- 1. <u>Sale or Purchase of Land</u>. No land was purchased during the month of March.
- 2. <u>Appraisals</u>. Seven appraisals were ordered; three appraisals were approved by BIA.
- 3. Quiet Titles. Six Quiet Title requests were received, researched and returned; none pending.
- 4. <u>Inventory/Heirships</u>. Two inventory/heirships were requested, researched and returned; none pending to date.

- 5. <u>Report for Distributions, IIM Setups.</u> One Report for Distribution was requested, researched, prepared and submitted to BIA for finalization.

II Highlights:

- a) UST Staff attended a regular Outpost #1 meeting to discuss what further action can be taken while CNB waits on the removal of the old tanks. Staff contacted EPA Region 6 on what else can be removed while waiting. EPA Region 6 advised that all dispensers and vent pipes can be removed at this time. The vent pipes are to be relocated until further notice. Staff will attend the tank removal with EPA Region 6 for compliance advisement.
- b) Staff attended the Cherokee day at the State Capital in Oklahoma City on February 23rd to promote the work being done by Cherokee Nation Environmental Programs. Staff was able to speak with the Chief, Deputy Chief, and many of the congressmen that were in attendance.
- c) Staff held an 8-hour hazardous waste operations & emergency response (HAZWOPER) training for CNEP staff that included CPR, First Aid, and Fire Safety.
- d) LBP Activities:
 - Staff submitted the Lead Certification/Accreditation Grant clearance form to the Grants Services Department
 - Staff attended a parent teacher conference at Shady Grove School and gave a presentation on lead hazards to parents and staff
 - Staff delivered a display and information brochures on radon and lead-based paint to the Redbird Smith Health Center.
- e) The CNEP along with several other departments will be putting on the 5th annual Environmental Festival. This year the festival will be on Friday, April 29th. It will take place at the Talking Leaves Job Corps (TLJC), and will go from 9:00am 3:00pm. Lunch will be done by the TLJC and will be hamburgers & hotdogs. There will be presentations, tabletop displays and such from state, federal and other tribal nations.
