ahlequah - Has six children vacancies at this time with current staff. We have three vacant positions. We had a Scholastic Book Fair at the center.









ADAIR COUNTY PROJECTS:

- 1. Bell North Right of Way sent the revisions to be made back to Red Plains March 8, 2017.
- 2. Bell School South Right of Way is waiting for the appraisals to be completed. NEPA is complete, received floodplain permit, Still need the Section 404 permit.
- 3. Bidding Springs Road Aerials have been received to begin design. Survey is currently in progress.
- 4. Bunch Road Had meeting with Engineer. Decided to design a 4-span bridge to replace low water crossing.
- 5. Chewey Road NEPA is completed. The firm of Smith-Roberts will start there acquisition process after appraisals are complete.
- 6. Dahlonegah South NEPA has been completed. The firm of Smith-Roberts started the acquisition process November 1, 2016.
- 7. Dahlonegah West- Working on 60% plans..
- 8. Lyon South Road Received aerials to begin design. Received traffic counts. Began preliminary vertical and horizontal alignments. The survey is completed and submitted to design.
- 9. Lyon Switch Road Design is working on 90% plans.
- 10. Malloy Hollow-Design is working with environmental services to supply information needed for the 404 application. Received preliminary relocation plans from Ozark Electric and attended Cherry Tree RWD board meeting to discuss the need to relocate the existing waterline.
- 11. North Salem (Bethel Road) Red Plains is revising the exhibits and easements.
- 12. Rocky Mountain School Loop Bridge Design complete. Waiting on 404 permit for NEPA to be approved..
- 13. Sally Bull Hollow We should have the Level III Archeological Report by June so we will know how to proceed in design. We will also conduct a GPR study around two cemeteries to ensure there are no graves outside the cemeteries. We are getting permission from the landowners to enter their land to do the GPR study.
- 14. Smith Hollow Red Plains is revising the utility exhibits and easements.

CHEROKEE COUNTY PROJECTS:

COMMUNITY SERVICES COMMITTEE REPORT

- 1. Hulbert-Lost City (Grace Huddlen) –Right of Way is currently at 68% (28 parcels out of 41 acquired).
- 2. Mud Valley Road Aerial data has been received and submitted to Guy Engineering for design.
- 3. Northeast Fort Gibson- We have purchased credits from the conservation bank and received the biological opinion. The NEPA process is complete. We are moving forward with coordinating utility relocations.
- 4. Ross Street- Monthly meeting for Engineering and Utility Coordination will be held on April 25, 2017 at 10 a.m. Identified utility companies along the project as LREC, AT&T, TPWA, and NOPFA.
- 5. Tenkiller School Construction is -90% complete. Project contract currently in liquidated damages.

CRAIG COUNTY PROJECTS:

1. NS-4340 Road – Right of Way sent AT&T's packet to Real Estate Services October 22, 2016. Last check, March 10, 2017 AT&T's packet has not been submitted to the BIA. We are still waiting for PSO to complete their paper work and return it to us.

DELAWARE COUNTY PROJECTS:

- 1. Leach/Kenwood Road –Clearing is completed. Construction is -22% complete. Liquidated damages began on February 11, 2017.
- 2. Whitewater Bridge (Br. 27) Tribal Transportation Program Bridge funding request was approved for \$761,257.44. Delaware County/ODOT will be letting this project contract. Construction began on 11/16/2016.

MUSKOGEE COUNTY PROJECTS:

- 1. Northeast Fort Gibson- We have purchased credits from the conservation bank and received the biological opinion. The NEPA process is complete. We are moving forward with coordinating utility relocations.
- 2. Texanna Road Survey has been processed. Pavement borings being performed. Preliminary design underway.

SEQUOYAH COUNTY PROJECTS:

1. Dwight Mission/Sequoyah Landing Road –Cherokee Nation contributed \$412,110.00 to Sequoyah County as per the agreement between Cherokee Nation and Sequoyah County. Cherokee Nation will contribute up to a total of \$672,839.20 by project completion. Project complete. CE is approved. Pre-Bid Meeting Scheduled for April 17, 2017 at 10:00 a.m. Bid Opening will be May 18, 2017 at 10:00 a.m.

COMMUNITY SERVICES COMMITTEE REPORT

2. Moonshine Road – Final plans were submitted and being checked before sending to Engineer for final check and signature. Utility locations along the project are being located to identify the need for possible relocations.

WASHINGTON COUNTY PROJECTS:

1. Matoka Bridge (Br. #84) — Awareded to H&H Bridge Company, construction begins April 3, 2017 and is scheduled to be completed by July 21, 2017 Cherokee Nation contributed \$700,370.24 to Washington county as per the agreement between Cherokee Nation and Washington county.

III. CHEROKEE TRANSIT SYSTEM:

There are currently three van orders: order #1 – two biofuel conversion vans with an expected delivery date of late April to mid May and order #2 – one gasoline conversion van with an expected delivery date of late March to early April.







827 consumer loans totaling \$972,443.59 have been made through the Small Business Assistance Center as of April 15th. Three of these were Foreclosure Prevention loans totaling \$76,358.93.

432 families are actively saving in iSave for home rehabilitation or home purchase. iSave is *a matched savings program* wherein income eligible families save a certain amount of money over a period of time and the iSave program matches the families' savings to build financial assets.

Families purchasing a home must attend an intensive **homeownership training** class. Year to date **243 families have attended these classes**, which are held throughout the Cherokee Nation.

Citizens, Cherokee Nation employees and CNB employees have the opportunity to attend financial education classes on topics ranging from spending plans, balancing checkbooks and couponing. Year to date 622 people have attended community and work based financial education classes.



Programs with court induction

OCAPS: Out-Of-District Court Advocacy and Permanency Services

- Involved in child welfare cases in non-jurisdiction counties in Oklahoma and all 50
- Most work is done telephonically or electronically.
- Emphasis on education about the Indian Child Welfare Act and ensuring States comply with it.

SCAPS: State Court Advocacy and Permanency Services

- Involved in child welfare cases inside the 14 counties of which all or part are within the jurisdiction of the Nation.
- Emphasis on education about the Indian Child Welfare Act and ensuring OKDHS compliance, and sometimes provide Tribal Foster Homes.
- Provides services to the families when OKDHS fails to do so or as an alternative to OK DHS services.

TCAPS: Tribal Court Advocacy and Permanency Services

- Involved in child welfare cases which are wholly under the jurisdiction of the Nation and OKDHS is not involved.
- These cases originate on Indian Country or are transferred in from State district courts. Hearings are held at our Tribal Court House. Tribal Foster Homes are fully willized.


GPA: Guardianships and Private Adoptions

- Involved in voluntary adoptions when the birth parents wish to place their child for adoption.
- Monitors Guardianships and Private Adoptions for compliance with the Indian Child Welfare Act and the best interests of children.
- Serves Cherokee children and their families in Tribal Court and parts of Oklahoma.

CPS: Child Protective Services

- Receives referrals involving allegations of maltreatment of Cherokee children.
- Investigates allegations of child maltreatment in Indian Country and coinvestigates with DHS in some counties when Cherokee children are involved.

Efficient & Effective Work

Eligibility Notices

When a County or State's child welfare agency gets involved in the life of a family that they suspect to be Cherokee, they're required by the Indian Child Welfare Act (ICWA) to send Notice to the tribe. The tribe must then reply to confirm or deny whether the children are members of (or eligible to become members of) the tribe. The tribe has 30 days to respond.

Month of March

Cherokee Nation received:

- CN Jurisdictional area 84 notice; involving 159 children
- Outside of CN Jurisdictional area 584 notices for 1,024 children.
- Totaling 1,183 children.
- The longest Response-to-Notice time this month was 35 days.


Indian Child Welfare Family Protection Services Unit (FPS) assists families in need of hands-on children being removed from their home. - Child Protective Services (CPS) received 287 referrals of child abuse/neglect from 31 Oklahoma counties as well as 4 from other states.
- substance abuse, and 47 alleged domestic abuse. alleged abuse and 12 alleged sexual abuse, 25 287 referrals involved 207 alleged neglect, 43 requested services due to abuse. 122 alleged
- 3 of the 287 were co-investigated by OKDHS and
- 14 of the 287 cases were investigated by CPS on Indian Country.
- 0 of the 287 cases were investigations from a casino related referral.
- 10 Cherokee child(ren) were removed from Tribal land due to confirmed abuse/neglect.
- 4 Cherokee child(ren) were removed during conjoint investigations due to confirmed abuse/meglect.

Home Closure Reasons for March:

- 3 homes closures because permanency of a placed child was finalized.
- 1 home closure because of families school schedule.
- I home closure because family sold their home and are
- I home closure because they finalized adoption of a baby from another agency.
- I home closure was because the family just had a new baby.
- I home closure was because of their failure to complete the re-assessment process.
- 1 home closure was processed with personal reasons being cited.

Types of Certified Placement Resource Homes

- Non-Relative Adoptive: Families who hope to adopt children when the children's parents' rights are terminated. These homes do not take foster placements.
- Non-Relative Fost/Adopt: Families who take foster placement of children knowing their parental rights are not terminated and they could return home, but if they don't the placement family will have the first chance to adopt them.
- Non-Relative Foster: Families who are willing to take in children they do not know on a temporary basis, but may last years. These families usually do not adopt children.
- Relative Adoptive/Foster: Families who are related to the children and are fostering them or planning to adopt them. They do not take in children they are not related to.
- Emergency/Respite: Families that take very short-term placement of children while more permanent placements are sought or when only a short-term placement is needed.
