

- 1. Sale or Purchase of Land. No sell or purchase of land.
- 2. <u>Appraisals</u>. Three appraisals were ordered during the month of May. As of reporting date, three were completed.

- 3. Quiet Titles. Five Quiet Title requests were received, researched and returned.
- 4. <u>Report for Distributions, ALJs.</u> Four Administrative Law Judgments were requested, researched and processed.
- 5. <u>Restriction Removal Applications.</u> Five restriction removal applications are being processed; one was approved and completed during the month of May.
- 6. <u>Inventory/Heirship.</u> 31 Inventory/Heirships were requested, completed and returned.
- 7. <u>Last Will and Testaments.</u> Five Last Will and Testaments were prepared and endorsed; one full-blood District Court approval was processed; eight new interviews were taken; four drafts prepared.
- 8. <u>Rights of Way, Rights of Entry, Service Line Agreements.</u> One Right of Way was approved and one is pending on trust land. Eleven Rights of Entry were requested and processed. Three Service Line Agreements are pending; three approved.
- 9. <u>On-Site Inspections, Trespass issues</u>. Eight on-site inspections were requested and completed. Three trespass issues are pending.
- 10. <u>Leases.</u> One business lease on tribal land was submitted; one approved. One agriculture lease on restricted land was submitted; one approved.
- 11. Maps/platting. 33 requests for maps/platting assistance were received and completed.
- 12. <u>Jurisdictional calls</u>. 49 jurisdictional calls were completed during the month, with 18 after hours.
- 13. <u>District Court Probates.</u> There are no inventory applications for probate on the waiting list. All probates that are at paid status for court costs are completed through Real Estate Services, ready for filing by attorney.
- 14. <u>Trust Asset and Accounting Management System Project</u>. When the TAAMS project started, there were 12,669 allotments that required research. There are 62 total files remaining for status determination, research and abstracting.
- 15. <u>Stats.</u> 104 client sign-ins (walk-ins), 84 phone inquiries, 65 obituaries processed.

# II Highlights:

# a) Clean Air Program:

- Staff attended the spring National Atmospheric Deposition Program (NADP) meeting in Louisville, KY April 24th 27th.
- Air staff attended the National Tribal Forum on Air Quality in Tucson, AZ May 1st 4th and presented in the Air Quality Technical & Outreach session.
- Eric Hebert with Environmental Engineering & Measurement Services, Inc. (EEMS) was at the Stilwell site May 9th - 11th for site evaluation and ozone and meteorological audits. EEMS performs independent audits of sites in the CASTNet program.
- Air staff performed a 6 x 6 verification on the Thermo 49i-PS ozone transfer standard; it can now be put back into rotation to be used for site checks. The 6 x 6 verification must be performed after any adjustments or repairs are made to the instrument.
- Staff will attend the National Tribal Air Association (NTAA) VW Settlement Work Group call on May 18th.

# b) Pesticides Program:

Staff worked with the Grants Development department to submit the FY18 Pesticides grant application to grants.gov; EPA acknowledged that the application was received. The new R6 project officer for Cherokee Nation and the State of Oklahoma is Eric Nystrum.

- Staff submitted the 2<sup>nd</sup> quarter report for FY17.
- Staff traveled to New Orleans, LA for the Region 6 Spring State/SLA/Tribal Pesticides meeting May 2<sup>nd</sup> – 4<sup>th</sup>.

# c) Clean Water Program:

- Staff received data from the 2nd quarter of stream sampling from Green Country Testing; the data is currently being reviewed and compiled for submission to EPA's STOrage and RETrieval and Water Quality eXchange (STORET).
- Staff finished the Clean Water 106 2nd quarter report for EPA on April 24th. The report covered sampling of streams and lakes and also covered trainings and conferences that were attended by water staff.
- Staff planned on sampling Lake Copan May 15th, but all boat ramps were closed. Staff will check with Army Corps of Engineers next week to see if they have re-opened the ramps.
- Staff will be sampling Lake Oologah again the week of May 22nd if debris and water levels have returned to a safe level.

# d) Underground Storage Tank (UST) Program:

- UST staff will provide an 8-hour HAZWOPER refresher course on May 17th.
- The UST staff provide technical assistance and inspection services to 8 tribes this month.

# e) Natural Resource Damage Assessment and Restoration: (NRDA):

Staff worked presented the Tribal NRDAR Conference. The Cherokee Nation hosted this tribal event for the U.S. Department of Interior. Staff traveled to Albuquerque, New Mexico to attend the NRDAR 101 class.

### 1. Tar Creek:

• Staff again participated in one Tar Creek Trustee Council Indian Tribes (TCTCIT) conference calls with the Tribal NRDAR Attorneys and consultant. The conference call focused on the EPA Data Gap Report for Operable Unit #5.

- 2. Tulsa County Smelter Complex:
- Staff worked on the Tulsa County Smelter Complex Trustee Council activities and reviewed the Notice of Intent (NOI) Letter to the Primary Responsible Parties (PRPs).
- f) Cherokee Nation Real Estate Services:
  - Staff met with a Bureau of Indian Affairs staff member to review the Skelly Illinois River Phase I Report. Staff made changes as requested and submitted the report to CN Real Estate Services and BIA.
