

II. Program Highlights

a.) Motor Vehicle

- 1. Year to Date Motor Vehicle revenue for FY17 compared to FY16 as of November 30th 2016 & November 30th 2015, had an overall increase of 5.11%.





II. Program Highlights

1. Staffing:

The Office of Self Governance is pleased to announce the appointment of a new staff member to our team. It is Mr. Bryan Shade, who has accepted the position of General Counsel for Self-Governance.

2 P.L. 102-477:

On December 27, 2016, the Nation submitted its P.L. 102-477 Year End Report for the period ending September 30, 2016. This report is the final report for the Three Year Plan beginning October 1, 2013 and ending September 30, 2016. The report provides a narrative overview of our statistical accomplishments for the year and an overview of both the Child Care Program and Career Services' ancillary programs that are so important in providing meaningful services to individuals.

3. Post-Election NIHB Transition Summit:

Bryan Shade and I attended the NIHB Presidential Transition Summit in Washington, DC on December 8, 2016. Among those on the Agenda were Congressman Tom Cole, R-OK, Senator John Testor, D-MT, and Mike Andrews, Staff Director, Senate Committee on Indian Affairs all of whom discussed what to expect for Tribal Health in the 115th Congress. Carlyle Begay from President Elect Trump's Native American Coalition also spoke concerning working with the White House and the new administration. The rest of the day was dedicated to policy discussions in the following areas: Deconstructing the Affordable Care Act (What would we keep if we could and what we won't miss, Preserving the Indian Healthcare Improvement Act, Medicaid Reform); Quality of Care Improvements at the Indian Health Service; Budget and appropriations opportunities and challenges; Tribal Consultation/Government-to-Government relationship; Special Diabetes Program for Indians - Building a public health infrastructure; Educating new administration officials and members of Congress.

DOI Budget submission:

Self-Governance staff and Financial Resources staff met with the BIA, Eastern Oklahoma Regional Office, Budget Officer to discuss the FY 2019 Tribal Budget Formulation and Unfunded Obligations.
