#### **Real Estate Services**

The Office of Real Estate Services is responsible for administering the laws, regulations, and policies affecting the protection and management of the trust and restricted lands of individual Indian landowners and the land owned by the Cherokee Nation itself, located within the 14 county area of the Cherokee Nation. Real Estate Services is operated under a Self-Governance Compact with the Secretary of the Interior.

# II. Program Highlights:

- 1. <u>Sale or Purchase of Land</u>. One tract containing 18 acres was purchased since the previous report.
- 2. Appraisals. Six appraisals were ordered; one appraisal was approved by BIA.
- 3. Quiet Titles. Seven Quiet Title requests were received, researched and returned.
- 4. <u>Inventory/Heirships</u>; <u>Report for Distributions</u>. 11 inventory/heirships were requested, researched and returned; none pending to date.

- 5. Report for Distributions, IIM Setups, Summary Distributions, ALJs. 22 Report for Distributions were requested, researched, prepared and submitted to BIA for finalization; two IIM accounts were set up; one Summary Distribution was requested and submitted to Secretary of Interior; eight Administrative Law Judgments were requested, completed and sent to BIA.
- 6. <u>Last Will and Testaments.</u> Seven interviews for Last Will and Testaments were taken; three drafts prepared; and one LW&T was finalized and endorsed.
- 7. <u>Leases.</u> Two restricted hunting leases were submitted for approval; one was approved; one is pending.
- 8. <u>Environmental Reviews.</u> Six environmental reviews (categorical exclusions) were requested and completed.
- 9. <u>Rights of Way, Rights of Entry.</u> One Right of Way was submitted for approval; two are pending. Three Rights of Entry were requested and processed.
- 10. On-Site Inspections, Home Visits, Trespass issues. 10 on-site inspections were requested and completed; four home visits were requested and completed; three trespass issues were addressed.
- 11. <u>Maps/platting/survey assistance</u>. 40 requests for maps/platting assistance was completed during the month.
- 12. <u>Jurisdictional calls</u>. 56 jurisdictional calls were completed during the month, with 24 after hours.
- 13. <u>Financial transactions</u>. \$173,594.64 was processed through the lockbox; and \$6,367.22 was received in the office for lease payments during the month.
- 14. <u>District Court Probates.</u> There are no inventory applications for probate on the waiting list. All probates that are at paid status for court costs are completed through Real Estate Services.
- 15. <u>Trust Asset and Accounting Management System Project</u>. When the TAAMS project started, there were 12,669 allotments that required research. There are 90 files remaining for status determination, research and abstracting.
- 16. Stats. 82 client sign-ins (walk-ins), 62 phone inquiries, 43 obituaries processed.
- 17. <u>Impact Aid.</u> Impact aid for three schools was processed for Greasy, Kenwood and Cherokee Emersion Charter School.

- II Highlights:
- a) The CNEP Air Program staff hosted a tour of the Stilwell air monitoring site for Ann Dunkin (US EPA Chief Information Officer), Ira Hight (EPA Region 6 GAP) and Sara Hill (CN Secretary of Natural Resources).
- b) Staff sampled Lake Oologah for water quality on April 25, 2016. Samples will be tested for bacteria, ph, dissolved oxygen, salinity, turbidity, specific conductivity, total nitrogen, total phosphorus, alkalinity, sulfate, fluoride, chlorophyll-a, nitrite, nitrate, orthophosphorus, temperature, nitrogen as ammonia, and heavy metals. The sampling will take place from April-September when primary body contact will be experienced in the lake.
- c) CNEP Staff attended the National Natural Resource Damage Assessment and Restoration (NRDAR) Workshop and participated in, and facilitated the Tribal Sessions.
- d) CNEP Staff attended a health fair at Go Ye Village in Tahlequah and talked about Lead in Consumer Products.
- e) CNEP Staff attended the 5th Annual Environmental Festival held Friday, April 29, 2016 at the Talking Leaves Job Corps Gymnasium. The festival, hosted by the tribe's environmental programs department, as well as several other Cherokee Nation Departments, promotes awareness on vital environmental issues such as recycling, water quality and land conservation. The festival was a huge success with over 450 participants attending. Several Federal, State, local organizations, Tribes and Cherokee Nation Programs participated in this event. There were informational booths, presentations, and hands-on activities. The Cherokee Nation also gave away free trees to the public in celebration of Arbor Day.
- f) CNEP Staff continues to work on the planning of the 21st Annual Inter-Tribal Environmental Council Conference to be held in the Tulsa, Ok area. The tentative dates are July 19-21, 2016. Suggested topics for breakout sessions include: EPA Updates, Recycling/Solid Waste, Cultural Preservation, Water, Restoration, Environmental Issues, Environmental Health, Community Outreach, Superfund/Brownfields, Air and Tribal Profiles. Staff worked on the sales agreement, agenda, brochure and program design, and researched potential speakers. Staff also sent out registration and hotel information to Tribes.

# g) Trust Application Activities:

• Staff continued work on the Hwy 51 – 28.53 Acre Site and reviewed the Environmental Data Resources (EDR) Radius Map with GeoCheck and began the narrative sections in the Phase I Environmental Site Assessment (ESA) Report. The report is being conducted for Cherokee Nation Real Estate Services as part of the trust acquisition package that will be submitted to regional Bureau of Indian Affairs (BIA).

- CNEP Staff researched ownership information for the South Coffeyville Project Hope Property and a site reconnaissance was conducted. A site recon consisted of a visual inspection of the property to search for any recognized environmental conditions, a visual inspection of the surrounding properties, and pictures were taken of the property. EDR data reports for the site were ordered.
- CNEP Staff completed the final update to the Phase I Report for the Chilocco West Properties. This report was submitted to Cherokee Nation Real Estate Service and the land has been approved to be placed into Trust for Cherokee Nation.
- CNEP Staff have received information on the Leona Guess Property. Staff will schedule a site inspection and start working on a Phase I Report for this project.
