Engineering. RP working on 90% completion. R/W will submit for appraisals as needed.
- 2. Dahlonegah South Designer: Holloway Updike & Bellen HUB. 90% checked plans were returned for revisions on 5/14/14. Roads R/W supplied Adair County commissioner with a Notice of Interest letter to be mailed to the residents along the road. R/W is waiting on a response from the county commissioner Dale Dandridge if he is going to contract the R/W to be acquired.
- 3. Bell North Designer: Red Plains Engineering. RP working on 90% plans. R/W received easements and exhibits 8/27/15 and is currently performing the first check of the documents.
- CNI Industrial Access Designer: D. Moore Contractor: Glover & Associates. Contract amount \$1,633,194.81. Construction underway working -Placing Curb and Gutter finishing drives --85% complete
- 5. Dahlonegah West-Designer: Holloway Updike & Bellen. R/W is complete with research of ownership. 30% plans submitted on 8/28/15.
- 6. Lyon Switch Designer: J. Shehi and D. Moore. Plans have been submitted for revised alignment 45% check. East loop was removed from the project because of RW and environmental restraints at homes and historical structures.
- 7. Malloy Hollow– Designer: D. Moore. Plans are complete. Environmental review and negotiations with ODWC are still in progress.
- 8. North Salem (Bethel Road) Designer: Red Plains. RP are working on 90% Plans. R/W received the R/W documents 11/9/15 for first check.
- 9. Smith Hollow Designer: Red Plains Engineering. RP are working on 90% Plans. R/W has submitted for appraisals. Notice of interest letters were mailed out 9/28/2015 to landowners.

COMMUNITY SERVICES COMMITTEE REPORT

- 10. Bell School South Designer: A. Harris Project is approximately 80% complete. Waiting on Guy Engineering to design a three sided box to replace a double box that will only carry a 2 year flood.
- 11. Rocky Mountain School Loop- Designer: D. Moore Project is 90% complete. Waiting on CE approval.
- 12. Honey Hill Phase I Designer: HUB Engineering Design plans are complete. Utility letters were sent out for estimates for relocation. A new ADA Mike Ashworth is looking in to the condemnation cases. He is trying to get them dismissed so CN Roads department can proceed with construction.
- 13. Bunch Road Designer: Nickle & Associates R/W has completed ownership research and sent it to Nickle & Associates 7/11/14. Decision was made to only do the portion from the BOP and stopping before the first railroad crossing. New task order was issued on 9-18-14 for the revised length of project.
- 14. Oak Ridge Road and Oak Ridge Extension Designer: CGA Engineering. R/W has completed ownership research for Oak Ridge and mailed it 2/28/14. CGA will be doing the research for Oak Ridge Extension.. Completed 30% check and returned to CGA on 5/12/15. A community meeting was conducted on December 8, 2015 at 6:00 PM at the Bell school cafeteria.
- 15. Sally Bull Hollow Designer: Guy Engineering. R/W submitted the ownership research to Guy Engineering 12/17/13. 30% plans were submitted on 10/8/15.
- 16. The following projects are pending design
 - Chance Road
 - Bidding Springs Road
 - Lyon South Road

CHEROKEE COUNTY PROJECTS:

- 1. Dreadfulwater Road Designer: A. Harris. After the Preliminary Community Meeting held on September 18, 2014 the Roads department received one comment form from a concerned landowner. Plans are approximately 75 % complete.
- 2. Hulbert-Lost City Designer: A. Harris. Coordination with utility companies are underway. In house final review of revisions are being conducted. R/W exhibits and easements has been started for this project.
- 3. Lost City Road Designer: Holloway Updike & Bellen. Right of way research is complete. Plans are 70% complete. Had meeting with utility companies to confirm easement placement on 1/12/16.
- 4. Northeast Fort Gibson- Designer: Holloway Updike & Bellen. Plans 98% complete. ABB survey was negative. R/W started acquisition 7/8/14, out of 129 parcels we have 3 parcels left to acquire. One parcel is in Muskogee

county and two parcels are in Cherokee county for possible condemnation. Had utility relocation meeting on 1/12/16 to ask for relocation plans, estimates, and proposed beginning day of construction.

- 5. Tenkiller School –Designer: Red Plains. Contractor: Glover & Associates. Contract amount \$3,747,954.02. Construction: clearing and grubbing fencing 5% Complete.
- 6. Ross Street- Designer: D. Moore Survey is complete. Preliminary design is started. Attended the Infrastructure kick off meeting to allow CN departments and the City of Tahlequah to share with the Project Team for Hastings new hospital to share their knowledge of site issues. Still waiting to know where Hasting plans for driveway entrance. Waiting for Pavement design and hydrology from CGA.
- 7. Mud Valley Road Began preliminary design criteria. An exception will be submitted for narrower payment width. R/W has started ownership research for this project 11/18/15. Project is being flown by Quantum Spatial. Aerial targets are being set by survey crew.
- 8. The following projects are pending design:
 - 4-Mile Road

CRAIG COUNTY PROJECTS:

- 1. NS-4340 Road Designer: Guy Engineering (Contracted through the county). Held preliminary community meeting for the project 4/15/14 at the White Oak school cafeteria. R/W videoed the project and sent a copy of the video to Guy Engineering. 7/8/2015 R/W received Trust & Restricted documents from Guy Engineering for check. Currently preparing a list of corrections needed on the documents. Received Geotechnical Report on 8/4/14. Project design 85% complete. Field meeting for utility relocation will be May 5, 2015.
- 2. NS-4410 Road (7th Street/Turnpike Bridge) Designer: Guy Engineering (Contracted through the county). Cherokee Nation has signed the agreement between Cherokee Nation, Craig County, and ODOT.

DELAWARE COUNTY PROJECTS:

- 1. D0525 Road Designer: Scott & Associates. Submitted 30% plans, hydrology, and geotechnical report. Had 30% plan in hand on April 8, 2015. Revisions were submitted on 7/14/2015.
- 2. Jay/Kenwood Bridges (Bridges 53, 67, 68, and 71) Designer: Rose & McCrary, P.C. Contractor: Paradigm. Contract Amount \$5,592,242.85. Construction began June 9 2014 project-95%.
- 3. Kenwood Jay Road Rehab Plans are 100% complete. CE is approved. This project will be bid out the same time as Leach Kenwood as soon as utilities are relocated.

- 4. Kansas-Bull Hollow Designer: Scott & Associates. 60% Plan in Hand was conducted on April 8, 2015. R/W finished checking all other documents and returned them to Scott & Associates January, 7 2016 for them to revise.
- 4. Kansas Dry Creek Project- Designer: Holloway Updike & Bellen. 90% plans were submitted for review on 5/10/2013. Meeting was held with HUB and Flood Plain Administrator on December 17, 2014 about Zone A issues. Still working on resolving this problem. R/W will submit for appraisals as needed.
- 5. Leach/Kenwood Road Designer: D. Moore. R/W acquisition complete. Floodplain permit has been approved. Final plans are complete and preparing contract for bid. CE approved. Utility relocations in progress.

MAYES COUNTY PROJECTS:

- 1. Wickliffe Bridge (Salina/Kenwood)- Designer: Guy Engineering (Contracted through the county). Contractor Bronze Oak. Contract amount \$1,774,841.63. Project is complete with a construction cost of \$1,697,243.59
- 2. Chimney Rock Hollow I & II Designer: Guy Engineering (Contracted through the county). Received 30% plans on 3/10/14.

MUSKOGEE COUNTY PROJECTS:

- 1. Northeast Fort Gibson-Designer: Holloway Updike & Bellen. Sent 90% check to HUB for revisions and final plans. ABB survey was negative. R/W started acquisition 7/8/14, out of 129 parcels. we have 3 parcels left to acquire. One parcel is in Muskogee county and two parcels are in Cherokee county for possible condemnation. Utility relocation meeting was held on 1/12/16.


- 2. Commerce Services is once again partnering with the IRS to provide free tax preparation and filing services for low to moderate income families (under \$54,000) beginning February 1st.
- 3. Since FY07, 657 families unable to obtain a non-predatory mortgage on their own have completed self-sufficiency counseling and obtained a non-predatory mortgage.
- 4. YTD, Self Sufficiency staff members have worked with 9 families facing foreclosure. Three families received a modification which includes one family receiving a foreclosure prevention loan and one additional family received a foreclosure prevention loan from the Small Business Assistance Center; three families are currently working with SBAC staff to save their home; one family was referred out for further assistance and unfortunately one family was unable to receive foreclosure prevention.
- 5. 554 consumer loans totaling \$674.196.81 have been made through the Small Business Assistance Center as of January 15th. Two of these were Foreclosure Prevention loans totaling \$9,939.85.
- 6. 46 families have used Mortgage Assistance to purchase a home this fiscal year.
