Education Committee Career Services March Monthly Report Diane Kelley, Executive Director

The **Alternative Education Program** had 12 additional students pass all components of the High School Equivalency Test during the month of March, bringing the FY 17 total to 35. Our annual graduation will be held September 14, 2017. Invitations will be forthcoming. Alternative Education staff will be attending the Commission on Adult Basic Education Conference in April and the GED Conference in July.

The Career Skills Education Classes staff aided Kawi Café participants with various trainings, field trips, worksite placements, etc. while the Kawi Café was closed. In February, staff provided Professional Skill Building training for the Business Technology class and Resume Training at Northeastern State University.

Talking Leaves Job Corps Facilities Maintenance staff is working with the Zoe Institute to assist in the building of wheel chair ramps for disabled individuals. The Electrical Wiring class works with Habitat for Humanity. In February, the Student Government Association hand-delivered Valentine's Day cards made by students to local veterans. Certified Clinical Medical Assistant students partnered with the Wellness Center and the Oklahoma Blood Institute to host a blood drive in the local community. The Center generated a total of 55 units of blood. Platelets from the blood donated will be used by cancer patients at a nearby children's hospital. Talking Leaves is experiencing a high with their performance measures. Kudo's to the math and reading department in their high scores nationally. The center is having weekly conference calls with the Regional Director. We have experienced positive feedback last month we were ranked #54 out of 124 centers in the Nation. The Center is full and they are working on the inventory. We continue to have tours every Thursday from 10:00am till noon.

Staff from the **Vocational Rehabilitation Program** participated in the Oklahoma Rehabilitation Council meeting, the Oklahoma Trial Vocational Rehabilitation Council meeting, and the OK DRS Academy. Staff will be participating in the National Association of Workforce Boards Forum in March, the Disability Awareness Day at the State Capitol in April and the Workforce Innovation Opportunity Act Conference in May. The Cherokee Nation Vocational Rehabilitation Program will be the co-host for the CANAR mid-year conference in June.

Staff from our **Vocational Programs** met with representatives from Carl Albert Jr. College on March 8th. Staff also attended the Cherokee Nation Legislative Day at the State Capital on February 22nd. This was an opportunity to showcase our departments and services and to educate legislators on issues important to Cherokee Nation and to the State of Oklahoma.

The Sector Partnership – National Dislocated Workers Grant staff attended NORA Leadership Education Day in Claremore and will be meeting with the Local 798 Pipefitters

Union for a Memorandum of Understanding. Additional Apprenticeship Training will be held in April. Our welding classes have started back up. We have all Sector Partnership clients in this class which is #10 and it's the largest of all the classes (16 participants). Eight students graduated from the last Local 584 Welding class:





his story is an example of the wonderful success that agency and program partnering can accomplish on behalf of clients.

On April 25, 2015, Mr. Ron Chaney, a 44 year-old Army veteran, found himself in the middle of a massive layoff due to a downturn in the economy. After working for two years at TMK IPSCO at the Port of Catoosa, he was laid off. TMK, an oil-based company only had two layoffs before closing their doors. Ron went to the Claremore Workforce Center and registered for his unemployment benefits. There he spoke with the veterans' representative and was referred to the Claremore Career Services Office for the Job Driven National Emergency Grant.

Ron was happy to discover there was a program that could pay for retraining. He used to talk to some of the guys in the department next to his when he worked for TMK because what they were doing intrigued him. This encouraged him to make the choice to become a CNC Manufacturing Technician at Northeast Technology Center, where Shawn Christian was his instructor. Ron graduated in May 2016, and was inducted into the National Honor Technology Society due to receiving excellent ratings in every facet of his education. These accomplishments have allowed Ron to obtain a position at Sofidel, a global paper manufacturing company.

The Cherokee Nation, as the grant recipient for the Job-Driven Emergency Grant, paid for Ron's training while attending Northeast Technology Center. The Oklahoma Employment Security Commission was able to qualify Ron for Trade Reemployment Allowance (TRA) unemployment insurance benefits, which helped to support him financially, while he attended school. TRA is a weekly allowance payment to workers covered under a certified Trade Act petition who have been separated because of lack of work in employment covered by the Petition Certificate.

Ron was a combat Army veteran from 1989 to 2003. He and his wife have grown children and nine grandchildren. He is enjoying his new skill.

Accomplishments:

- 1) The ECU hosted two Alternative Spring Break students from James Madison University and Michigan State University. They volunteered in the classrooms and worked on playground improvement projects for a week and generated approximately \$3,000 in in-kind services.
- 2) 1 CDA's was obtained this month and 9 renewals.
- 3) Five administrative staff traveled to Albuquerque, NM for the Native Child and Family Conference. They will receive 20 hours of training in their respective areas of interest. They will also recommend trainers from this conference for the ECU 24th Early Childhood conference in November.
- 4) Due to the numerous screenings that must be completed before the end of school and remaining time does not allow completion, as of March 3, 2017 the 2016-17 Head Start school year is closed to new enrollment.
- 5) A total interior renovation of one of the classrooms in the Children's Village is near completion. Due to a water leak during the Christmas break, the floor, cabinets and duct work were replaced.
- 6) The annual WILLs meeting was held Friday, March 10, 2017 in the ECU conference room. The "Women in Long-term Leadership" is a celebration of the women in the ECU and coincides with Women's History Month.
- 7) According to the evaluations, the first New Staff Orientation in February was well received by the newest faculty hired in the last two months. This training will be scheduled every month. New staff received information on all aspects of the program from purpose of various reports, screening schedules, timelines to obtain credentials, policies and procedures and performance standards.

Upcoming Initiatives

1) Plans are being finalized for the 17th GPS Institute on April 11-13, 2017 in Tulsa. This training is designed for the ECU supervisors and managers to develop training plans for the fall year, to make supervisory assignments, and prepare for a possible federal review in the 2017-18 school year.

- 2) The next quarterly meetings: Culture and Language Advisory Board meeting is March 27, 2017 and the Health Advisory Board will meet April 27, 2017. The next Policy Council meeting is March 16, 2017.
- 3) Training for the new child tracking program, ChildPlus, is scheduled for April 4, 2017. The training will cover more in-depth features of the program in regard to data that can be extrapolated for program planning. Implemented in the 2016-17 school year, the ChildPlus program is a new and improved enrollment process that has proven to be efficient in enrollment and tracking health screenings.
- 4) Seven administrative staff will attend the International Early Childhood Conference in Tulsa in April. The focus on the training will be on Early Head Start ages and stages.
- 5) End of school year 2016-17 for Head Start children is May 3, 2017 and the faculty will be furloughed for the summer beginning May 8, 2017.
