Key Project Summary

Capital Projects

- Cherokee National Capitol Update:
 - Architectural development and exhibit planning for the interior of the building continues. This
 work focuses on developing the building as a museum devoted to showcasing Cherokee history
 and culture from time immemorial to present day. The museum is currently in schematic
 design.
 - o Interior restoration work should begin this fall.
- Water Avenue Pavilion
 - Currently reviewing scope options for the Pavilion structure that will be located on the vacant lot on the east side of the Cherokee National Capitol. Focused on creating a community gathering space, the Pavilion could be used as a multi-function space for community events, live music performances, farmers markets, and outdoor cultural classes.
 - Currently working through scope of work alternatives for the project.
 - Downtown Tahlequah Cultural Pathway
 - Currently working on the design of a cultural pathway to connect Cherokee Nation's downtown cultural resources.
 - Design work will complete by fall 2017
- Saline Courthouse:
 - o Currently exploring future use/development of the courthouse


Report for August 2017 Rob Daugherty – Director






Cultural Outreach & At-Large Communities




CCO Staff assisted the Cherokee Community of Puget Sound with their At-Large Community meeting August 5th at the Puyallup's Little Wild Wolves Youth/Community Center in Fife, WA. Attendance at this meeting reached 178 Cherokees and their families. This was followed up on August 6th with the combined Community Meeting of the Mount Hood Cherokees and the Willamette Tsa-La-Gi Community at the Lane Community College Longhouse in Eugene, OR. There were 187 of our Cherokee family at this event.





During the month of August CCO staff also hosted 3 In District Cultural Presentations. On the 10th, 41 people attended the District 10 presentation provided by National Treasure Demos Glass on stamping

metal and public art in Grove. On the 17th, David Comingdeer demonstrated making stickball sticks to 55 attendees in District 13 citizens in Sperry. Followed on the 22nd with District 14 learning about basketry from Kathy Vanbuskirk in Pryor with 47 attending.



At the end of July, 22^{nd} & 23^{rd} , Miss Betty Frogg traveled to Texas to give presentations on the different type of baskets made by Cherokees. Her presentation for the Cherokee Township of San Antonio was attended by 16 people. Her presentation for the Central Texas Cherokee Township had 8 attendees.







On their return from the Northwest, They built a handicap ramp for an elder in the Kansas, OK community. They also began preparation for the arrival of the groups in October by lining up projects for them in the Dry Creek, Cookson, Welling area.



History & Preservation

This month Lunch & Learn was held on August 17th. Jennifer Frazee, historical interpreter for the Oklahoma Historical Society, presented "Hunter's Home: A Brief Tale of the Museum and Living History Site." Hunters Home was a major social center for Cherokee society in the mid-19th Century.

Cherokee Language Master Apprentice Program

CLMAP staff are working hard, through the Administration for Native Americans (ANA) Native Language Community Coordination (NLCC) grant, with other tribal programs and other language programs to organize, update and build up the various Cherokee language curricula used by the Nation.

Our second year participants are teaching using our immersion methodology under the guidance of our first language master speakers and some of our 1st year program participants have begun taking a little time each week to teach the group. Two are at <u>Intermediate High or Level Six</u> and the other one is at


<u>Intermediate Mid or Level Five</u>. One of our second year students is moved to <u>Level Seven or Advanced Low</u>. We are very excited about this development. The first year participants are progressing at a good rate. Two have tested at <u>Intermediate Mid, Level Five</u>, four have made it to <u>Intermediate Low, Level Four</u> and one participants are at <u>Novice High, Level Three</u>. (See info-graphic below)

The second year students are working on their own to interact with fluent speaking community members and staff in other language programs. They have been able to deepen their inter-conversational language skills to a greater detail because of the experiences and have begun to do one on one mentorships with a diversity of Native speakers. Each second year student is also teaching one hour a day in language session.


Number of Students at Each ACTFL Speaker Level at the end of July

August 2017 Monthly Report

Youth Activities:

We held 7 youth activities in August, due to Briggs school not having Boys & Girls Club the first week of school, one community taking a break for the summer and One community asking to cancel until they can regroup. Total attendance at August youth activities was 91 youth, 11 parents/community members & 5 CYD & ARS staff. Not all staff

attended each site, 2 - 4 staff members went to each site.

Cherokee Heights had 2 youth activities in August on Tuesdays, the 1st & 15th; where they made stretchy corn bead bracelets and Homemade Ice Cream in a Ziploc bag. There were 10 - 15 youth at each meeting. There were a total of 25 youth & 3 CYD & ARS staff in attendance.

Lost City had one youth activity scheduled for Thursday, August 17th, but the community organization asked to To cancel as the youth had just started school and needed to get used to a new schedule.

Tailholt/ Caney had one youth activity on Monday, August 28th, where they made stretchy corn bead bracelets. There were 12 youth, 3 parents & 3 CYD & ARS staff in attendance.

Chewey had 1 youth activity on Tuesday, August 8th, where they made Stretchy corn bead bracelets. There were 7 youth, 2 parents & Adult community members & 3 CYD & ARS staff in attendance.

Brushy had 1 youth activity scheduled on Tuesday, August 22nd, but the community organization has asked to cancel and give them some time to regroup as due to budget cut backs at Brushy school the Boys & Girls club will not have the staff to bring their youth to the community building for activities.

Maryetta Boys & Girls Club had 1 youth activity on Thursday, August 10th, where they made stretchy corn bead bracelets. There were 20 youth, 3 B&G club staff and 3 CYD & ARS staff in attendance.

Cave Springs/Zion Boys & Girls had 1 youth activity on Thursday, August 24th, where they made stretchy corn bead bracelets. There were 25 youth, 3 B&G Club staff and 3 CYD & ARS staff in attendance.

Briggs Boys & Girls club had 1 youth activity scheduled on Wednesday, August 9th, but asked to cancel it as they did not have Boys & Girls club the first week of school.

Rocky Mountain Boys & Girls had 1 youth activity on Monday, August 21st, where they made stretchy corn bead bracelets. There was no electricity in the school so there were only 2 youth and 3 CYD & ARS staff in attendance.

Mailed & handed out 115 copies of flyers about September youth activities to residents, community organizations & participants in Cherokee Heights, Chewey, Lost City & Tailholt and e-mailed a flyer to Briggs, Maryetta B&G club, Cave Springs/Zion B&G club & Rocky Mountain B&G club to post for their youth activities.

Adult Resident Activities:

We held 6 adult resident activities in August, total attendance at Adult adult resident activities was 46 adult residents & 5 CYD & ARS staff. Not all staff attended activities at each site, 2-3 staff went to each site.

Tom Buffington Heights in Vinita, had 1 Adult Resident Activity schedule on Thursday, August 17th, where they made beaded safety pin medallion necklaces. There were 5 residents and 3 CYD & ARS staff in attendance.

Will Rogers Senior Housing in Claremore had 1 Adult Resident Activity on Thursday, August 24th, where they made clay pinch pots. There were 7 residents and 2 CYD & ARS staff in attendance.

Wisdom Keepers in Tahlequah held 1 Adult Resident Activity on Thursday, August 10th, where they made clay pinch pots. There were 12 adult residents and 3 CYD & ARS staff in attendance.

Jay Senior Housing held 1 Adult Resident Activity on Tuesday, August 8th, where they made clay pinch pots. There were 9 adult residents and 3 CYDARS staff in attendance.

Stilwell Senior Housing held 1 Adult Resident Activity on Thursday, August 3rd, where they made clay pinch pots. There were 3 adult residents and 3 CYD & ARS staff in attendance.

Tahlequah Housing held 1 Adult Resident Activity for adult residents of Swimmer, Autumn Heights & Daniels additions at the Gregg Glass Building on Monday, August 14th, where they made clay pinch pots. There were 10 adult residents and 3 CYD & ARS staff in attendance.

Mailed and handed out 189 copies of flyers about September adult resident activities to housing residents and housing offices in Claremore, Wisdom Keepers, Tahlequah (Leon Daniels, Ross Swimmer and Autumn Heights housing additions) and Vinita and e-mailed flyers to Wisdom Keepers, Stilwell Senior Housing, Claremore Senior Housing, Tahlequah Housing Office, Vinita Tom Buffington Heights HACN office and Jay Senior Housing to post.

Will Rogers Senior Housing, Claremore, on the 4th Thursday, September 28th, 2 pm. – 4 pm.

I am waiting to see what is done with our budget before I schedule any new youth activity to replace Brushy or schedule any new Adult resident activities as if our budgets stay cut by more than 50% and we have to lay off or reassign staff we will not have enough staff to do the activities scheduled each month now much less any new ones.

We are continually working on learning and putting together new projects, language lessons and leadership exercises to use at future youth and adult activities and teaching each other skills we have and making sure everyone is teaching the same way so we will not confuse the participants.

We are all working on getting projects ready and taking turns making sure all supplies and paperwork is ready for each activity.
