rahlequah - Zero child vacancies at this time with current staff. We have 2 staff openings. Our summer program has started.


- Licensing has started using the new digital forms for the tablets. Challenges: Working on putting documents into the new systems folders.






New Construction Homeownership Program Application Data

ADAIR COUNTY PROJECTS:

- 1. Chewey Road Designer: Red Plains Engineering. RP working on 90% completion. In the process of setting up utility meetings. R/W will submit for appraisals as needed.
- 2. Dahlonegah South Designer: Holloway Updike & Bellen HUB. 90% checked plans were returned for revisions on 5/14/14. I met with Adair county commissioner Dale Dandridge February 8, about the acquisition and he told me he would be responsible for the acquisition of the fee property.
- 3. Bell North Designer: Red Plains Engineering. RP working on 90% plans. In the process of setting up utility meetings. R/W received easements and exhibits 8/27/15 and is currently performing the first check of the documents.
- 4. CNI Industrial Access Designer: D. Moore Contractor: Glover & Associates. Contract amount \$1,633,194.81. Construction underway working light pole installation in progress --100% complete A final inspection was performed on the April 23rd.
- 5. Dahlonegah West-Designer: Holloway Updike & Bellen. R/W is complete with research of ownership. 30% plans are in the process of being checked.
- 6. Lyon Switch Designer: J. Shehi and D. Moore. Plans have been submitted for revised alignment 45% check. East loop was removed from the project because of RW and environmental restraints at homes and historical structures.
- 7. Malloy Hollow- Designer: D. Moore. Plans are complete. Environmental review and negotiations with ODWC are still in progress.
- 8. North Salem (Bethel Road) Designer: Red Plains. RP are working on 90% Plans. In the process of setting up utility meetings. R/W received the R/W documents 11/9/15 for first check.
- 9. Smith Hollow Designer: Red Plains Engineering. RP are working on 90% Plans. Utility meeting is set for June 28, 2016 at 1:30 pm. R/W received the

appraisals 2/16/16. Notice of interest letters were mailed out 9/28/2015 to landowners. R/W is preparing to start acquisition.

- 10. Bell School South Designer: A. Harris Project is approximately 85% complete. 30% plan in hand is scheduled for 7/26/16.
- 11. Rocky Mountain School Loop- Designer: This project was awarded to Glover & Associates in the amount of \$675,356.82. Construction time is 60 calendar days with construction beginning ______
- 12. Rocky Mountain School Loop Bridge Bridge at the end of the project washed out last year and we are replacing the bridge as Part II of this project. 30% plan in hand is scheduled for 7/26/16.
- 13. Honey Hill Phase I Designer: HUB Engineering Design plans are complete. Utility letters were sent out for estimates for relocation. ADA Mike Ashworth informed John Compelube 1/27/16 that the condemnation cases have been dismissed. CN Roads department can now proceed with construction. Michael Lynn and John Compelube attended the Febrary 8, county commissioner meeting to confirm that CN Roads is ready to proceed with construction. Waiting on CE approval and utility relocations.
- 14. Bunch Road Designer: Nickle & Associates R/W has completed ownership research and sent it to Nickle & Associates 7/11/14. Decision was made to only do the portion from the BOP and stopping before the first railroad crossing. New task order was issued on 9-18-14 for the revised length of project. 30% plans were submitted on 2/19/16.
- 15. Oak Ridge Road and Oak Ridge Extension Designer: CGA Engineering. R/W has completed ownership research for Oak Ridge and mailed it 2/28/14. CGA will be doing the research for Oak Ridge Extension.. Completed 30% check and returned to CGA on 5/12/15. A community meeting was conducted on December 8, 2015 at 6:00 PM at the Bell school cafeteria.
- 16. Sally Bull Hollow Designer: Guy Engineering. R/W submitted the ownership research to Guy Engineering 12/17/13. 30% plancheck was completed on March 8, 2016 and PIH was held on March 30, 2016.
- 17. The following projects are pending design

- 1. Dreadfulwater Road Designer: A. Harris. Plans are approximately 75 % complete.
- 2. Hulbert-Lost City Designer: A. Harris. Coordination with utility companies are underway. In house final review is complete and revisions have been

made. R/W exhibits and easements has been started for this project. NEPA is in progress.

- 3. Lost City Road Designer: Holloway Updike & Bellen. Right of way research is complete. Plans are 75% complete. Had meeting with utility companies to confirm easement placement on 1/12/16.
- 4. Northeast Fort Gibson- Designer: Holloway Updike & Bellen. Plans 100% complete. ABB survey was negative. R/W has completed acquisition of 129 parcels for Muskogee and Cherokee counties. LREC has one parcel to acquire. Had utility relocation meeting on 1/12/16 to ask for relocation plans, estimates, and proposed beginning day of construction. ABB and Bat surveys have expired and new surveys will need to be performed before construction can begin.
- 5. Tenkiller School –Designer: Red Plains. Contractor: Glover & Associates. Contract amount \$3,747,954.02. Construction: clearing and grubbing fencing 15% Complete.Contractor on site -for pipe installation.
- 6. Ross Street- Designer: D. Moore Survey is complete. Preliminary design is started. Attended meeting with the design and construction team for the new clinic. They still do not knowHasting plans for driveway entrance. Waiting for Pavement design and hydrology from CGA.
- 7. Mud Valley Road Began preliminary design criteria. An exception will be submitted for narrower payment width. Project is being flown by Quantum Spatial. Aerial targets are being set by survey crew.
- 8. The following projects are pending design:
 - 4-Mile Road

CRAIG COUNTY PROJECTS:

- 1. NS-4340 Road Designer: Guy Engineering (Contracted through the county). Held preliminary community meeting for the project 4/15/14 at the White Oak school cafeteria. R/W videoed the project and sent a copy of the video to Guy Engineering. 7/8/2015 R/W received Trust & Restricted documents from Guy Engineering for check. Currently preparing a list of corrections needed on the documents. Received Geotechnical Report on 8/4/14. Project design 85% complete. Field meeting for utility relocation will be May 5, 2015.
- 2. NS-4410 Road (7th Street/Turnpike Bridge) Designer: Guy Engineering (Contracted through the county). Cherokee Nation has signed the agreement between Cherokee Nation, Craig County, and ODOT.

DELAWARE COUNTY PROJECTS:

1. D0525 Road – Designer: Scott & Associates. Submitted 30% plans, hydrology, and geotechnical report. Had 30% plan in hand on April 8, 2015. Revisions were submitted on 7/14/2015.

- 2. Kenwood Jay Road Rehab Project was awarded to A&A Asphalt out of Broken Arrow, Ok in the amount of \$2,526,284.27.A preconstruction was held June 14th and construction is set to begin on July 5th. This project is 90 calendar days.
- 3. Kansas-Bull Hollow Designer: Scott & Associates. 60% Plan in Hand was conducted on April 8, 2015. R/W finished checking all other documents and returned them to Scott & Associates January, 7 2016 for them to revise.


- 2. Since FY07, **692 families unable to obtain a non-predatory mortgage on their own** have completed self-sufficiency counseling and obtained a non-predatory mortgage.
- 3. YTD, Self Sufficiency staff members have worked with **9 families facing foreclosure**. Three families received a modification which includes one family receiving a foreclosure prevention loan and one additional family received a foreclosure prevention loan from the Small Business Assistance Center; one family is currently working with SBAC staff to save their home; one family was referred out for further assistance and unfortunately three families were unable to receive foreclosure prevention.



OCAPS: Out-Of-District Court Advocacy and Permanency Services

- Involved in child welfare cases in non-jurisdiction counties in Oklahoma and all 50 states.
- Most work is done telephonically or electronically.
- Emphasis on education about the Indian Child Welfare Act and ensuring States comply with it.

SCAPS: State Court Advocacy and Permanency Services

- Involved in child welfare cases inside the 14 counties of which all or part are within the jurisdiction of the Nation.
- Emphasis on education about the Indian Child Welfare Act and ensuring OKDHS compliance, and sometimes provide Tribal Foster Homes.
- Provides services to the families when OKDHS fails to do so or as an alternative to OK DHS services.

TCAPS: Tribal Court Advocacy and Permanency Services

- Involved in child welfare cases which are wholly under the jurisdiction of the Nation and OKDHS is not involved.
- These cases originate on Indian Country or are transferred in from State district courts. Hearings are held at our Tribal Court House. Tribal Foster Homes are fully utilized.

GPA: Guardianships and Private Adoptions


- Involved in voluntary adoptions when the birth parents wish to place their child for adoption.
- Monitors Guardianships and Private Adoptions for compliance with the Indian Child Welfare Act and the best interests of children.
- Serves Cherokee children and their families in Tribal Court and parts of Oklahoma.

CPS: Child Protective Services


- Receives referrals involving allegations of maltreatment of Cherokee children.
- Investigates allegations of child maltreatment in Indian Country and co-investigates with DHS in some counties when Cherokee children are involved.

Eligibility Notices

When a County or State's child welfare agency gets involved in the life of a family that they suspect to be Cherokee, they're required by the Indian Child Welfare Act (ICWA) to send Notice to the tribe. The tribe must then reply to confirm or deny whether the children are members of (or eligible to become members of) the tribe. The tribe has 30 days to respond.

Cherokee Nation received 708 notices involving 289 children within the CN jurisdictional area and 1,691children living outside the CN jurisdictional area for a total of 1,980 children for the month of May.

The longest Response-to-Notice time in May was 20 days.


Prevention and Intervention

Indian Child Welfare Family Protection Services Unit (FPS) assists families in need of hands-on training to correct the conditions that lead to children being removed from their home. These services often include completing a 28 week parenting program that discusses topics like discipline, nutrition, budgeting, and housekeeping. We primarily assist all our Tribal Court and Permanency Services (CAPS) cases but can assist in State CAPS cases when a request is made. This helps insure that families have the tools they need to be reunited.

For May, FPS served 49 children and 26 families.

*Almost all referrals are for a primary reason as well as neglect

- Child Protective Services (CPS) received 314 referrals of child abuse/neglect from 20 Oklahoma counties as well as 7 from other states.
- 223 referrals involved alleged neglect, 48 alleged physical abuse, 5 alleged sexual abuse, and 21 requested services due to abuse.

(Foster & Adoptive Homes)

CERTIFICATION SERVICES

Types of Certified Placement Resource Homes

- Non-Relative Adoptive: Families who hope to adopt children when the children's parents' rights are terminated. These homes do not take foster placements.
- Non-Relative Fost/Adopt: Families who take foster placement of children knowing their parental rights are not terminated and they could return home, but if they don't the placement family will have the first chance to adopt them.
- Non-Relative Foster: Families who are willing to take in children they do not know on a temporary basis, but may last years. These families usually do not adopt children.
- Relative Adoptive/Foster: Families who are related to the children and are fostering them or planning to adopt them. They do not take in children they are not related to.
- Emergency/Respite: Families that take very short-term placement of children while more permanent placements are sought or when only a short-term placement is needed.
