Brenda Fitzgerald, Director of the **Vocational Rehabilitation Program** attended OU's Economic Development Institute. We will host the Oklahoma Tribal VR Council at the Hard Rock and co-host the CANAR mid-year conference in June.

Vocational Rehabilitation Participant Success:

One of Cherokee Nation Vocational Rehabilitation (CNVR) recent success stories is a consumer who was 18 years old and a recent High School graduate when he came to the Voc Rehab office. He had been referred by his High School counselor. He said his goal was to attend and graduate Oklahoma State University (OSU), which he had already been accepted, and had been awarded an Academic Excellence Scholarship from OSU. However, the scholarship along with the Financial Aid he was eligible to receive would not be enough to cover all the expenses such as tuition, fees, and books and since he would have to live on campus dorm and meal plan would also be included.

Once all documents were received, including medical documents, and his case was processed it was determined he met the eligibility criteria for Vocational Rehabilitation. Once it was decided what CNVR services he was eligible to receive he was able to obtain his goal of attending OSU with all his expenses being covered by Financial Aid, Academic Excellence Scholarship, and CNVR. The consumer's field of study was Agriculture Economics and Accounting. He graduated OSU the fall of 2016 with an overall GPA of 3.0 and was listed on the President's Honor Roll. He just recently became employed at Farmer's Elevator Company, in Ames, OK, as Assistant Controller with a starting salary of \$30,000. This is also the same company where he did his Internship. This position is compatible with his disabling condition.

He is quite happy and thanks CNVR for helping him accomplish his goal and able to be to be self-sufficient.

The **Alternative Education Program** had ten students pass all components of the HSE (GED®, HiSET®) Test during the month of May. Our total graduate count is **53** (47 are Cherokee Nation citizens; six are members of other Federally Recognized tribes; four are/were clients of the Jack Brown Center) for FY17.

The HSE Graduation has been set for Thursday, September 14, 2017 at 6:30pm in the NSU Ballroom. Alternative Education staff will be attending the GED Conference in July.



SEQUOYAH SCHOOLS:

- Sequoyah High School graduated 74 seniors for 2017
- Graduation ceremonies went smooth with the senior class hosting a reception afterward
- SHS Graduates collectively earned college scholarships totaling \$2119,568.50
